AUSTRALIAN ARMY APPRENTICES MEMORIAL

The Australian Army Apprentices Association is to construct a Memorial to all Apprentices at the Memorial Park, Bandiana, Victoria, which is located adjacent to the Army Museum. The design is being developed by an ex Apprentice on the basis of proposals agreed by the Association's Committee. In essence, the Memorial will centre on a set of gates that were moved from Balcombe when the Apprentices School was relocated to Bonegilla in January 1983. These gates were constructed by apprentices from the 8th and 10th intakes and are similar to the main gates (known as the Marine Gates) that provided entry to the parade ground at Balcombe, but were situated at what was known as the Metal Trades entrance on the Nepean Highway, about 400 metres south of the main gates.

The gates are currently installed at Latchford Barracks. It is intended to relocate these to the Memorial Park where they will be a part of a permanent memorial to all Apprentices. The Memorial will be dedicated to all Apprentices who supported the Australian Army in war and peace, particularly to those who sacrificed their life in defence of Australia. It will also be available to all Apprentices to permanently record their place as an Army Apprentice, and as a resting place for their ashes; forever with their mates. Memorial plaques will be affixed to the gate support walls.

Army Apprentices Reunion Albury/Wodonga 24-26 October 2008

60th Anniversary of the formation of the Army Apprentices School at Balcombe, Victoria in 1948

Background

The Australian Army Apprentices Association intends to construct a Memorial to be located in the grounds of the Australian Army Memorial Park, at Gaza Ridge Barracks, Bandiana South. The Park is directly opposite the Army Museum, an excellent location, which already contains several Memorials honouring various elements of Australian Army Military History. The Memorial page on the website has all the details.



The necessary approvals have been obtained by the Association, and it is the intention to have the construction of the Memorial completed by October 2008.

We have decided to further mark this occasion to celebrate the establishment of the Army Apprentices School, 60 years ago at Balcombe Camp, Victoria. We are hopeful of a very positive response from the "old boys" from Balcombe and later those from Latchford Barracks, staff and partners to attend, and we anticipate our numbers to be around 1500.

Programme of Events:

The activities will cover the week end of 24 to 26 Oct 08, and will be in the Albury City and Bandiana Barracks locations.

Friday 24 Oct 08, afternoon:

The Australian Army Museum has agreed to host our Meet & Greet function at their premises to be held under semi-covered accommodation in a compound next door to the Museum. This is to commence at 2.00pm with a BBQ dinner served from 5.00 pm. 9.00 pm will see the event draw to a close. Seating, tables and rest rooms will be more than adequate. Because of our anticipated numbers and the need to have wet and cold weather protection, our choices in the Albury area were very limited and were about twice the price. Never the less at that time of year Bandiana can be somewhat chilly so be prepared. Reunion information packs will be distributed as attendees sign in.

Saturday 25 Oct 08, morning:

Albury City is sponsoring our march through the CBD commencing at 10.00am. We have been fortunate to secure the services of the Australian Army Band. This is not a long march and will conclude with a Civic Reception by the Lord Mayor in the City Square.

The Association Secretary Stephen Hladio (28th MSN) will be our Parade Marshal on the day. You will all need to be "booted & spurred" with shiny medals, hats, sun screen, etc. Morning tea will be served at the conclusion of the reception. We believe that the whole activity will be over by 11.30am. This leaves some free time for intake gatherings during the afternoon.

Our Association Patron, Gen Ken Gillespie, Chief of the Army, (23rd AAS) will be the parade host and we are seeking VIPs` from the highest level, to review us "passing by".

Saturday 25 Oct 08, evening:

Commencing at 6.00 for 6.30pm the Reunion Dinner will get underway. This will include a 3 course sit down meal, probably a beef / chicken alternative, but special dietary requirements will be available, just let us know when you register. Again we will be inviting dignitaries` to share this evening as our guests. That will lead to the inevitable speeches, but I promise they will be few and brief. Music of the times will come from the DJ, but I`m confident that a few of those AAS Musicians given half a chance under the baton of Stephen Hladio may do us a treat as well. The setting for the Dinner is the Albury Convention Centre, Swift St. This is where we formed up for the parade earlier in the day and, which whilst being the biggest venue in Albury; it can only accommodate 750 bodies.

Tables will be set for 10 people, and Groups / Intakes will be able to reserve a table provided that:

1. full payment for the table has been made, ie, \$ 450.00,
2. occupants are listed by name, and
3. a nominated contact name (table captain) with mobile number is submitted.

This evening should be concluded no later than 11.30pm. To ensure your place at this "night of nights", we can only suggest that you plan your numbers, and book early.

Sunday 26 Oct 08, morning:

The Memorial Dedication Ceremony is to commence at 10.00am at the Army Museum Memorial Park, Gaza Ridge Barracks, at Bandiana South. Again the Army band will be in attendance and the ceremony is to be managed by our Secretary Stephen Hladio, who as you can see will be a busy boy over this weekend. We would like to see the same dress turnout as we had for the Albury Parade. We are delighted that the Dedication Service is to be conducted by ordained Apprentices.

Sunday 26 Oct 08, 12.30pm

A Gourmet BBQ luncheon with refreshments will be available from midday back at our Friday night venue and this will continue until 4.00pm when our festivities come to an end. This is another opportunity for intake members to get together for a few hours.

AICW F88 Rifle



Rate of fire: 650 rounds per minute (for 5.56mm barrel) Capacity: 30 rounds (5.56mm) magazine plus 3 40mm rounds in the G/L barrel

The AICW (Advanced Infantry Combat Weapon) is a joint development of the Australian DSTO (Government operated Defence Science and Technology Organisation), and private companies Metal Storm and Tenix Defence.

This development has been carried out since the turn of 21st century, closely following the concept of the American XM29 OICW system. Overall, ICW represents the modular weapon system that combines the 5.56mm rifle/carbine component as a host (basic) platform with 40mm multi-shot grenade launcher (G/L) module and multi-purpose electro-optical sighting system, which can be used to fire either rifle or G/L component, and also can provide recon data to external "consumers" such as tactical computers.

The host rifle component of the AICW is the updated Australian-made F88 rifle, which is a license-built Steyr AUG. However, the basic F88 rifle has been extensively modified to accept other elements of the system - for example, receiver has been upgraded to receive the G/L module at the top, and the buttstock has been enlarged to accommodate G/L electronic fire control module

Other changes include modification to the safety and trigger arrangements - AICW system has a single trigger for both weapon components (5.56 and 40mm), and a three position (safe - rifle - G/L) safety/selector switch at the side of the pistol grip.

The most interesting part of the AICW weapon is the multi-shot Metal Storm 40mm grenade launcher, which looks like a single 40mm G/L barrel but contains three 40mm projectiles stacked one behind the another. These projectiles are launched using the electric ignition impulses, provided by the fire control module built into the buttstock of the host rifle.

Since the muzzle velocity of these projectiles is slightly more than usual for 40mm handheld G/L (95m/s instead of 75m/s), host rifle incorporates the recoil reduction buffer, that allows the Metal Storm G/L barrel to recoil against the spring, decreasing the peak recoil impulse.

The top of the receiver hosts the multi-role sights of various type and make. At the AICW VX3 live fire demonstrations that took place in the summer of 2005, AICW prototypes were displayed with ITL Viper multi-purpose rifle sight (that incorporates laser range-finder and digital compass), or with Vinghog Vingsight Fire Control System. At the present time (late 2005) AICW prototypes have not yet fired 40mm grenades with live warheads, nor incorporated an airburst facility. However, it is stated that it is possible to easily adapt most of the existing 40mm grenade warheads to the Metal Storm technology, including air-bursting grenades that are now in development in several countries.

At the present time AICW weapons are available only as the "3rd generation technology demonstrators", that completed first live-fire trials (as a complete system) in the summer of 2005.

Current Australian MOD plans state that ADF may start to purchase AICW systems in around 2010-2012

VCDF clocks up 40 years service

MOST soldiers aim to serve 20 years, then retire and move onto another career. Not so the VCDF, Lt-Gen Ken Gillespie, who last month reached the milestone of 40 years service.

Lt-Gen Gillespie joined the Army at Brisbane on January 15, 1968, aged 15 years. He said he did not know why he joined; it was always a life long ambition, even at that early age.

“When I was a little kid on a farm, I listened to a radio drama based on the events of WWII in the Pacific; it used to support CMF recruiting in those days,” Lt-Gen Gillespie said. “It was sort of the soldier’s version of Biggles and it fired me up and made me want to be a soldier.” Lt-Gen Gillespie joined the Army not as an officer, but as an apprentice.

“I was a brick layer and completed my four year apprenticeship at the Apprentice School at Balcombe in Victoria,” he said. “It was good for a young kid, it was a college life, there was a lot of sport and excitement, with little parental supervision. “It was good fun.”

During his apprenticeship he realised he had to do something else if he was going to stay in the Army, so he decided to become an officer. “Luckily I passed the selection process on the completion of my apprenticeship,” Lt-Gen Gillespie said.

“I went to Portsea, spent 12 months there and was commissioned as a Second Lieutenant in December 1972.”

He said he had many career highlights since then, including being selected to work in the UK as an instructor. “I worked at the Royal School of Military Engineering in 1986- 87,” he said. “Other career highlights were being promoted to Lt-Col, selected as the contingent deputy and ops officer for the contingent to Namibia.

“As a senior officer I have commanded troops in Timor Leste, have held the position of Land Commander and now the VCDF, so I’ve had a lucky but truly rewarding 40 years,” he said. Lt-Gen Gillespie said the most challenging aspect of his career so far, would be trying to continue to stay fresh in his job.

“I worked hard to try and remain agile of thought and mind and not become one of those generals who sits there, has no fresh ideas and revels in the good old days,” he said. “You have to keep to your ideas and be prepared to morph yourself and the organisation into something that is ready for the next war and not the past war.”

On reaching the 40 year milestone Lt-Gen Gillespie said he has hardly noticed the time pass since his enlistment day in 1968. “It’s passed in a heart beat,” he said. For serving Army members Lt- Gen Gillespie said he liked to think that his career experience could be seen as an example of what was possible in the ADF today. “If you are prepared to take your opportunities, work hard and make successes of them, you can travel from apprentice brick layer to General and I don’t think there are too many military forces in the world where that can happen,” he said.

Lt-Gen Gillespie said he was unsure what path his future in the Army would take. “The Government will make up its mind about the new Defence leadership team in July,” he said. “Whether I am a part of that or not is a matter for the Government, so my horizons for the rest of my military career could be as short as the next four or five months, or it could be a while longer,” he said. “If I serve on I will do it gladly and put my efforts into it.

“As to what I will do after the Army, I don’t know what I will do at the moment. It is a debate between my wife and I at present and she certainly sees me as a continuing member of the work force!”

12:05	<p>Speech by Brig Ross Grant (ret)</p> <p>Ross indicated that the only way to keep ahead of the wave is to use a new model, with the Association of Queensland as a successful example of how an association came be done. Note that it is not the only example, just a current one. The best news of today is the Marketing Committee, as this is an important first step to allow the committee and the association to become more focussed, strategy and marketing are essential elements to address.</p> <p>There are a number of untapped resources – the RAEME Mafia email list is one such example. The meeting held at VBM was considered a success, with good feedback and exposure for the RAEME association among the largely RAEME members of the VBM population. The association needs to find a way of attracting or engaging the some 500 members who are part of that email list to the association as a matter of urgency. The email list needs to be segmented and then seek out and speak to them as a matter of urgency.</p> <p>The association need a model that attracts the younger member who will come along to this type of association (when finished with self indulgence). Nurturing needs to become part of the process of engagement with the association, using a multi-layered strategy.</p> <p>Ross indicated that the regional chapters are needed to extend the reach of the association. Don't expect help in the local area from Army units, don't rely on the Army for assistance for activities. RAEME product sales is a strong element of the association and should be kept up (and expanded).</p> <p>Chapters should be encouraged to conduct their own activities, with committee sanction and advertising, to foster greater levels of activity. 


