Another "Veterans Bike Ride" is being organized in Trawool – located on the Seymour to Yea Road - from Friday 7th to Monday 10th March 2014 (Labour Day weekend). Trawool is on the former Seymour to Yea railway line which is now converted to the Goulburn River High Country Rail Trail. Given the location, Vet Ride 2014 will also conduct a number of specific activities, including a "Ride to Pucka", lunch with some current serving members and a night visit to the Vietnam Veterans Commemorative Walk at Seymour. During WW2 there was an Army camp based on the on the Seymour to Yea road, prior to Puckapunyal being established. Details regarding this ride can be found at the website www.vetride.org/.

Sad news with the recent passing of three of the RAEME Victorian Family:

LT Jack Westerhagen, was a 3rd Intake Army Apprentice, and involved in establishing the Army Apprentices Association. Jack served on the Committee of the RAEME Association Victoria, of which he was a Life Member.

LTCOL Ed Sullivan, who was a 9th Intake Army apprentice, served at 101 Fld. Wksp, Puckapunyal in 57/58 with Major Fred Greenway and after other postings joined Fred at Officer Training School Portsea in June 61, in 63/64 was at RAEME Training Centre and then posted to 1 Armoured Regiment LAD as O.C at "Pucka". Next posting was Vietnam with the "LAD", followed by ADC to Brigadier Long on his RTA. After Army retirement, Ed worked as an Associate to His Honour Judge Thomas A Neesham of the County Court.

CAPT Dennis Edwards was also an Army Apprentice, 20th Intake. His athleticism allowed him to represent AAS Balcombe in both basketball and cricket. He later became 106 Fld. Wkshp CSM in 70/71 and set the Army standards for welding. After leaving the Army Dennis used these skills by working in several executive positions with a number of welding specialist companies. Upon retirement Dennis travelled to Vietnam and set up the Edwards Family Treasure Chest to help educate a large number of street kids in South Vietnam. He raised money by organizing entertainment functions.

All three men contributed greatly to their civilian communities as well as the Corps and will be a great loss.

**Vietnam: LOOKING BACK
AT THE AMERICAN FACTS**

Author K.G. Sears, Ph.D.

- Prior to 1965; US Advisors and Aid only.
- 1965 – 1967; Build-up of US Forces and logistical supply bases, plus heavy fighting to counter Communist North Vietnamese invasion.
- 1968 – 1970; Communist “Insurgency” destroyed to the point where over 90 % of the villages were, free from Communist domination. As an example: By 1971 throughout the entire populous Mekong Delta, the monthly rate of Communist insurgency action dropped to 3 incidents per one hundred thousand population. [Many a U.S. city would envy a crime rate that low].
In 1969 President Nixon started troop withdrawals that were essentially complete by late 1971.
- Dec 1972; Paris peace agreements negotiated and agreed by North Vietnam, South Vietnam and the South Vietnamese Communists [VC,NLF/PRG] and the United States.
- Jan 1973; All four parties finally sign Paris Peace Agreements.
- Mar 1973; Last US POW released from Hanoi Hilton and in accordance with Paris Agreements, last American GI leaves Vietnam.
- Aug 1973; US Congress passes the *Case – Church* law which forbids, US naval forces sailing on the seas surrounding, US ground forces from operating on the land of and US air forces from flying over South Vietnam, North Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos. This at a time when America had drawn its Cold War battle lines and as a result had the US Navy protecting Taiwan, 50,000 troops in Korea and over 300,00 troops in Western Europe [which has a land area, economy and population comparable to that of the United States], along with iron clad guarantees that if Communist forces should cross any of those Cold War lines or Soviet Armour should roll across either the DMZ in Korea or the Iron Curtain in Europe, then there would be an unlimited response by the armed forces of the United States, to include if necessary, the use of nuclear weapons. In addition, Congress cut off all aid to the South Vietnamese and would not provide them with as much as a single bullet.
- In spite of the *Case – Church* Congressional guarantee, the North Vietnamese were very leery [wary] of US President Nixon. They viewed him as one unpredictable, incredibly tough nut. He had, in 1972, for the first time in the War, mined Hai Phong Harbour and sent the B-52 bombers against the north to force them into signing the Paris Peace Agreements.

- Previously the B52s had been used only against Communist troop concentrations in remote regions of South Vietnam and occasionally against carefully selected sanctuaries in Cambodia, plus against both sanctuaries and supply lines in Laos.
- Aug 1974; Nixon resigns.
- Sept 1974; North Vietnamese hold special meeting to evaluate Nixon’s resignation and decide to test implications.
- Dec 1974; North Vietnamese invade South Vietnamese Province of Phoc Long located north of Saigon [Hoa Chi Minh City] on Cambodian border.
- Jan 1975; North Vietnamese capture Phuoc Binh provincial capital of Phuoc Long. Sit and wait for US reaction. No reaction. *To Be Continued.*

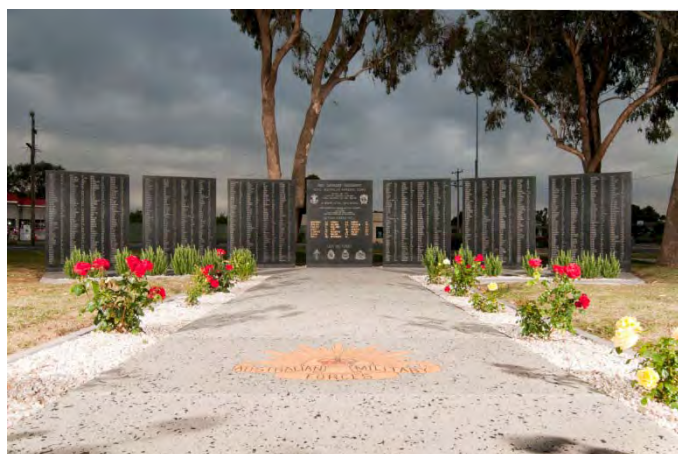

Our past is important, it is ageless and should never be forgotten. It is the reason for our present and our future. We must never forget the sacrifices that were made and it is our duty to preserve the memory of those who have been lost. Australia and New Zealand have been shaped by many events. We have survived wars, natural disasters and conflict between our own borders. We are a free country and a proud nation, our freedom though was hard won, on the shores of Anzac Cove in Gallipoli on the 25th of April 1915. A battle began and Australia assisted her allies. On the days the battle raged, bonds were forged that would last eternity and an event occurred that would never be forgotten.

Aranka Illia

There are individuals who don't fight in the field that are significant to the cause and also deserve our respect and gratitude. The bravery they possess to serve our country is immense. Those behind the lines such as those from the Royal Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers Association are responsible for the maintenance of the equipment involved with army service and as such they are also exceedingly essential within the Australian community.

The RAEME association is dedicated to developing spirit and tradition throughout the RAEME Corps, established in 1942. RAEME only became official in Victoria on the 7th of December 1945. Through RAEME military relationships are developed and preserved while involving members in social, military and Corps events in Victoria. There numerous members within the RAEME Association that I would like to dedicate this article to but I would especially like to honour Aranka Illia.

Aranka has served Australia in countless ways, firstly by being the interpreter for her Hungarian family when they first migrated from Europe. She is a valued citizen and has devoted much of her life to her country. The embodiment of the Australian spirit she calls herself a 'true blue' Aussie. Her extensive service record includes sixteen years with the Australian Reserves from 1977-1993. She also spent time in the Woman's Royal Australian Army Corps, until its disbandment in 1980, from 1980-1984.

Aranka was involved with The Royal Regiment of Australian Artillery which preceded a transfer to RAEME. After a discharge from the reserves in 1993, Aranka now holds rank within the police force as a finance officer, again another job behind the scenes that ensures that others can do their jobs to the best of their abilities.

Aranka still assists with those in military service in addition to keeping in touch with her military companions. She has become the first female president of an RSL, her standing is held with the Clayton RSL Sub-branch.

This article is a testament to how every service man and women represents their country, the ideals they uphold, the example they set and those they inspire. Some may physically fight for us but they all protect us and all of them deserve our respect.

The Anzac Spirit drives our service men and women today, they are our inspiration and they are the reason for hope in one of the darkest times in Australian history. The ANZAC spirit is people, the people who fought, the ones who were lost, members of our family and friends. We carry on the ANZAC spirit within our lives, through the relationships we form, the people we meet and the Australia we represent through the choices that we make. Without our citizens, Australia is just land and our history is incomplete.

Aranka and RAEME uphold the ANZAC spirit every day. Aranka's voluntary and prestigious position, as the first female president of an RSL, is a testament to the ANZAC spirit and this is the future she has fought for. Aranka's involvement with the police force is another form of the ANZAC spirit. Whenever you do something in the name of justice, whenever you help another person and whenever you represent your country, it is showing the ANZAC spirit. The people who loved their country so much they fought the ultimate battle. We must not let our past define us for there is always the future for redemption and opportunity, but we must allow our past a voice as it will guide and shape us for a better future.

The ANZACS have shaped Australia more than they could have ever imagined at the time. Even when the war commenced on the 4th of August 1914, Australians chose to represent their country and assist an ally.



Even when they didn't have to, Australians voluntarily enlisted which showed their courage. The families back on the home front continued building Australia and New Zealand which showed perseverance. The war brought people together and still does. It is a symbol of Australian history and represents both the good and the bad.

HEALTH ISSUES

BLOOD PRESSURE:

WHAT IS BLOOD PRESSURE?

Blood pressure is the pressure of blood in the arteries as the heart pumps blood around the body. Blood pressure is normal. We all have it and need it to stay alive. Your blood pressure is always changing. When you are resting it is usually lower. It is often high during exercise and when you become angry or excited. Blood pressure can be measured by your GP. The result will have two numbers (e.g 120/90) The first (higher) number is the pressure when the heart actually beats and is called the systolic pressure. The second (lower) number is the pressure when the heart rests between beats and is called the diastolic pressure. Your doctor may take your blood pressure several times before deciding if your blood pressure is low, normal or high.

HERE IS A GUIDE TO BLOOD PRESSURE LEVELS IN ADULTS:

Normal -less than 140/90

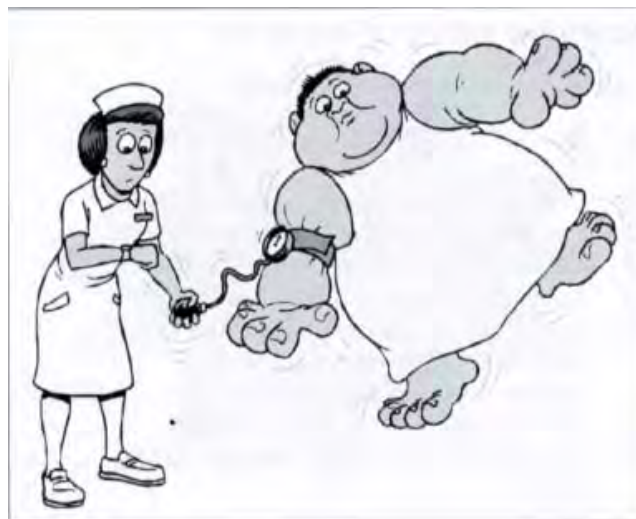
Borderline -between 140/90 and 160/95

High -more than 160/95

Very high -more than 180/110.

Blood pressure is normally lower in children and in women during pregnancy. Low blood pressure is generally not a problem. However, it sometimes can be a symptom of a medical problem. Your general practitioner will advise you. The medical term for high blood pressure is hypertension. About one in seven Australian adults have it. It increases your risk of heart disease, stroke and other heart problems. The causes of high blood pressure are often unknown. However lifestyle factors such as smoking, being overweight, your diet, alcohol and lack of exercise can increase your risk of high blood pressure.

High blood pressure rarely gives you any warning signs. The only way to know what First Edition
HEALTH ISSUES BLOOD PRESSURE: your blood pressure is, is to have it checked every two years, or more often if your GP advises you to.



WHAT CAN I DO TO CONTROL MY BLOOD PRESSURE?

- Eat less fat and salt
- Eat plenty of cereals, fruit, fish and vegetables
- Eat less red meat
- Stay a healthy weight
- Exercise for at least 30 minutes on most or every day of the week. If you like, the 30 minutes can be accumulated in shorter sessions of at least 10 minutes.
- Limit alcohol to two glasses per day or less
- If you are given tablets to control blood pressure, take them as prescribed
- Be a non-smoker
- Have your blood pressure checked every two years or as directed by your general practitioner.

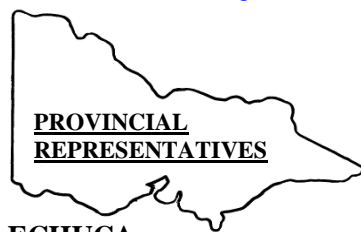
