During the month of February, we lost a most true gentleman in Doug Brazier, I was asked to say a few words on behalf of the Victorian RAEME Association at his funeral, and the following is a recap

Vale Douglas George Brazier

Douglas Brazier has been a stalwart and was an esteemed long-time serving Member of the RAEME Association (Vic) Inc.



Doug Brazier was one of three who experienced first-hand this new re-organisation and the birth of AEME. These three original "BLUEBELLS" arrived via very different routes but given the war situation at the time, they were decidedly underwhelmed by its birth. Doug's pathway to AEME began in 1942 when he in listed in the militia and was sent to Ordnance, as he was a carpenter by trade, where he was posted to 113th Brigade Workshop, and later that year he was deployed to Port Moresby via Queensland. Excerpt from the book With Skill and Fighting – the Craftsman of the Australian ARMY 1942-2014, it is written

"Doug recalls that he and his mates were impressed by the birth of the new Corps, and they liked the idea of their new individual title of Craftsman. But there was no time for celebration, they were just too busy."

Doug had been a member of the Victorian RAEME Association for a few decades.

Doug was awarded Life Membership of RAEME Association Vic in 1996.

Doug was awarded a Certificate of Cinematography in 2014 for his outstanding work in the recording of the history of events for the Victorian Association. His gentle nature and caring attitude are some of his attributes that induced respect for the man that he was.

It was extremely pleasing to see Doug at last year's ANZAC day service although not of good health was surrounded by his wonderful family that made sure he was going to enjoy the day.

The Victorian RAEME Association committee and members extends their deepest condolences to the Brazier family on the passing of this true gentleman.

It is with profound sadness and a heavy heart that we mourn the passing of 3103486 Staff Sergeant Barry Irons EM RFM on the 4th January 2016. Barry was a well-known identity in the Corps of Arty having served many years as a Recovery Mechanic and an Armament Artificer in both 15 Fd and 2/15 Fd Regiments. His latter years of service were with 3 EME Services Unit and 105 Field Workshop. The high esteem and respect that his military colleagues held for Barry was clearly evident by the many 'Craftsmen and Gunners' who paid homage by attending his funeral.

I first befriended Barry when he was a CEBS Leader (Church of England Boys Society) at All Saints Ch of Eng in Clayton in the late 1950's and it was also here that he met his wife Margaret. They were married in Daylesford on the 1st May 1965.

Barry was an apprentice Sheet Metal Worker/Panel Beater. However it was a trade not to his liking and he became a 'Painter and Auto Re-Finisher' – a skill in which he excelled and which also gave him 'job satisfaction'. He was employed by Dulux for the better part of his working life in their Automotive Section specialising in ducos/paints and later in their Research Section as a 'Trouble-shooter'. Barry was a profound reader – particularly Military History and Armaments, he enjoyed welding and had an interest in restoring old cars.

On the 3rd January 1959 Barry enlisted in the National Service – 20 NS Bn. On completion of his National Service training, he enlisted into the CMF on the 1st July 1960. He was posted to 15 Fd Regt LAD on the 6th September 1960 as a Cpl Recovery Mechanic.

As the OC of the LAD (Light Aid Detachment), I particularly re-call two memories where Barry's 'recovery' skills were brought to the fore. The first was during the Arty Group camp in Cultana (Sth Aust) in 1975 when an ambitious ARA Captain borrowed (?) an APC to go 'yabbing' on the very close shores of Spencer Gulf. The coastline was tidal and swampy to say the least and the APC became bogged. With a threatening high tide it took all of Barry's leadership and experience into the night (not to mention all hands from the LAD) to extract the vehicle and avoid an investigation and the submission of a very expensive and unexplainable L & D.

Secondly : The CO of 2/15 Fd Regt, Lt Col Graham Allinson planned a movement exercise for the Regiment over the Snowy High Plains during the first week of the 1977 annual camp. The CO's strategy was that if Barry could drive the Twin Boom Wrecker over the rough mountain terrain during the reconnaissance exercise then the Regiment could do it towing their 105 Pack Howitzers as a challenging diversion on their way to Pucka.

Barry accomplished the mission and the Regiment undertook one of the most daring (but exciting) exercises that I partook in during my eight years with Arty.

Barry served continuously for a total of over 24 years in Artillery for both 15 Fd Regt and 2/15 Fd Regt (after the Regiments merged in 1975). Initially he was a Cpl Recovery Mechanic during my stint but later qualified as an Armament Artificer.

As previously mentioned, one of Barry's interests was the study of weaponry and armament equipment. To this end he wrote some very detailed and comprehensively researched articles for 'Cascabel' – the Artillery Association Magazine - during the period 2010 through to 2014. These presentations included "The Origin of the 25 Pounder", a five part series on "The Development of the Tank", and "The History of Artillery of the Civil War".

Barry was a valuable asset to the LAD (later the TST). He was very proficient in the performance of his task and was always willing to help when there was work to be done outside his area of expertise. His knowledge of not only recovery techniques but also General Engineering (incl welding) and weaponry was an asset that he applied in a skilful manner. Barry's later contributions to the Regiment was as a qualified Armament Artificer. He was well respected by all members of the LAD and the Regiment and I held him in very high regard as an NCO. He reflected a friendly disposition and was a companion to all those who knew him.

In more recent times Barry was an active member of the Clayton R.S.L. He was on the Committee as the Historian and Memorabilia Officer and last year despite his illness, Barry was on the "Steering Committee" with Monash Health for an Exhibition dedicated to WW 1 Nurses, and his knowledge of researching and obtaining information was exceptional.

We were very proud to serve with him.

Douglas Brazier was born on 22 August, 1921 in Coburg, Victoria. He was educated at Coburg West Primary and Brunswick Technical Schools. In 1941 he received the 'British Institute of Carpenters best apprentice award then later was to become president of the institute. Employed at H. Parsons Joinery Works in Coburg with his Father who was Foreman wood-machinist, he completed his carpentry & joinery apprenticeship and worked on defence work. He trained with the 'Air Raid Precaution Unit' and 'St John Ambulance' and after hours did 'Toc H' work making hospital equipment.

In 1942 with the Japanese advancing rapidly towards Australia he volunteered and served in the Civilian Military Forces (CMF) from April to December, then the AIF from December 1942 to September 1946. He was 20 years of age and joined as Group 2, Carpenter. His unit was the 113th Independent Brigade Group Ordinance Workshops AAOC (Army Ordinance Corps) which was a mobile workshop unit.

He was sent to Bendigo for 6 weeks Infantry-training. Bombs had already fallen on Port Moresby, New Guinea, and the recent Coral-Sea battle (Warships and Aircraft) had temporally saved the Japanese occupation of Port Moresby.

He travelled north by train to Townsville and while waiting embarkation to Port Moresby his party loaded millions of sandbags for shipment due to wharf strikes at the time. Also, food dumps were established for Queensland Civilians in the event they were invaded by the Japanese.

He sailed aboard the H.M.T Swartenhondt to Port Moresby and arrived on 21st June. His first camp was established at '14 Mile' on the 'Rigo Road, Bootless Inlet'. Whilst air raid alerts became the norm day and night, imitation anti-aircraft Guns helped fool the enemy. He and his mates' battled diarrhoea and exhaustion caused through the lack of acclimatisation (blistering sun and torrential rain) as they worked from daylight to dusk 7 days per week on Kokoda Track equipment. Warm bully beef and dog-biscuits were a luxury.

On 1st December 1942, he saw his unit re-designated as 113th Australian Independent Brigade Group Workshop AEME. His 2nd camp was at Pit Street (adjacent to Bomana Cemetery). While there a Marauder aircraft crashed in to the camp. This camp was at the apex of airstrips, a dangerous position with ack ack fire and bomb run overshoots. Enemy night air raids were frequent. On 12th April 1943 during a daylight 100 plane raid 4 x 60kg Anti-Personal Bombs were dropped into the centre of the workshop area. Three key vehicles and their contents were destroyed and 6 personal were injured. A lucky escape for Doug.

The workshops were quickly moved to 'Pioneer Crossing, 8 Mile camp' on 13th April 1943. This was adjacent to Wards airstrip and here they experienced heavy ack ack during air raids.

On the 19th June, 1946 he saw his unit re-designated the 113th Australian Brigade Workshops AEME, AIF and a month later "Tradesmen became known as Craftsman".

After 18 months in Papua New Guinea Doug returned to Australia for 21 days home leave. Then followed re-training as infantry with the 7th Brigade on Atherton Tablelands, Queensland he sailed to Madang, New Guinea.

In Madang bayonets and shovels were used to clear the overgrown Siar Plantation. Humid, wet and muddy conditions required necessary drainage of the area and so it was 23 days before work could be accepted by his workshop. After 3 months of hard work and having crated stores and pre-fabricated kitchen and mess hut roof trusses Doug sailed to Bougainville in the Solomon Islands. He had been in active service areas in New Guinea for a period of 2 years.

On the 19th November, 1944 he arrived at Torokina, Bougainville and disembarked down cargo nets into barges for the journey ashore. The Torokina Perimeter was located near the entrance to the "Numa Numa Trail". The camp site was drained and cleared. From the ANZAC airstrip, fighter-protection was available while bombing Japanese held Rebaul. Also, New Zealand Corsair Aircraft observed Japanese activities in their very strong base in Buin in South Bougainville.

To contain the Japanese the AIF cleared the "Numa Numa" trail and then North Bougainville. Though the Japanese had plenty of Military equipment they were short of food, and crept out of their foxholes at night to try and steal food. Doug then crossed Empress Augusta Bay" by barge to land at Motupena Point, traveled in Convoy over the corduroy 'Buin Road' through crocodile infested swamps to cross the wooden Puriata River bridge. He arrived to camp on the Southern Eastern bank of the Puriata River.

Defence positions were installed and quickly manned, as the previous night the 10th Battery 4th Field Regiment had fired one of their seven 25 pounder guns point-blank at the Japanese around the market-garden clearing. Also, that night enemy patrols attacked the Puriata River Bridge behind them. They destroyed a section of that bridge.

Artillery were active as they cleared native vegetable-gardens of sweet potatoes, to enable tents and workshops to be erected and also for the erection of the pre-fabricated kitchen and mess hut. With Japanese forces in the vicinity booby-traps were set off. Guards were very alert and all personnel had guard duty every second night. Fire-flies and phosphorus lit up the jungle. Japanese split-toe jungle-footwear left footprints around the Bren-gun pits. All workshop sections were extremely busy.

On 15th August, 1945 Japan surrendered after the Atom bombs were dropped.

On 11th November, 1945 his unit was disbanded. Coupled with a De-Mobilisation Point System operating low priority personnel were transferred to other units. Some like Doug instructed at 'Torokina Rehabilitation Training Centre' in carpentry and joinery. On 30th November, 1945 the 113th Units ceased to exist after 1,363 Days Service. Splendid mate ship prevailed.

The 7th Brigade and 3rd Division had proved to be quite an efficient jungle fighting force. They included 57th/60th and 58th/59th Infantry Battalions. Doug said we all fought together and was a member of 57th/60th Battalion Association which was raised in the Preston area. Doug joined the AEME Association in 1951 and was a proud life member of the RAEME Association.

After receiving his discharge from the AIF in September 1946 Doug returned to work at H. Parson's Joinery Works. He married Thelma in 1949 and their son they named Rodney. After running his own joinery/carpentry business for 9 years and after 22 years in the building industry he then spent 22½ years as a Technical School teacher, retiring as a Senior Teacher in 1981. He retired at age 60 years. He enjoyed travelling with Thelma and also with friends and his hobbies included being a member of various Movie Clubs where he enjoyed making movies.

This hobby, Doug put to good use in recording many RAEME activities and his own Family history.

Thelma sadly passed away in 2001 and Doug continued to travel and make movies and shared them with family and friends. By this time he had 5 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren. In 2014 Doug's health deteriorated and he moved in to BlueCross The Boulevard, Mill Park.

Doug wrote the history of 113th Brigade Workshop AIF, AEME and contributed articles for the recently published 'With Skill and Fighting – Craftsman of the Royal Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers 1942 to 2014', book. In 2014 and 2015 he became involved with the Diamond Creek East Primary School where his great grandson Mitchell was a student. This was a great opportunity for him to be involved with family and able to do something constructive in the community, tell his war experiences and educate young people. He was involved in class discussions and interviewed along with other veterans and attended the ANZAC Day 2015 Commemorative Service for Diamond Creek Combined Schools as a VIP. Doug said that with his photo albums and along with involvement with the association he had been able to keep all of those memories alive and to share those experiences with others.

Doug passed away peacefully at The Boulevard, on Thursday, 25th February, 2016. He was 94. "Full of Years". He will be sadly missed by his Family and Friends.

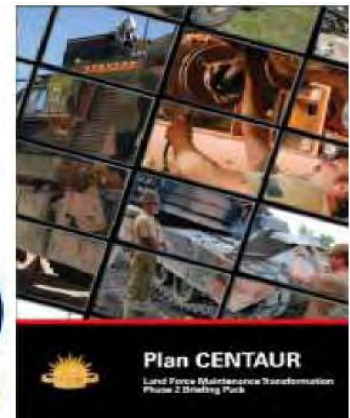

**Plan CENTAUR as it is a major initiative in regard to ARMY's future maintenance needs.
This overview is for your information.**

Plan CENTAUR (Phase 2)

Land Force Maintenance Transformation



Plan CENTAUR represents Army's approach to reform Land Maintenance to meet its future needs. Phase 2 provides the maintenance community an opportunity to work together to undertake a deep analysis of all major maintenance constraints. The end state will be improved maintenance effect on operation supported by the efficient sustainment of equipment in barracks.

Plan CENTAUR Phase 2 Overview

The Primary focus of Plan CENTAUR Phase 2 is the identification and elimination of maintenance issues and constraints that will impact the deployment, operation and sustainment of the Armoured Cavalry Regiment (ACR) within the Multi-Role Combat Brigade.

This will involve a detailed baseline analysis to better understand and quantify the issues, and the development of a comprehensive set of improvement initiatives with associated business cases ready for implementation.

The ultimate vision for Plan CENTAUR is to deliver improved maintenance effect on operation, supported by the efficient sustainment of equipment in barracks.

Programme Approach

Plan CENTAUR is a CONOPS focused, Army led and contractor supported Programme review of maintenance functions. KPMG has been engaged by Army as their partner to support the delivery of Plan CENTAUR.

The Programme will take a systematic and collaborative approach to address the root-cause of issues and drive a grass-roots challenge to existing structure, culture, doctrine and practices.

This will be followed by an intensive period of stakeholder collaboration in order to develop a comprehensive set of improvement initiatives, and agreed Programme of Work for implementation in Phase 3.

Timeline for Phase 2

Phase 2 commences in September 2016 with completion to be achieved by 31 August 2016.

What about the wider Combat Brigade?

The ACR within the Combat Brigade is the focus of Phase 2 analysis, however the outcomes are intended to be applicable to all maintenance organisations within Army with minor adjustment.

Will jobs be lost under Plan CENTAUR?

This is not a cost-savings activity, and overall workforce numbers will remain the same. Future operating requirements will be achieved by balancing maintenance capacity to asset.

The Team has developed a framework to quantitatively link operational availability with the vehicle fleet and maintenance labour inputs.

What does this mean for me?

Plan CENTAUR will remove obstacles affecting our ability to conduct maintenance, effectively streamlining the maintenance capability.

We seek your input and support for Phase 2 data collection and information gathering activities, such as surveys, workshops and including the provision of ongoing feedback throughout the Programme. This will deliver the optimal result for Army.
