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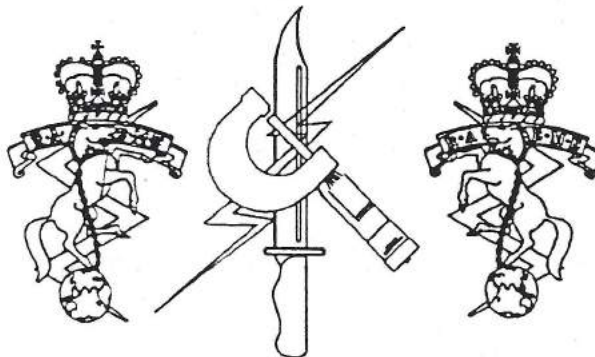
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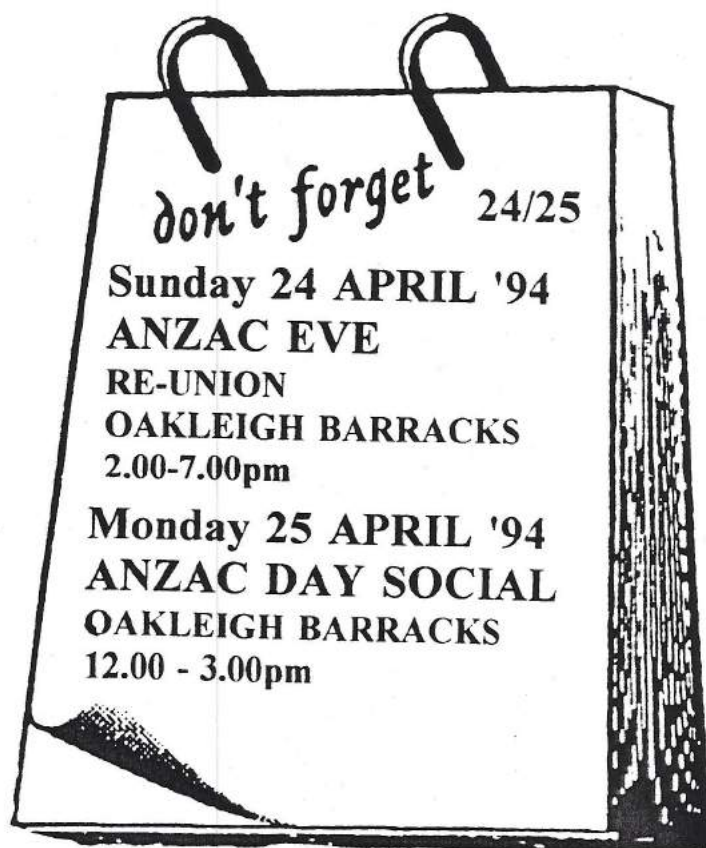
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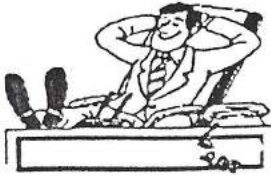

The reunion has been re-timed to make attendance more convenient for the 'elders' of the tribe. Some of the Associate members (close family) should be able to assist them with transport.

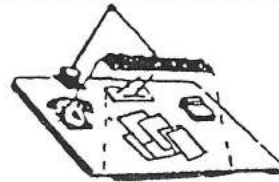

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## ADVERTISING OFFICER'S AND SENIOR NCO'S MESS FUNCTIONS

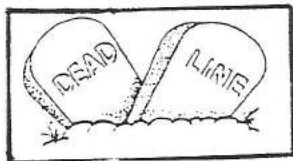

## SIMPSON AND HIS DONKEY



(Erected on the Western side of the Melbourne Shrine of Remembrance)

Pte. John Simpson is almost a legendary figure in the history of Australians at war. He was a man who, by his endless devotion to duty and deep compassion for the wounded, in the brief time allowed him, set a standard of unostentatiousness and self-sacrifice that has captured the imagination of all who have read of his deeds.

He was born John Simpson Kirkpatrick (he chose to enlist under the name of John Simpson), in County Durham, England on 6th July, 1892. He enlisted at Blackboy Hill Camp, Western Australia on 25th August, 1914, in the 3rd Australian Field Ambulance. Of a stocky build and the possessor of a carefree and cheerful nature, there was that touch of individualism which gave added colour to his qualities of kindness and courage. Passionately fond of animals - every dog was his friend in camp - he even managed to take a young possum with him on his trip to Egypt. It seemed quite right that he would later seek the assistance of an animal in his work of saving lives.

Simpson was the second man ashore from his boat at the landing at Gallipoli. The first and third men of "C" Bearer Section were killed. Because of the heavy casualties suffered by the section on that first day, and the loss of equipment, it has been suggested that this is the reason that Simpson got the idea of commandeering a small donkey to assist him on his errands of mercy. Various reasons have been given to explain the presence of these animals at ANZAC Cove - the carrying of water, the testing of water (as it is a well-known fact that donkeys will not drink impure or poisoned water), and even the highly coloured explanation that a number of them were to be turned loose with lighted faggots on their backs



and lanterns around their necks to frighten the superstitious Turks in the darkness. The most likely version is that put forward by members of the 16th Bn, Machine Gun Section, ie, that two donkeys were purchased by the Battalion at Lemnos for the purpose of carrying gear and ammunition. One of them, it is said, was recognised as being the donkey commandeered by Simpson.

Again, there is some confusion about the name of the donkey used by Simpson. "Murphy", "Duffy" and "Abdul", are three of the names by which the animal was known. It has been said that he operated with two donkeys. Simpson himself was known by various nicknames, one of which was "Murphy" - this no doubt, arising from the incorrect assessment of his accent. There are conflicting reports on the manner of his death and widely varied are the number of wounded men he reportedly brought to safety at the Dressing Station on the beach. None of these conflicting reports alter the fact that he was a supremely brave man motivated by no other desire than to assist his comrades when they were so desperately in need of help. The terrible conditions of those early days were such that, at a later date, blurred reports must inevitably have resulted. The main aspect on which all agreed, is that during the short period of his service on Gallopli, Simpson behaved with almost super-human bravery, carried a great many of his wounded comrades to safety and earned the admiration of all who saw him at work.

The shortage of bearers and equipment after that first day were so great that Simpson (Kirkpatrick), acquiring his small donkey, assumed a free hand and ran his own Casualty Clearing Service from Shrapnel Gully (later renamed Monash Valley), to the Beach Ambulance Stations for 25 days - he was killed on 19th May. He worked untiringly in his dedicated role, completely oblivious of the heavy Machine-Gun fire, bursting shrapnel and deadly sniping down the valley, administering to his comrades. He would give the slightly wounded man First Aid, loosen the equipment of a dying man, and for the leg wounds and those who had enough strength and presence of mind to hang on; he would carry on his donkey.

The profound impression he made on those who saw him at work is evident in the following extracts from the Official History of the War of 1914-18. Colonel A.G. Butler, the Medical Historian wrote: "A stretcher-bearer of the 3rd Field Ambulance, of quiet disposition, enlisted as "Simpson", had obtained a small donkey, and with this animal (known as "Duffy"), he for many hours daily traversed the valley, bringing down in this way an extraordinary number of cases. When warned of the extreme danger that he ran, he would always

reply "My troubles!". On May 19th, at the same spot as General Bridges, Simpson was shot through the heart. No plaque of bronze has marked his valour, but in the memory of his brief service he gained a monument more enduring. "Simpson" has been selected for mention because the quality of his courage and the nature of the service in which he lost his life are typical of those demanded of the stretcher-bearer, who must carry his case undeviatingly, without haste but without rest through long periods of exacting and dangerous toil. Conduct such as his, and the high standard set from the first in the rescue of wounded, gained for the stretcher-bearer what they desired - not a halo of sentimental eulogy, but the confidence of the men who fought and comradeship on terms of quality with them.

And Dr. C.E.W. Bean has this to say: "There was one bearer whose name has become a tradition in Australia. A number of donkeys with Greek drivers had been landed on April 25th for water-carrying. The Greeks were soon deported, and after the first days the donkeys ceased carrying and fed idly in the gullies till they gradually disappeared. Pte. Simpson of the 3rd Australian Field Ambulance, was seized with the idea that one of these might be more useful for moving men wounded in the leg. On the night of April 25th, he annexed a donkey, and each day, and half of every night, he worked continuously between the head of Monash Valley and the beach, his donkey carrying a brassard around its forehead and a wounded man on its back.

Simpson escaped death so many times that he was completely fatalistic; the deadly sniping down the valley and the furious shrapnel fire never stopped him. The Colonel of his Ambulance Station recognising the value of his work, allowed him to carry on as a completely separate unit. He camped with his donkey at the Indian mule camp, and had only to report once a day at the Field Ambulance. Presently, he annexed a second donkey. On May 19th, he went up the valley past the water-guard where he generally had his breakfast, but it was not ready. "Never mind", he called. "Get me a good dinner when I come back!".

He never came back. With two patients he was coming down the creek-bed when he was hit through the heart, both the wounded men being wounded again. He carried many scores of men down the valley, and had saved many lives at the cost of his own". Colonel (later General) John Monash, at that time Commanding Officer of the 4th Brigade, in a letter dated

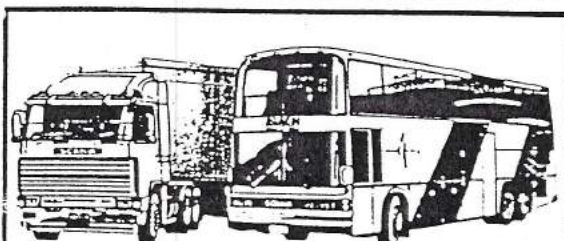


20th May, 1915, to HQ New Zealand and Australian Division, wrote as follows: "I desire to bring under special notice for favour of transmission to the proper authority, the case of Pte. Simpson, stated to belonging to "C" Section of the 3rd Field Ambulance. This man has been working in this valley since 26th April, in collecting the wounded, and carrying them to the Dressing Stations. He has a small donkey, which he used to carry all cases unable to walk.

Pte. Simpson and his little beast earned the admiration of everyone at the upper end of the valley. They worked all day and night through-out the whole period since landing and the help rendered to the wounded was invaluable. Simpson knew no fear and moved unconcernedly amid shrapnel and rifle fire, steadily carrying out his self-imposed task day by day, and he frequently earned the applause of the personnel for his many fearless rescues of wounded men from areas subject to shrapnel fire.

Simpson and his donkey were yesterday killed by shrapnel fire and inquiry then elicited that he belonged to some of the A.A.M.C. units with this Brigade, but had become separated from his own unit, and had carried on his perilous work on his own initiative." The story of Simpson is to a large extent the story of all stretcher-bearers, unsustained by the hot-blooded heroism shown by men in all violent action; unable to retaliate, with only the often meagre protection afforded by a Red Cross flag, these men calmly exposed their lives to danger to save their comrades and so built up the tradition of unselfishness and cool courage that is a feature of their service.

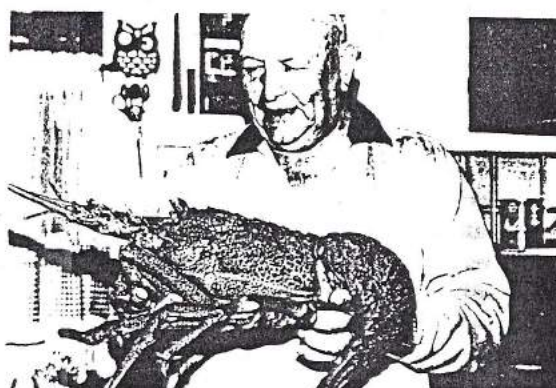

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## Member's Profile



### Harold William CHAMBERLAIN

Born 24th October, 1910 at Sandstone Western Australia. In 1915 the family moved to Gardenvale (Vic), then when Harold's father enlisted in WW1 the family moved in with relations at Werribee.

Whilst residing in Werribee, Harold became an ardent Geelong supporter, and soon commenced a distinctive Geelong District League football career for himself between 1929-51. In 1932, in the match between Werribee v I.N.F. he kicked 6 goals in the Grand Final for Werribee. In another game for Werribee v Bacchus Marsh at Chirnside Park, he and a John Daniel O'Brien kicked 15 goals between them out of Werribee's total of 25 goals. In 1933, he was invited to train at Carlton, but he chose to play with Traralgon. On 6 Oct 1951 was called upon to replace the existing Timekeeper in the S.A. National Football League, the game being played was Geelong v Port Adelaide..

On 28th July, 1934 at Werribee, Harold married his lovely wife Gladys and during their marriage were blessed with two daughters, Marli and Jillian.

On 12th January 1940, he enlisted in the Australian Army at the Melbourne Town Hall, saw service with 3rd Military District Infantry Battalion at Lysterfield, Drysdale and Watsonia as a Bren-Gun Carrier driver and in the transport pool. Whilst at Watsonia he transferred to 113 Australian Brigade Wksp as a transport driver. He saw service in New Guinea around the Port Moresby area at sites known as Pitts Street and Pioneer Crossing, from 12th December, 1943-24th December 1944. (Serving also in the same unit at the same time, was another of our members, Doug Brazier). Harold was discharged on 1st January, 1945 on



his return to Australia.

His first employment after being demobbed was with Creso Fertilizers, Geelong as an Assistant Engineer, building towers to remove the Nitric Acid from the Sulphur burners.

In 1945 he joined the ranks of taxi drivers with Embassy Taxis becoming a Foundation Member and Director of that company. Many celebrities were driven around Melbourne by Harold, including the late film actor and comedian, Danny Kaye, the world renown concert pianist Jose Iturbi and little 'MO' Connolly the tennis star just to name a few. Whilst a member of the Victorian Government Motor Pool in 1956, he was the chauffeur for the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester and many Parliamentarians.

In 1960, due to poor health, Harold left Embassy Taxis. He was the personal driver for the late John Dixon, Managing Director of Kia Ora products between 1960-80 before permanently retired. He was also the personal driver for Sir Maurice Natham, when he was Mayor of the City of Melbourne.

In 1956, Harold joined the old AEME Assn, whose Office Bearers at the time were, Norm Thompson President, Les McCoubrie Vice President and Alex Cram as the Secretary. In 1960, he was given a Life Membership.

## REUNION

### 50TH YEAR JUBILEE RE-UNION RADAR MECHANICS COURSES No.'s 26 & 27

On 26th Apr 1943, thirty servicemen commenced a Radio Physics course at the Sydney Technical College. Three hours Theory in the morning, three hours Practical in the afternoon and three hours private study back in camp at Randwick Racecourse in the evening.

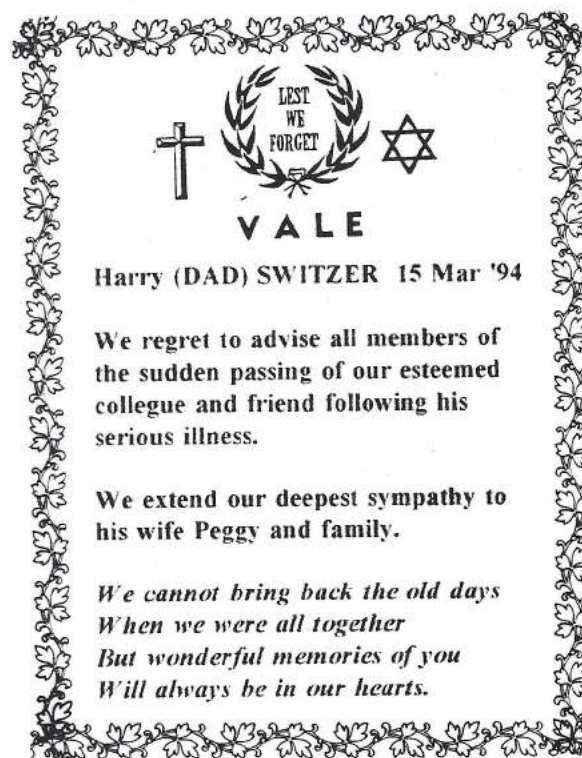
Most members of the course were from N.S.W., with only 4 from Victoria. Several had seen service overseas or in Darwin. Those who were successful, commenced Radar Mechanics courses at Ingleburn on 1st Nov 1943. Course No. 26 was on AC and DC, Course No. 27 was on GI and Searchlights.

Small 'Get-Togethers' commenced in 1976 when one of the craftsmen retired. On 2nd May 1993, a 50th Year Jubilee Re-union occurred at the home of Bruce Coy in Kanahooks (South of Wollongong, N.S.W.). All but one of the original 30 have now been accounted for. Some did not return from WW2, and some have since died.

Fifteen, accompanied by their wives, attended the Re-union. Each was asked to briefly outline his life story since his posting in late Jan 1943. This was video taped and each member later received a copy. As many had not seen or heard of each other for 50 years, some stories were most interesting and fascinating.

A small Re-union was held in Aug 1993 to complete the taping and a big effort is planned to meet again in Feb 1994 at Mittagong (N.S.W.).

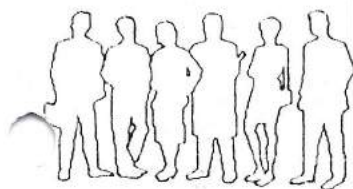


## SICK PARADE....

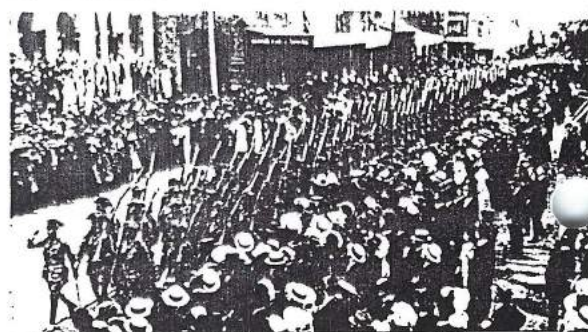

## AMENDMENTS

Rule 2.(1)

**Delete** sentence beginning "**Special Member** " in its entirety.

**Insert** "Special Member", means a member in need as determined by the committee.  
"Associate Member", means an Associate member of the association.

**Insert new rule.**

3A.(1) A person over the age of 18 and of the immediate family of a member (or a deceased member) who meets the requirements of Rule 3.(1) and is nominated and approved in accordance with these rules is eligible to be an Associate Member of the Association on payment of the prescribed annual subscriptions payable under these rules.

3A.(2) An Associate Member shall have the same rights and privileges and be subject to the same rules as a member, **EXCEPT THAT** an Associate Member may not serve on the Committee of Management, nominate a person for the Committee of Management, or vote at a General Meeting.

**Delete Rule 35 in its entirety and insert:-**

35.A. The organisation shall be dissolved in the event of membership of less than four (4) persons or upon the vote of a 3/4th majority of members present at a "Special General Meeting" convened to consider such question.

B. Upon the resolution being passed in accordance with paragraph "A" of this rule, all assets and funds of the organisation?association an hand shall, after the payment of all expenses and liabilities, be handed over to such registered or exempted charity (or charities/ Association) as a simple majority of the members at a "Special General Meeting" so convened, or a subsequent "Special General Meeting" may decide.
