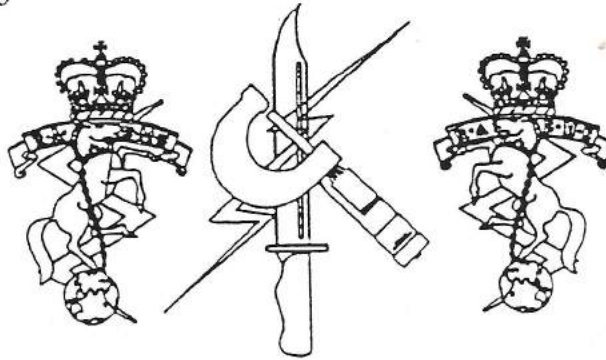

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LEST WE FORGET...

As the Last Post /Reveille is again sounded throughout Australia we commemorate the 80th Anniversary of the first ANZAC Day, 25 April, 1915.

ANZAC Day is our national day of Remembrance when we recall the service and deaths of so many Australian servicemen and women, not only in the First World War, but in so many conflicts since; 1939-45 War, Korea, Borneo, Malaya and Vietnam, and now our Peacemakers in the Middle East, Cambodia and Somalia.

Gallipoli is the place that calls to mind the deeds of young men who showed incredible heroism, and who made great sacrifices. Who will ever forget the images put before us in the films that depict these young men leaping out of the trenches to face an inevitable death?

What we remember is that they were Australian they were brave, they were acting for others.

At 3.am on Sunday 25th April, 1915, the ANZACS boarded small boats which were towed ashore. At 4.30am these landing boats reached the coast-line and 4,000 Australian and New Zealand soldiers came ashore. They were followed that day by 17,000 more soldiers. They had been landed at the wrong place. They came under constant gunfire from the Turkish soldiers. The fighting was fierce. It was dark. It was raining heavily. It was a day of failure against terrific odds.

WHAT DID IT ACCOMPLISH? It helped to consolidate the men from Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria, Tasmania, South and Western Australia into an Australian unit. It helped develop comradeship.

It demonstrated that these young men were convinced that it was worth dying for the Australian nation and freedom from oppression. It gave an example to all Australians to stand together in tragedy and trouble.

The battle continued for eight months until 19th December when the last troops were withdrawn under cover of darkness. 10,000 Australian and new Zealanders' had lost their lives.

But in the fighting they showed incredible bravery. They won a total of 1,507 Awards for bravery; of which 28 Victoria Crosses, 216 Distinguish Conduct Medals, 354 Military Crosses and 719 Distinguish Service Orders were awarded.

ANZAC Day was observed for the first time on 25th April 1916. People had a vague idea that Australia had earned nationhood by bloodshed in this war - a nation based on HONOUR, COURAGE and HEROISM.

Merely remembering those who died is a useless exercise unless the remembering urges us to do something - we are urged to imitate their courage and carry on their patriotism.

ANZAC Day has a special significance this year. It is the 80th Anniversary of the heroic recapture by Australian soldiers of the township of Villers-Bretonneux, a small village about 65 miles due North of Paris. The people of Picardy have been saying:

"N'oub-lions jamais l'Australie" - Let us never forget Australia - ever since.

In March 1918, the giant German Army was ready to split the British and French Armies at Amiens, and win the war. Success at Amiens, for which Villers-Bretonneux was the main shield, would have seen the British Army outflanked.

A massive assault by the Germans pushed the

British back. Casualties in the first two weeks on the battlefield of the Somme for both sides were just on 500,000.

The Germans took Villers-Bretonneux on 24th April 1918. But the 13th and 15th Brigades of the Australian 5th Division took part in a night attack to recapture the town. In a display of raw nerve, courage and ferocity, the young Australians charged and overwhelmed the enemy in half an hour. This charge of the 15th Brigade is ranked with the Gallipoli landing and the assault on Mont St. Quentin as the bravest in the experience of Australian Infantry.

This was a great Australian victory which will never be forgotten in Villers-Bretonneux. The price was high - 1,200 Australians were dead. Villers-Bretonneux is the site of the Australian War Memorial in France. The town was one of the launching pads that won the war for the Allies.

We remember the Gallipoli failure and the bravery shown. Let us also remember the success at Villers-Bretonneux and the similar bravery shown there. The people of Villers-Bretonneux have not forgotten. *LEST WE FORGET.*

May all those who lost their lives in the service of their country, rest in the peace of the Lord.

great to keep in touch with these Associations especially as this year is the celebration of the 50th year of the Cessation of the 2nd W.W., hopefully we can continue being of service to them for many years to come.

It would also be nice if all other AEME/RAEME unit Associations attempted to keep in touch and inform us of their progress or items that could be of interest to all members as, within the Association you find people who have been attached to all of those units/Associations and with this in mind, we would be pleased to include in "THE LIGHTNING FLASH" any story relating to those units that would be of interest to all our members. It does not matter to us if the Associations do not want to take part in our functions or in fact, be considered as an Associate Member, but indeed, we are interested in their history and current matters. So come on, we invite you to contact the Editor who will be pleased to give you space in coming editions of our Newsletter, let us hear from you.

Now for a matter that must be corrected by me, at the recent Special General Meeting, a question was directed at the Chair in relation to who will administer the 'Patriotic Benevolent Fund' if we are appointing Association Trustees.

Believe it or not, I knew the answer but failed to give it in the correct manner, I now advise the following, correcting my statement, then, at the same time: offer a little piece of history relating to our Fund.

When we were Incorporated on 4th August 1991, any Trustees that this Association had in place for the administration of the Patriotic Fund were no longer recognised by the Patriotic Funds Council, (Victoria.)

At that particular time, the Committee of Management were not aware of their responsibility towards this Fund and that administration of the Fund needed to be changed as it had always been kept away from the Association, unless you had been selected to be a Trustee of this Fund, you would never have been involved in knowing how the Fund operated; certainly the Committee was in the dark relating to this Fund and had been for many years.

Trustees at that time were appointed in accordance with the Rules of the Patriotic Funds Council Act 1958, (prior to us being

Incorporated on 4th August 1991.)

- (a) At the time that the former Association was founded in 1945, the Federal body set up a Fund for members of AEME. Trustees were then appointed primarily by that existing Association, we believe this was the Federal body, with the Fund being named "The Australian Electrical Mechanical Engineers Prisoners of War & Dependants Welfare Fund.

This happened on 14th June 1946, then when the Objects of that Fund were completed, all remaining funds were transferred to a new Fund known as, "The Victorian Division of the Corps of Australian Electrical & Mechanical Engineers Association" approval being granted on 5th August 1947, to raise this Fund. The only other changes since being in title change only, which was the correct procedure by our predecessors.

- (b) After appointing the original Trustees and when they could no longer continue in that role, on leaving the Trust, they were replaced internally by the remaining Trustees who had the power to appoint new Trustees. (Rule s41 of the Trustees Act, provides in the case as mentioned, new Trustees must be appointed in writing by the existing Trustees.) The administration was a closed internal matter and they did not legally need to advise the Association Committee of matters relating to the Fund as they were the Administering Arm in this instance.

Now to the present time, as mentioned earlier when we decided to be Incorporated on 4th August 1991, a letter was written to the Patriotic Funds Council (Victoria) by the current Trustees advising them that we had Incorporated and would they reflect the new changes in relation to the Incorporation Act.

On the Trustees receiving a reply from the Patriotic Funds Council (Victoria), they were officially advised that the name had been altered to reflect the Association (and I offer an extract of that letter.)

"The Council recognises The Royal Australian Electrical & Mechanical Engineers Association (Victoria) Inc. as a "Person" for the purposes of the Patriotic Funds Act 1959." Dated 20 Sept 1961."

Not realising that this had occurred, as this correspondence was directed to the Trustees at the time and this Association was not advised accordingly by them, that the Association was from that time

reflected as the "Person" for the administration of the fund.

As several complaints in the past had been directed to me from members in relation to the lack of information passed to members relating to the Fund I, as Secretary at the time; was directed by the Committee of Management to speak to the Secretary of the Patriotic Funds Council (Victoria.)

This was done over a period of time and we were informed that any appointed Trustees from the previous Association were no longer recognised by them but the Incorporated Association was considered as the "Person" responsible. (The interpretation under an Act of Parliament being and meaning the Executive Committee in our case.)

So, the outcome is, since 1991 the Administrators of the Fund should have been the Association (not other Trustees). The matter in your interest is now clear, that the administration of this Fund will be carried out by the Association and its Executive Committee (who are considered Directors for the purpose of the Trustees Act).

I now apologise for misleading the members with my statement at our recent Special General Meeting the short answer is:

The newly appointed Trustees WILL NOT administer that Fund, but will oversee, that the Executive Committee WHO WILL ADMINISTER the Fund, are acting in accordance with the Rules in relation to our Patriotic Benevolent Fund, attending to all matters in accordance with all Acts or Rules that relate to this or any other Fund held by the Association.

I hope this long explanation clears your questions in relation to the Fund.

Hoping to see you all ANZAC Eve, read on for all Social information.

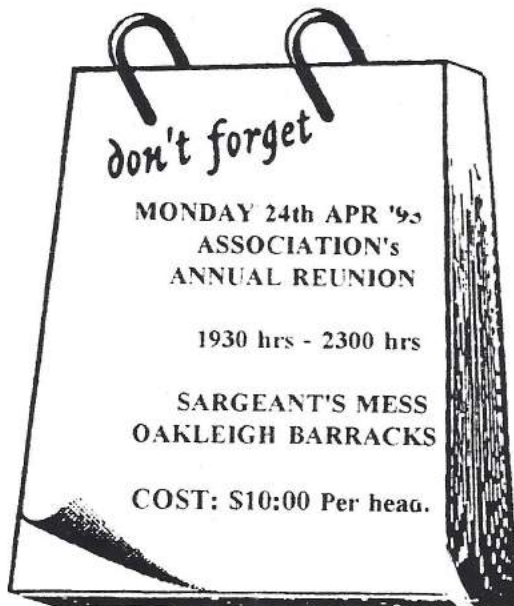

Geoffrey S. MAGGS
(Life Member)

He was born in Dandenong on 20th September 1916, educated at Carnegie State School, Dandenong High School & Caulfield Grammar School.

He started work with his parents in Dandenong in 1931 as a Truck/Farm Motor Mechanic.

In 1933, he initially joined 2nd Field Squadron RAE at Alexandra Gardens, Melbourne as a Junior Farrier (Cadet) and issued with Army No. 51616. Later he transferred to 2nd Field Squadron as a Sapper in 1936.

In 1938, he went to England to complete a course as a Journeyman Engineer, (also to pass Ironmongery exams) with Lister & Co, Bramfords, Ruston & Hornsby Engineering Coys, Steel & Iron courses with Sheffield Eclipse and Imperial Steel Works.

Whilst employed as a Journeyman, his duties included manufacture and installation of Dairy Machine products, also building Army tanks from plans to testing and installation of engines in trawlers (which were also Minelayers in the North Sea.)

With W.W. 2 about to start, Geoff tried to enlist in a Motor Regiment in Aberdeen, Scotland but was refused because he already had, as he believed, a commitment in the Australian Army. He made his way to South Hampton and eventually managed to be signed on the "Esperance Bay" as an Engine Room Attendant - passenger.


Arriving back in Melbourne, Geoff found

himself in Ordnance Corps at Powlett Street as a Drill Instructor. Later he was sent to the Ordnance Wksp at Mob Siding, Seymour. he also saw service with 100 LAD at Gnarpert (Western District), 4th Army Field Workshops at Cranbourne Race Course, 2nd Light Workshop and then with 1st Australian Infantry Troops Workshop where he saw service in New Britain.

In 1941, Geoff and his wife Nancy, were married and raised a family of 4 girls and 2 boys, setting up the family home in Ormond.

In 1945, he joined the AEME Assn (as it was then known) and has served on various Committees to the present date. Nancy his wife, was stalwart in supporting Geoff's involvement on Committees, and was especially active in the catering area at Chapel Street Depot at many of the Association's functions.

Geoff was elected Vice President of the AEME Assn from 15.3.70 to 24.4.75. President from 24.4.76 to 24.4.90. Has represented the AEME Assn at many RAEME Corps Committee Meetings (Southern Region). In recognition of his dedication to the AEME Assn he was made a Life Member of the AEME Assn on 24.4.82.

We are the survivors. Consider the changes we have witnessed: we were born before television, before penicillin, before polio shots, frozen foods, Xerox, contact lenses, frisbees and the pill. We were before radar, credit cards, laser beams and all ballpoint pens: before pantihose, dishwashers, clothes dryers, electric blankets, air conditioners, drip dry clothing and before man walked on the moon.

We got married first and then lived together. How quaint can you be!! We were before house-husbands, gay rights, computer dating, dual careers and computer marriages. We were before day care centres, group therapy and nursing homes. We never heard of FM radio, tape decks, Walkmans, electric typewriters, artificial hearts, word processors, yoghurt and blokes wear earrings. John LEE reports...

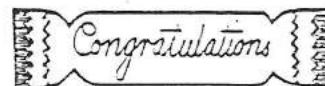

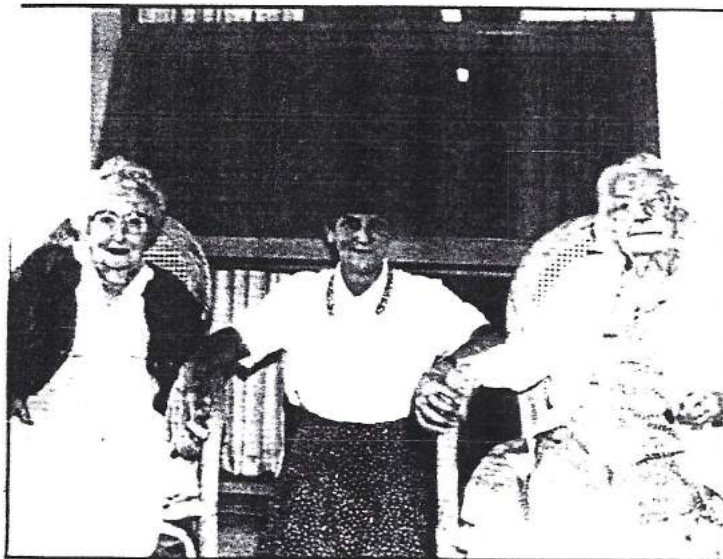
Dear Jack,


'VE' DAY COMMEMORATIVE SERVICE - 8 MAY 1995

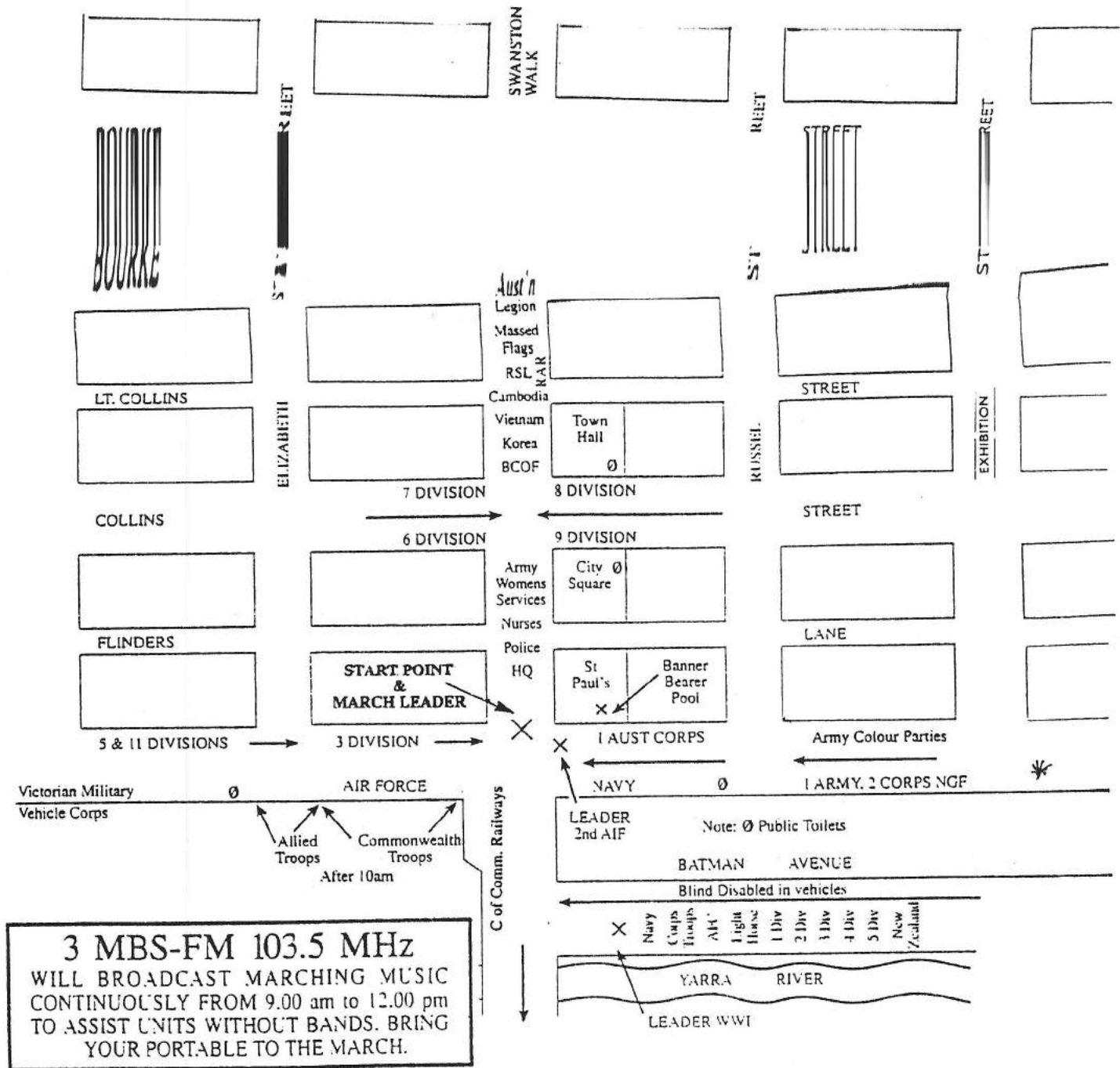

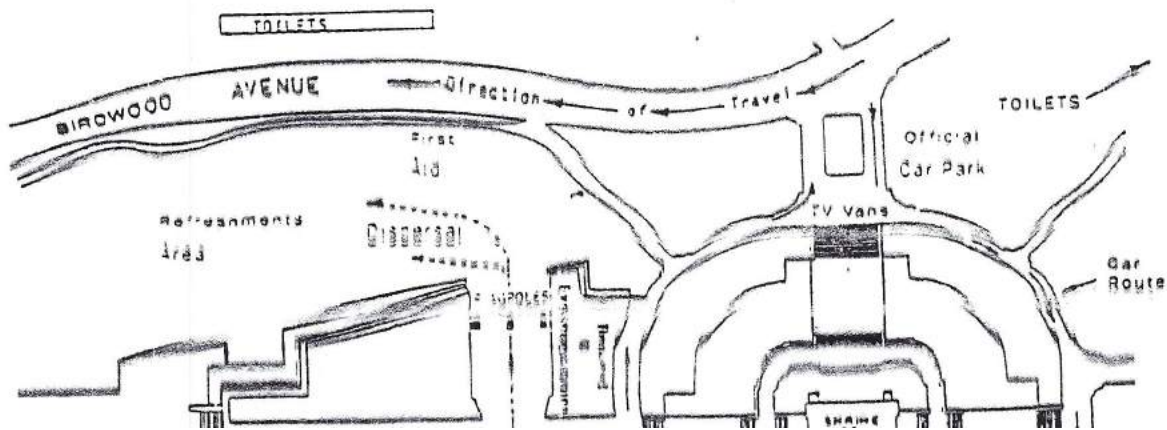

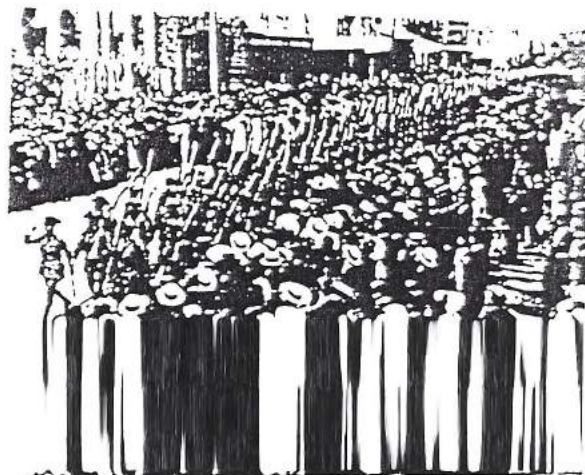
