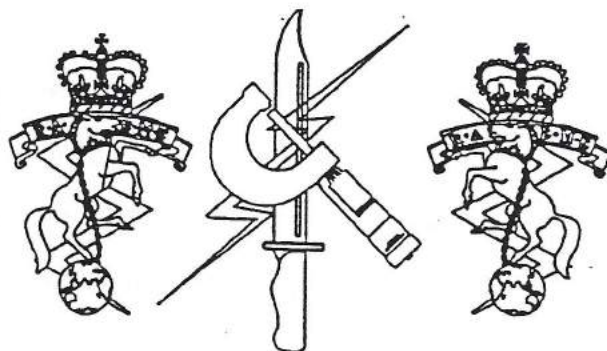

**WELCOME TO THE AUGUST ISSUE OF
THE "LIGHTNING FLASH."**

In this note to you all there are several points I would like to offer an overview of. Firstly, it was great to once again, have so many members attend:

All in all, a good time was held by all.

ANZAC EVE, Once again the night had good support, the focal point this year was two fold. Firstly, Dennis Clarke presented the Association with an Australian Flag, (on loan from the RAEME Vietnam Association) one of six that the RAEME Vietnam Association were presented with from fund raising towards their memorial now in place in Canberra. Our Secretary, Jack Westernhagen was the proud recipient of the Australian Flag on behalf of the Association. Then at the March in Melbourne, it was proudly paraded by Mike King, (Vietnam Vet), the flag will be mounted at the Barracks.

Then, as part of the official activities at the Reunion, your Committee decided some time ago that the recovered "HQ CRAEME 3 Div RSM's Pace Stick", (initially presented to the late WO1 Allan Regan, the first recipient), by Brig J.C. Bendell CBE, then DEME; during HQ CRAEME 3 Div 1970 Annual camp at Site 6, Scrub Hill, Puckapunyal, should be suitably mounted and preserved towards the memory of this gallant soldier.

The RSM's Pace Stick was named in a gesture of respect towards the memory of the late Lt. (Prob) John Carruthers, a former CMF member of the 112th Inf Wksp, Chapel Street East St. Kilda, who later enlisted in the ARA and was a former graduate of the Officer Cadet School, Portsea, Victoria.

Six RAEME soldiers have Died on Active Service as a result of their service in Vietnam. Amongst those six was Lt. John Carruthers M.I.D. (Seconded to the 5th

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Royal Australian Regiment).

Brig Conrad Ermert, at the request of the Committee, agreed to unveil this Memorial, and in doing so, read from the Citation relating to the brave actions that Lt. John Carruthers had performed whilst in action. Some of that script follows:

"Lt. John Carruthers, whilst on patrol was wounded in a small village of DUC MY, Province of Phuoc Tuy, South Vietnam, although wounded he continued on with his action without considering the danger he was obviously in, this continued action emanating in his death"

His action earned Lt. John Carruthers, the honour of being Mentioned in Despatches (MID).

The Pace Stick and replica of his Service Medals are now on view on the South wall outside of the Sergeants' Mess, Oakleigh Barracks. (The Pace Stick was placed in the care of the Association at the closure of the Chapel Street RAEME Sergeants' Mess.) A point of interest that all RAEME Association and serving members of RAEME should be proud of.

The night then continued on as it has in past years, although we seem to hit the sack a little earlier now days - except for a few stayers who will not go to bed until the Port that seems to appear after the Bar closes is consumed in an orderly manner.

DAWN SERVICE - The Dawn Service held at Oakleigh Barracks and then the March was also well attended, with our bus not causing any problems this year. Well thank you for that. Just goes to prove what we organise ourselves works!!!

Again at the March this year we were approached by old AEME Diggers to find out how to join this Association, at the same time a number of Vietnam Vets also approached the Association. It is nice to know that our numbers, although the Association celebrates 50 years this year (December) continues to grow, we are currently working through a project to obtain the names of those Victorian's or RAEME members - serving and non-serving - who have been involved in other conflicts since Vietnam. This project has been put to us by our good friend and member, Murray Lewis (Vietnam Vet).

Numbers at the March was similar to past years, although we continue to have increases in the number of members wanting the services of the vehicles made available to transport those who no longer have the ability to march the distance to the Shrine.

After the March, and back at Oakleigh Barracks, many members returned for the afternoon and reminisce with many old mates from years gone by, it was also good to see many RAEME Vietnam Assn members also come for lunch and enjoy the hospitality of the Barracks.

You supported ANZAC EVE and DAY well, but indeed we need you to support us at other times as well.

COMING UP:- are 3 MAJOR FUNCTIONS, our Widows and Life Members' Day in August, our REMEMBRANCE DAY & DEDICATION DAY, 11th November '95 (Saturday), then our 50th Birthday in December '95. We have given you "HEAPS" of notice as all functions continue to be listed in all issued of the "Lightning Flash".

SO WHAT ABOUT IT??? Support your hard working Committee and attend these functions, don't let us have to continue cancelling functions through the lack of support as it does become very frustrating, not only to the Committee, but also the inconvenience caused to those members who do support functions.

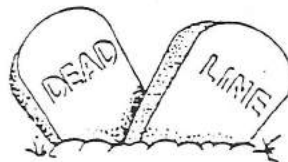

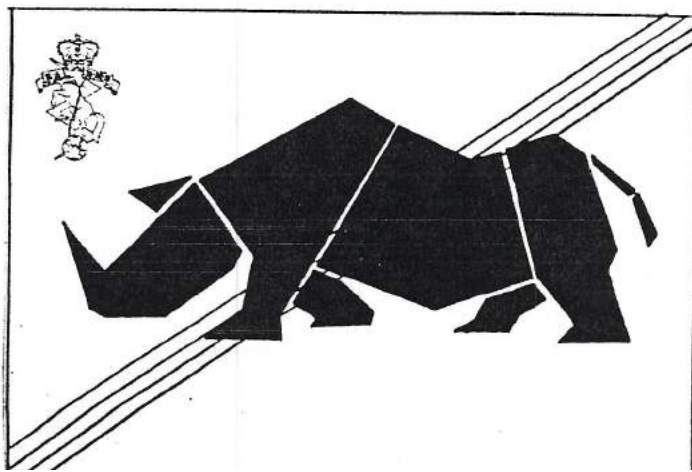

1995 looks to being a very eventful time for all Australians. As part of the "Australia Remembers 1945-1995 Program", your Editorial Sub-Committee have decided to dedicate this issue of "The Flash" in recognition of this Program. Throughout this April edition, there will appear many interesting items of years gone by that would bring back a familiar era to many of our readers.

AUSTRALIA REMEMBERS 1945-1995

Australia Remembers 1945-1995 commemorates the 50th Anniversary of the end of World War II.

The Objectives of the Program are:-

- * To thank the veterans who fought in World War II.
- * To recognise the widows and children of those who died.
- * To remember all who kept the home front running.
- * To recreate the joy at the end of the war in 1945.
- * To educate the nation about World War II.



STORY BEHIND THE LOGO

The Australia Remembers logo is in great demand around Australia. The logo was carefully selected to reflect the Australia Remembers theme.

It represents the sacrifice of veterans who served in the War and the Australians who kept the home front running. Centre piece of the logo is a returning soldier being embraced by his wife, son and daughter joyful at his return.

The soldier represents all veterans. The wife reflects those who stayed at home, and the children are indicative of the young Australians who benefited from the sacrifices of the veterans and the efforts of Australians who remained at home and who were to become the Australians of the future.

Every family in Australia has been touched in some way by WW II as was the Walsh family who feature on the Australia Remembers 1945-1995 logo.

The story of Ray and Varlie Walsh and their children is evocative of many thousands of Australian families who had their lives interrupted by war in 1939.

Patrick Anthony Raphael Walsh (known as Ray) enlisted on 15 December 1939 and joined the 6th Division AIF. Following service in Egypt, he fought with the 2/1st Fd Coy RAE, 6th Division in Greece from March 1941 and was captured in Crete on 1 June 1941.

For five months, Varlie and their then five children, Arthur, Jim, Irene, Jeannette and Barry did not know if Ray was alive. Ray was liberated by the Allies on 1st May 1945. He was debriefed in the UK before arriving in Sydney on 28th July 1945, where his family rushed to welcome him at Victoria Barracks.

An official Army Photographer snapped Sapper Ray Walsh in the embrace of his wife Varlie and their two youngest children, Barry and Jeannett.

That photograph is now a symbol of the commemorative year.

This short story is in honour of the women who served AEME during WW 2.

We continue to talk about the endeavours of many male units in AEME/RAEME, but importantly as it has often been said to me, why don't we say something about the women who served in AEME during WW 2.

Well did you know, A.W.A.S. soldiers did serve with AEME units all around Australia???

The Australian Women's Army Service (A.W.A.S.) began in August 1941, and there was no shortage of recruits. Women were recruited in all Commands, with the following trades being available:-

Wireless, Telegraphist, Draughtswomen, Clerk, Cook, Stenographer, Seamstress, Drivers, Typist, Clerical Assistant, Telephonist, Waitress and Orderly.

As the war progressed, trades expanded for them, Armourers, Electricians, Ack Ack & Searchlight, Fitters Instrument, Machinists Metal and Painters.

By 1946 they were serving in Area Workshops, Vehicle Park Workshops, Watercraft Workshops, Advance Workshops, as well as Armoury Workshops, Wireless & Signals Sections, Recovery Sections, Tank and Radar Workshop Sections and many more.

It would appear that the majority of women were

employed in Clerical roles although there were some Craftswomen. They wore colour patches of the unit or Corps to which they were attached.

A.W.A.S. members could not be sent outside of Australia initially, but in 1945, this rule was relaxed and from then on, some women were posted to New Guinea. The A.W.A.S. were disbanded in July 1947.

One wonders why our Association has not encouraged these ladies to join us as we did with the W.R.A.A.C. (Women's Royal Australian Army Corps), during the 60's and 70's.

We do have one known A.W.A.S. lady, Elizabeth

Coldicott who is a member. (Look for her profile in the November edition of "The Flash".) It would be nice, if you know any ladies who serve with A.E.M.E. during the war, to encourage them to become members of the Association as well, even though they may be members of their own A.W.A.S. Association.

These ladies are entitled to Full membership of this Association as well as their immediate family being able to join as Associate Members.

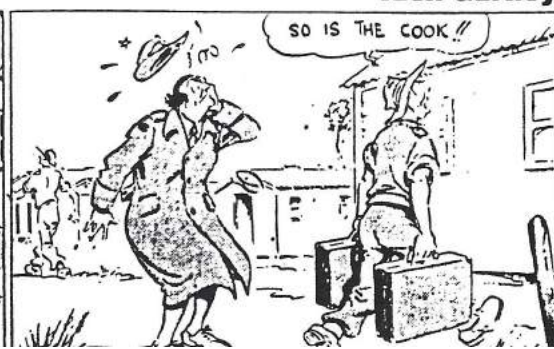

"THE STORY OF RAEME

by Theo Barker

CRAFTSMEN OF THE ARMY

— The Story of
RAEME

(Published in 1992)



The following notes are an extract from the above publication. The book is currently available from the Corps Shop (or from the Secretary).

It was of interest for me to read the following extracts as they relate to Associations still active in our State, all of them still proudly parading their unit Banner at various times of the year.

QUOTE. In 1939, Australian planners assumed that the A.I.F. would carry its own 1st and 2nd Line work while RAAOC units took the 3rd and 4th Line Repairs. The first A.I.F. Ordnance Workshop formed under this system was the 2/1st Adv Fd Wksp (under Lt Col C.A. Geyton) was raised in November and December 1939. It included 1, 2, and 3 Recovery Sections and 6 LADs

which, together with the main Wksp, were staffed from all States. The unit sailed in two drafts, the first under Capt F.W. Stratham (1 Recovery Section), embarked January 11th 1940, arrived in the Middle East and established itself at Quastina in Palestine.

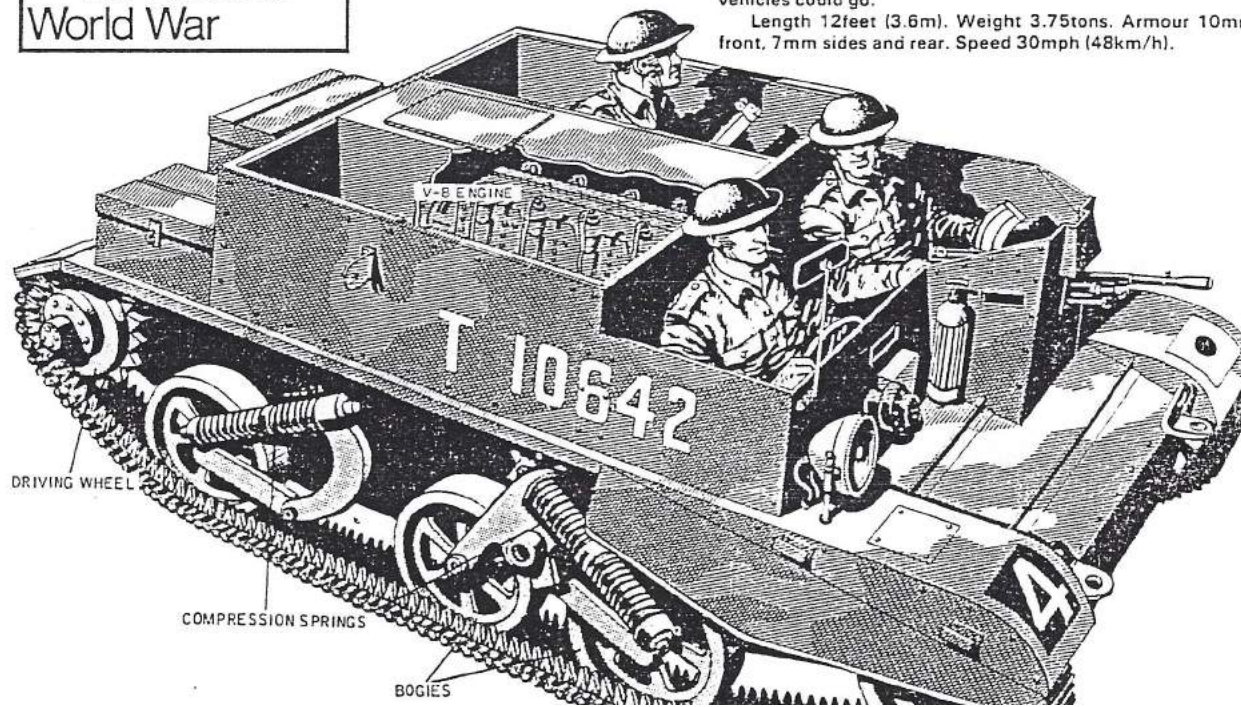
The second draft (the Main Body) was on a convoy that was diverted to England where it arrived on June 16th 1940. Soon after its arrival the Main Wksp was disbanded, most of its people were transferred to other units, and Lt Col Greyton was appointed COME (Chief Ordnance Mechanical Engineer) at HQ A.I.F. UK. The remainder of the workshop tradesmen, together with 2 and 3 Recovery Sections, were reconstituted as Australian Divisional Workshop UK, and administered by Capt S.E. Samuels. its main duty was the repair of vehicles for the British Army.

In the Middle East, 1 Recovery Section was renamed Det 2/1st Adv Fd Wksp after it was learned that its parent unit was in Britain. It was reinforced with tradesmen found in the 6th Division and given the task of providing 2nd Line or higher repairs for the Australian units in Palestine. UNQUOTE.

As space does not permit we will leave 2/1st Adv Fd Wksp at this point and offer extracts of two other well known Victorian identities 2/2nd and

UNIVERSAL CARRIER

Equipment of
the Second
World War



THE most famous type in this class of vehicle was the Bren Carrier, one of the handiest pieces of equipment ever built. Designed to carry a Bren gun and a crew of three, it was used for a wide variety of other jobs: as a scout car (better protection than a jeep!), a transport for supplies or troops, a mortar platform, even a flame-thrower. Unlike a tank it had a normal steering wheel, and it was very nippy and manoeuvrable over rough country where only tracked vehicles could go.

Length 12feet (3.6m). Weight 3.75tons. Armour 10mm front, 7mm sides and rear. Speed 30mph (48km/h).

2/4th Adv Fd Wksp.

QUOTE: 2/2nd Adv Fd Wksp (under Lt Col W.D. Chapman) began at Caulfield Racecourse, Vic. starting April 4th 1940. It contained 4, 5, and 6 Recovery Sections (the last two from S.A.) and 7 LADs. Ordered to the Middle East, the unit arrived in October 1940, in time to participate in the first Libyan Campaign. UNQUOTE.

QUOTE: 2/4th Adv. Fd. Wksp (under Lt Col R.H.M. Lea) was raised in Melbourne on October 25th 1940, to serve the 8th Australian Division. Its Recovery sections, 10, 11 and 12, were recruited in Victoria, Western Australia and South Australia, respectively. The original plan for this unit was modified when AHQ decided to provide each Brigade of the 8th Division with a Workshop instead of just one for the whole Formation. As a result, 10 Recovery Section became 22nd Bde Wksp, 12 Recovery Section became 27th Bde Wksp, and both were ordered to Malaya, while 11 Recovery Section was reformed as 23rd Bde Wksp and sent to its formation in Darwin.

Because of these changes, HQ and the Main Wksp of 2/4th Adv Fd Wksp became redundant, its personnel were sent to the Middle East to provide reinforcements for units already there. UNQUOTE.

The book also tells that the units mentioned in this extract, were engaged in the following, WESTERN DESERT CAMPAIGNS 1940 -1941.

GREECE - Three weeks campaign by 6th Division in March and April, which included 5 Recovery Section of 2/2nd Adv Fd Wksp.

WESTERN DESERT - 9th Australian Division withdrew to Tobruk and the siege began on April 11th. The Wksp units in Tobruk were the 2/1st Adv Fd Wksp with 1, 2 and 3 Recovery Sections; 6 Recovery Section of 2/2nd Adv Fd Wksp.

2/2nd Adv Fd Wksp, was the first Australian Workshop unit into action in WW II, on December 27th 1940. UNQUOTE.

Comment: Although in reading this magnificent book, I became confused with what happened to 2/4th Adv Fd Wksp, as mentioned above, this unit was broken up and became redundant. If this is so, where was the unit reformed, as it would appear that 2/4th Adv Fd Wksp was very active in "THE WESTERN DESERT AND ALAMEIN IN 1942". If any ex-AEME soldier knows what happened after they appeared to be disbanded, please tell the Editor.

Likewise we fail to see much written about these other units, 11th Aust Adv Wksp, 126 & 127 Aust Bde Wksp. If you would like to drop the Editor a line he will be pleased to publish your unit history, we would like to know more about Victorian units that fought in the Islands or for that, any stories of interest, or of units that we may have overlooked.

As mentioned at the beginning, the notes in this communication are only a small taste of what is available in this very well presented history of AEME/RAEME, the book is available by placing your order with the Secretary, cost \$40.00.

Remember, it is the 50th year of the Cessation of WW II, and perhaps this story of RAEME is something that can be kept for many years to come. The stories included in this book about those units that we recognise are well worth reading and will bring back many memories as they are in greater depth than we can present here.

In addition to this being the celebration of 50 years since WW II, the AEME/RAEME Association also celebrates its 50th year this December. When were the other Associations formed??? perhaps we can have a joint celebrations. Let us know.

I REMEMBER

I was born in 1933 in Sydney, and I can remember in the early 1940's, of visiting the many British Warships berthed in Sydney Harbour. Of watching the 6th Division, 2nd A.I.F. marching through the streets of Sydney prior to their embarkment to war. The 9th Division troops triumphant return from overseas to a memorable 'ticker tape' parade welcome (a lot different to the reception given to our Vietnam Veterans on their return home in later years).

In 1942, first thing every Monday morning at the local Primary School saw the whole school assembled for swearing allegiance to our country's flag, and singing "Advance Australia Fair" (something not now observed in most schools) all against a background of open zig-zag Air Raid Shelters (most of the time half filled with rain water from the night before.) Each resident had their own Air Raid Shelter, some just a hole in the ground, whilst others were very elaborate and furnished affairs. After the war, these Shelters were all filled in with rubbish and soon forgotten.

All windows of your houses had to be covered with a black 'muck' smeared over mosquito netting to eliminate any naked lights at night shining through. The local Air Raid Wardens carrying out 'Air Raid Drills', street by street on a Sunday afternoon, preceded by this loud wailing siren that could be heard for miles. Metal signs with "This street supports the War Effort" were nailed on street telegraph poles, and similar window stickers appeared on the front windows of every house.

Also in those days, if you were to cross the Sydney Harbour by ferry in either direction, you could observe the many gun installations at Middle Head, South Head and Watson's Bay (some of these still remain today, as a grim reminder of when our country was caught up in the fever of WW II.) The Sutherland Flying Boat Base at Rose Bay on the route out to Watson's Bay (which later became the base for the ANSETT Flying Boat to Hayman Island Holiday Resort).

I can still remember at the tender age of 9, on the 2nd June 1942, of being awoken from my sleep due to high explosives causing the ground to shake beneath our home. This was at the same time when two of three midget Japanese submarines had entered Sydney Harbour beneath the submarine boom-nets in an attempt to sink Allied shipping at berth there. After being sunk and salvaged they were put on public display. Parts of these two sunken submarines were later put together in an attempt to form one submarine now on display outside the Canberra War Memorial (the third submarine was believed to have escaped to rejoin

its larger 'Mother' or Depot ship, from which they had been originally launched.

Bankstown Aerodrome during the 1940's had been taken over by a U.S. Air Force fighter Squadron. At the time of this sneak Japanese submarine attack, one young keen and inexperienced Sergeant Pilot took off from this aerodrome before his engine had time to 'warmed up' and crash in close proximity to my home in a Soldier's settlement located 3½ miles outside of Liverpool. This was the cause of the violent ground tremors mentioned before. US Air Force crash vehicles dashed from the Aerodrome and tore through property wire fences without stopping to reach the downed plane just after it had crashed. They were too late to save the young pilot who unfortunately had been killed on impact.

Boy!! Did the School Inspectors have a field day that week - the majority of pupils were wagging school to gather souvenirs, live belts of Machine Guns bullets, heavy cannon rounds, even the perspex cockpit windows were taken off the plane and soon reappeared in mass production as rings for fingers (at a price) from enterprising fellow school mates. Air Force, Military and Civilian Police Forces were offering immunity to the locals if all souvenired ammunition was returned. I can remember one of my Aunty's who lived a few doors up from us in the same street, proudly displaying her 'collection' of various rounds of ammunition she had gathered and had spread out on the top of my cousin's bed (Who said adults aren't children at heart, Ha! Ha!)

Due to petrol restrictions, cars ran on Charcoal Burners attached to the rear of each vehicle, with your supply of charcoal carried inside of the vehicle in bags for topping up - no "Fill It Up Please, Attendant" at garages along the way in those days, you carried your own fuel yourselves.

Food and Clothing Rationing in the 1940's was something to be experienced. When I joined the Army Apprentices School, Balcombe in July 1949, we were using Tobacco Ration Cards, for those Apprentices on turning 16 years, who had obtained their parent's written consent to smoke, and of being issued with Tea, Butter, Meat and Sugar Ration Coupons when proceeding on our first six months Home Leave in December 1949.

Those days are now far behinds us, but the memories of that era will never fade from our minds, and is always a source of stories to tell to our children, and their children when asked "Do you remember WW II, Grandpa???"

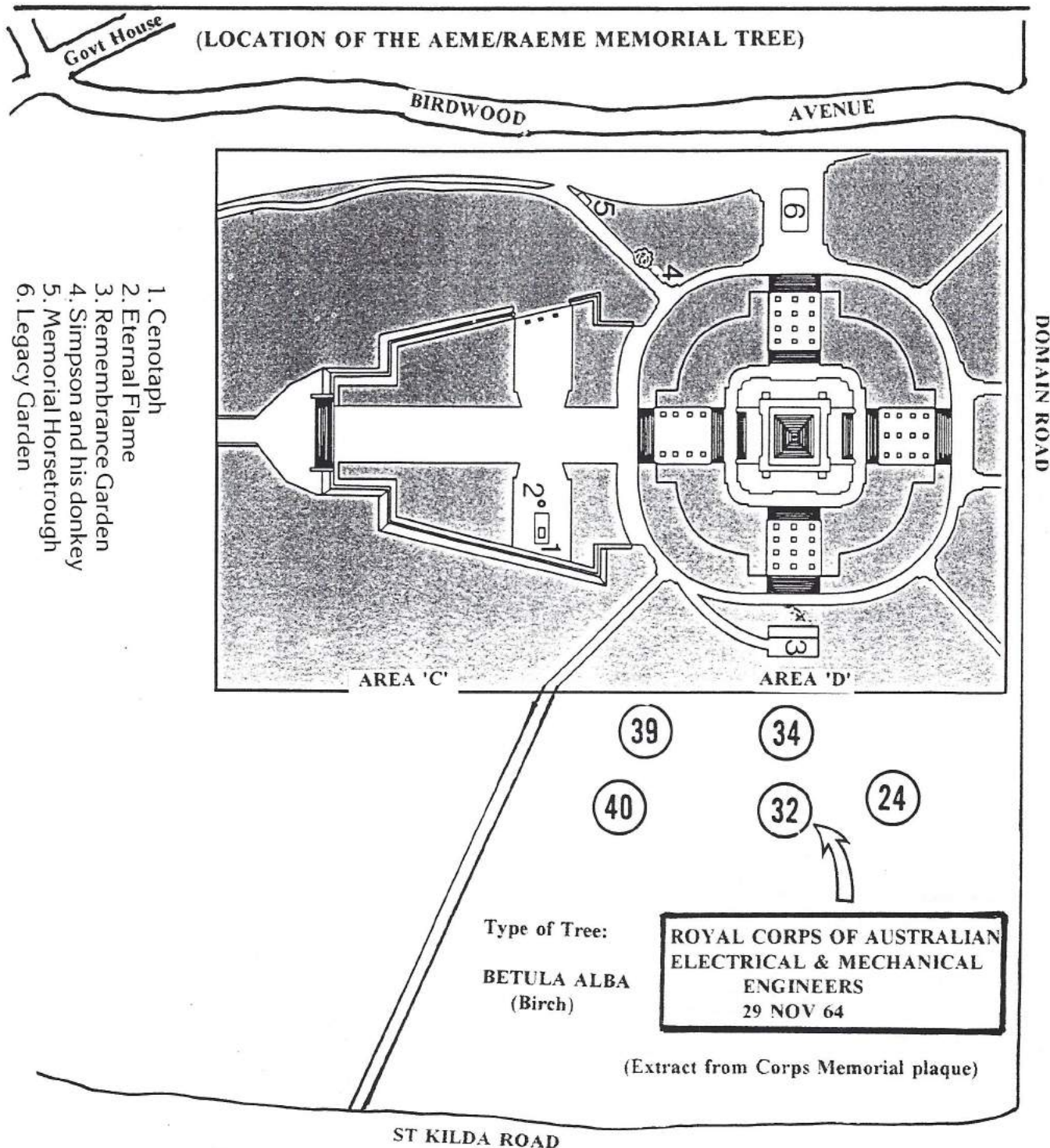

At a given time he was to lead the enemy force into the attack position - so the leader headed in the direction of the troops - the night was dark and extremely cold, they began their advance.

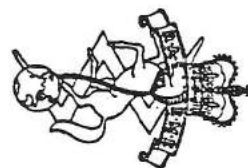
