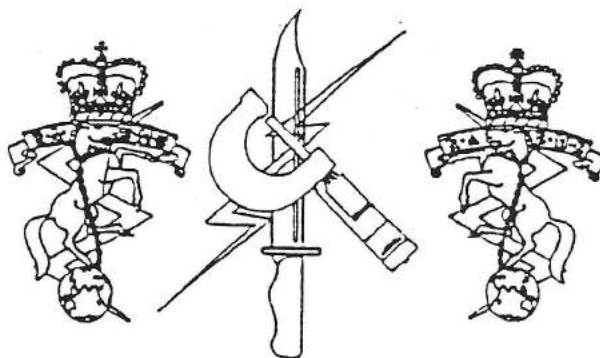

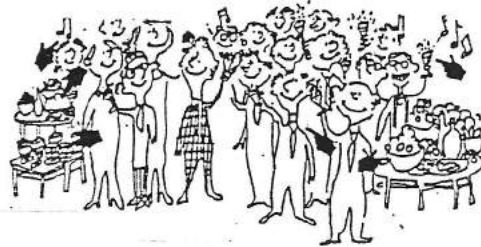

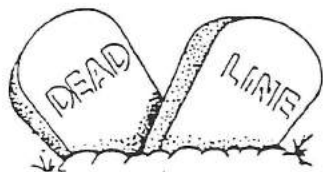

How about some items from our WW II AEME members??

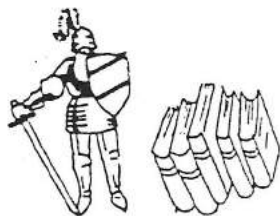

HISTORICAL CORNER

From records held by this Association we have many historical documents. The following is an extract of a report from the President of the AEME Association -

Tasmania. Perhaps Tasmania may like to copy this extract and forward a copy to each of their members.

The report was addressed to J. Sardes Esq. Federal President AEME Association, 26 Jamieson Street, Sydney and produced on letterhead from Australian Military Forces - 6th Military District, dated 28th Mar 1946. signed (we think by Maj. Mitchell) President AEME Association Tasmania Division.)

He reported:

- (a) Total Tasmanian personnel during the war approx 600.
- (b) Members Joined to date 53.
- (c) Members Financial to date 29.
- (d) All Discharged Personnel have been re-employed without difficulty.
- (e) At that time the Bank Account of the Tasmanian Division held 34/3/11.
- (g) Representatives had difficulty in attending the National (Federal) Meeting because of the expense and difficulty in travel, they requested this problem to be discussed at the Conference on 6th April 1946.

AEME UNIT HISTORIES

Memories fade and history is lost unless somebody takes the time and effort to record unit histories for prosperity whilst documentation, facts and instances are still vivid in our memories and photographs are still available for reproduction.

Doug Brazier (one of our members) has taken on the colossal task of transposing a written and photographic record, the History of 113th Aust Bde Wksp (AEME) which served in Australia and in Papua New Guinea during WW II from documentation he researched at the Australian War Memorial. This unit did receive a mention in the Corps History book mentioned in paragraph 5 below.

Have other AEME Association members made similar efforts to record their unit's history - if so let this Association know, perhaps you may need assistance in transcribing the facts on paper.

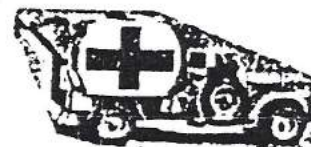

AIM:

The aim of the service is to dedicate the garden to all those who served in the Second World War and to commemorate Remembrance Day.

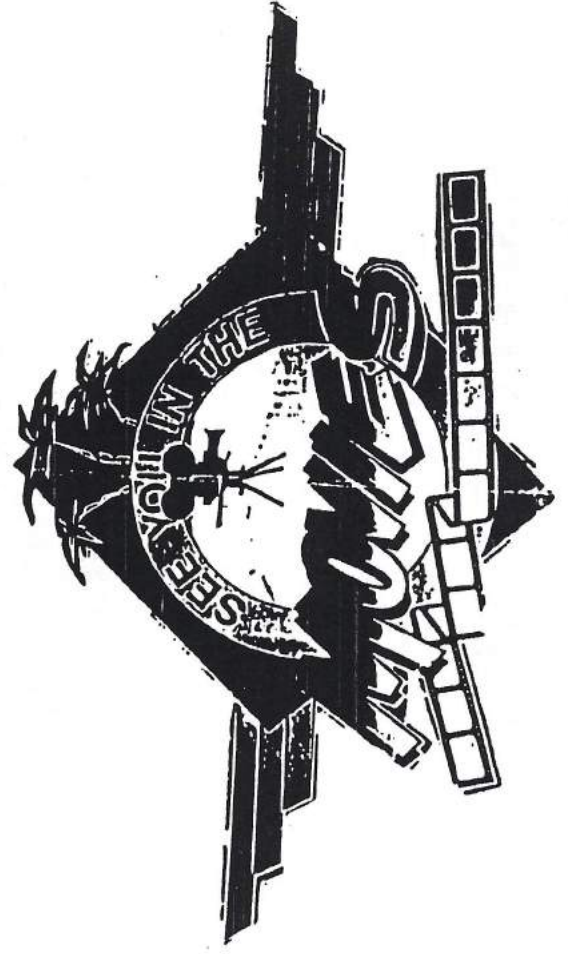

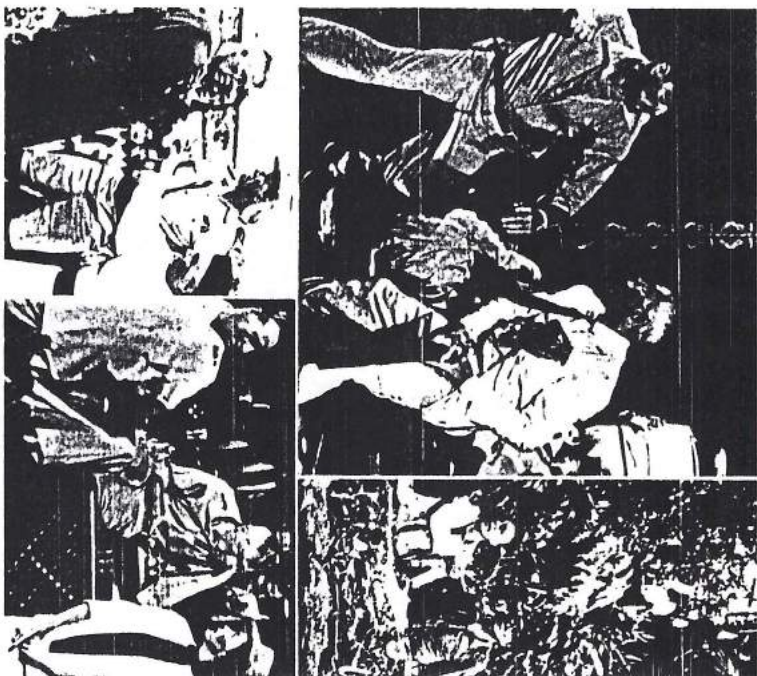

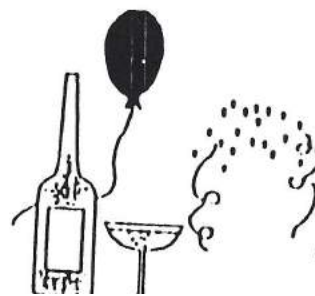

WORKSHOP MEETS CHALLENGE

A party from 105 Fd Wksp (now 4 BASB Wksp Coy) recently returned from an adventurous training exercise in Tasmania's Cradle Mountain - Lake St Clair National Park.

Following a similar highly successful activity conducted in March of this year Sgt. Steve Clarkson, L/Cpl Cathy Maulday, Cfn Billy Anthanasopoulos, Ian Glasey and Andrew Hewitson ventured South to take on the wilderness. Members from HQ 4 Bde, 8/9 RAR, RAAOC Centre and 44 Tpt Squadron rounded out the group.

Suitably equipped by Hobart Logistic Platoon the party deployed and the exercise was on.

Day one of the trek involved navigating approximately 8 kms through wet and, at times, swampy conditions. The night was spent at Lees Hut, a 200 year old drovers hut, with its leaking roof and wildlife inhabitants.

The Second day tested the fitness and endurance of all with 32 kms of very steep and swampy terrain. The participants were further challenged by having to cross a creek swollen by the constant drizzling rain. The group finally made it to Windermere Hut one hour after dark.

Day three was a trek to Waterfall Valley Hut, by this time all participants were starting to tire, especially as we climbed higher into the mountains and the temperature dropped rapidly. The scenery on this leg was outstanding with the snow capped mountains and ridges, waterfalls, cliff faces and the hut sighted by early afternoon. Waterfall Valley Hut is 12 months old and is first class camping accommodation. The hut is supplied with tank water, gas heating, bunks for 20 people and a brilliant view of Barn Bluff through the window. After arriving at the hut we had a light snowfall, the only one for the whole trip.

After overnighting at Waterfall Valley Hut all participants were ready for the last leg of 10 kms, starting with a one hour climb to the top of the ridge. The group trekked to the base of Cradle Mountain, but time did not permit us to climb it. As on the previous day the scenery was outstanding and the track taking the group past Cradle Mountain, Crater Lake and Lake Dove.

After refurbishing the Adventure training stores the tired but happy group returned to the mainland on the Spirit of Tasmania, satisfied that they had met the challenge and found new strengths through adversity.

THE DAY I MET JOE HIGGINS

For anyone who had been through RAEME Training Centre, Joe Higgins was rather well known. He was the unit Plant Operator and spent a lot of hours grading the now Football Oval. If there were any strange jobs to be done in the area, Joe would be called upon to fix it.

Joe has been known to spend his Sunday down at the local and after a sleep, go and have a meal then head off to work. On one occasion, he had finished his meal and was heading off to work when the Watchman asked him, "Where are you going Joe?, it will be dark in an hour", Joe's answer was "I wondered why I had steak and eggs for breakfast! I better get back to bed and sleep a bit more off".

Now to my first meeting with Joe Higgins.

In 1953 I was camped at Ingleburn, as a Musician/Stretcher-Bearer, awaiting movement to Korea with 1st Bn, RAR. Each Monday night, there was a dance in the Comfort's Fund Hut. I had met this nice young lady at the dance and had walked her home on a couple of occasions. I met her family, her father was the Carpentry Instructor at the then RAEME Training Centre, Ingleburn, before it was moved to its present location at Bandiana.

I would go to her place on Sundays and after a couple of drinks with Mum and Dad, we would take the younger ones of the family out for a picnic.

I was told by the family that the second daughter's boy-friend was coming to meet the family on the following Sunday, but from what the daughter had told Mum, she was not very impressed about him. I had better come and meet him as a couple of their friends would be there also.

When I arrived on this Sunday in particular, instead of the couple of bottles of beer on the table, there was a gallon of Port on the table instead and everyone had a Middy glass in front of them with Port in it.

I was introduced to the two extra visitors at the table. Wow!, one was 'Trapper' Smith and the other rough looking bloke was - you guessed it Joe Higgins.

Not long after I arrived, a knock came at the door and Mum went to answer it. It was the second daughter's boy-friend. Mum told us later that she didn't go much on the boy-friend as soon as she saw him. When she brought the boy-friend into the kitchen, his eyes virtually bulged, what with the Port and the rough company.

I was introduced to the boy-friend as one of Mum's nephews, Joe and 'Trapper' were introduced as her - wait for it - brothers. The new boy-friend stayed as long as protocol and good manners allowed and then made a hasty retreat. I never did find out whether he came back again.

The next time I ran into Joe Higgins was when I marched into RTC as an Instructor in 1965. Joe and I used to have a little chuckle about the boy-friend event, from time to time, over the following years.

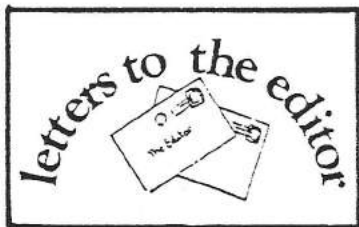

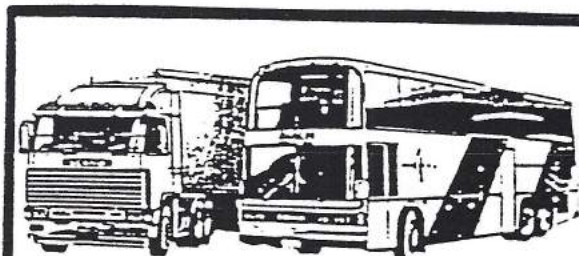
One member, Lt. Jack Miller, saw the news article and immediately rang me. He came to my home the next day, and we had a beaut reunion after 50 years.

AUSTRALIA REMEMBERS 1945 - 1995 PILGRIMAGE TO PAPUA NEW GUINEA

After a large concert and reception at Circular Quay Sydney, we boarded (what was to be called our 'Flagship') our Cruise Liner Mikhail Sholokhow, under the command of Captain Yuriy Naradko and an all Russian crew.

With a lot of fanfare and led by 'Bounty', 'Young Endeavour' and a host of small ships we were escorted out of Sydney Harbour and on our way to Brisbane to pick up their Veterans and a reception at Eagle Farm.

At approximately 4.45pm, the ship stood to over the exact spot where the Hospital Ship 'Centaur' had sunk by the Japanese Navy, even though she was fully lit up. Over 260 lives were lost including nearly all of the 193 members of the 2/12th Field Ambulance. Following a ceremony, wreaths were laid on the water and we were on our way again to Brisbane where we arrived on 1st July.

After our reception, we were treated to a great send off at the wharf and sailing inside the reef we headed to Port Moresby. Life on board was very relaxing and apart from briefings the time was ours. Great food, shops, Bars and Casino. Entertainment on board consisted of Lorraine Desmond, 'Ugly' Dave Grey, Enzo Toppano, plus the Ship's Orchestra and Dance Band, Russian Dancers, and to top all of this off, our very own 1 RAR Band who were really great. We were also accompanied by a Tri-Service Honour Guard, (Male & Female) they were all a credit to us.

The ship did a right hand turn at Townsville, through the reef opening and into the Coral Sea where we had another ceremony and Wreaths were laid on the water.

We berthed at Port Moresby at 5am on 5th July and after a good breakfast, we were transported to the well cared for Bomaua War Cemetery where a major ceremony was held. After this, we had time to take

photographs of graves of our old mates. I managed to take quite a lot but unfortunately I could not remember all the names so I missed out quite a few.

After Lunch on board, we were taken to the residence of the High Commissioner for a reception - eats and Fosters, and a beautiful view over the Harbour.

The rest of the Tour took in Milne Bay, Oro Bay/Popouetta and Lae where ceremonies were held at the old war sites. Our reception at these places was great, with people clapping and cheering, shaking hands, and warriors in all their gear and feathers.

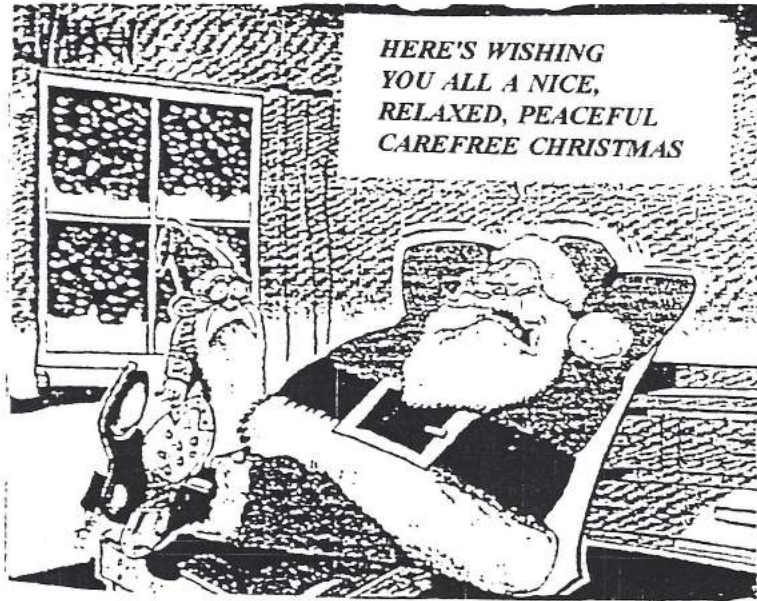
Lae was just the same as I last saw it RAIN, but it cleared for the ceremony at the Cemetery, owing to time we were unable to go up to Wau, and of course the trouble in Bougainville stopped us from going there. Some of the chaps were flown to Madang, Wewak and Rabaul, which was great for them.

Leaving Lae we sailed for Cairns, where we arrived 7am 11th July. Through Car Tours, we were taken to the R.S.L. for a reception and welcome home. It was the end of a wonderful two weeks, which went off without a hitch.

We were ably led by Rear Admiral Neil Ralph and Co-Ordinator, Lieut. Colonel Garry Young, 2 i/c ADF Moresby. Our wonderful carers (all Nursing Sisters), Dr. Richard Reid, Historian War Memorial Canberra.

The lady crew members who waited on our tables, made our beds, and for a small fee did our laundry - they were really great, and last but not least, our very own ADF, Australia can be proud of them. Add to that, 117 good friends made the trip so great. I will never ever forget it.

My sincere thanks to the AEME/ RAEME Association (Vic) Committee for nominating me and making this all possible.
