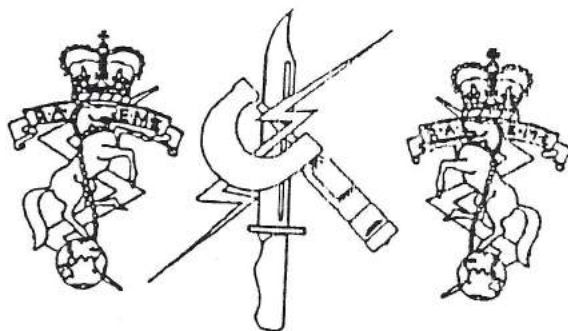

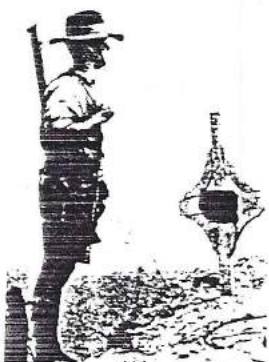

LEST WE FORGET...

Anzac Day a time to reflect. ANZAC Day maintains a special importance to Australians of all generations because the themes it evokes help explain our history and

define our identity. It invites us to commemorate, in solemnity and honour, our dead in all wars. It is an opportunity to consider what it is Australians have died for, and sets us thinking about who we are as a people. Each anniversary - 1996 is the 81st - is both a remembrance and a measurement of nationhood.

The battle of Gallipoli, the first big test of Australians in a theatre of battle, has come to symbolise those themes. As federation in 1901 created Australia as a nation, but failed to deliver a true sense of nationhood. It was a constitutional entity with a spiritual void at its core. Many have argued that Gallipoli, 14 years later, provided the decisive moment when

Australians discovered they were fighting, dying and defending something that went beyond King and empire - and a small Turkish beach became the anvil on which Australia was forged as a nation. To justify the immense suffering of our soldiers it was necessary to attach deeper meaning to it, and inevitably a mythology sprang up over Gallipoli. Yet the spirit underlying real events - such as Simpson and his donkey - has been neither tarnished nor diminished through being emblemised by myth. On April 24 1993, Australian Newspaper authors David Day, Gavan McCormack and Hank Nelson, had suggested it was plain, even after Gallipoli, Australians did not go to war to defend the idea of a distinctive Australia. They went because the British Empire was threatened, and if the empire was in danger, so was Australia's place in it. "The Diggers earned glory in the desperate gullies of Gallipoli fighting for empire, not Australia". But it was also in Australia's national interest to be involved. The course of the world was determined from Europe, our trade and investment were inextricably tied to London, and nobody doubted nobody doubted Australia would suffer if Britain lost. 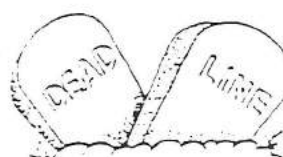
In closing this message from myself, let me say once again to all those members who supported functions last year, thank you and it is sincerely hoped your support will continue on.

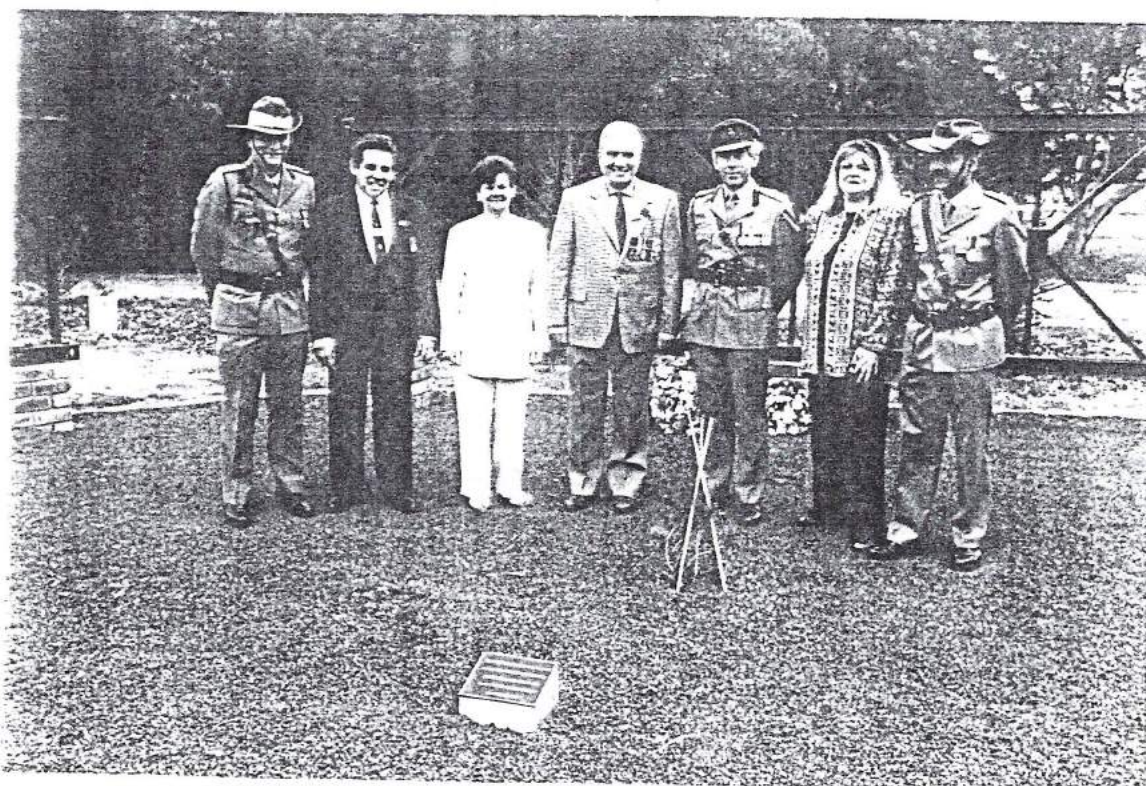


SPECIAL EVENTS SUB-COMMITTEE

What a wonderful evening was had by all those who attended this historic event at Chapel Street Training Depot on 2.12.1995.

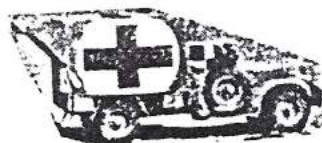

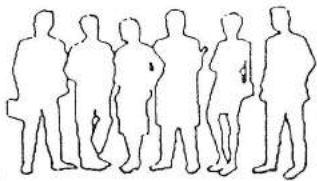

ANZAC DAY 1996 DAWN SERVICE - OAKLEIGH BARRACKS

- 0500 hrs. REVEILLE
- 0515 hrs. RETURN STORES TO STORES OFFICER
- 0530 hrs. ISSUE OF COFFEE/TEA/RUM WHERE DESIGNATED.
- 0555 hrs. Unit Associations to Assemble in mass under an ex-Servicemen's March Leader's control on the roadway outside of the Barracks "Q" Stores/Messes known as Sir Clive Steel Close.
- Spectators not marching are requested to form up on the WESTERN side of the Parade Ground where limited suitable seating will be provided.
- 0600 hrs. The Catafalque Party and Associations march onto the Parade Ground on the NORTH side facing the gymnasium where a Memorial Wall has been provided below the Flag Base.
- 0605 hrs. The Catafalque Party is mounted - then the Memorial Service will commence - this will include Wreath laying by respective Associations (who are to supply their own wreaths). ANZAC DAY COMMEMORATION MARCH AND CEREMONIES

MELBOURNE — 25th APRIL, 1996

DAWN SERVICE (6 a.m.)

TIME TO BE IN POSITION — 5.45 a.m.

PLACE — Within the barriers, facing the Shrine, on the northern side.

WREATH LAYING

- TIME** — 1. Private Wreaths — 6.30 a.m.-8.15 a.m.
2. Official Wreaths — 8.15 a.m.-8.30 a.m.
3. Unit Wreaths — Progressively during March.

THE ASSEMBLY

TIME — Not before 8.15 a.m. at which time all traffic will cease.

PLACE — As shown on map overleaf.

THE COMMEMORATION MARCH

LEADERS Air Commodore Keith Parsons CBE DSO DFC AFC
Wing Officer Doris Carter OBE

START POINT — Corner of Swanson Street and Flinders Street.

START TIME — 9.00 a.m.

METHOD — His Excellency, The Governor of Victoria, will view the March from a dais on the Forecourt of the Shrine.

- (1) Frontage — Ten abreast unless otherwise directed.
(2) Route — St. Kilda Rd., through the Forecourt to the Dispersal Area between the flagmasts and Birdwood Ave.

COMPLIMENTS — Special tributes will be paid to the memory of fallen ex-servicemen and women:

- (1) On reaching the top step of the entrance to the Forecourt, you are asked to march at ATTENTION.
(2) Eyes right (and banners lowered) to the Eternal Flame.
(3) Males in civilian clothes will remove headgear and carry over the left breast. Officers in uniform salute.

THE COMMEMORATION SHRINE CEREMONY

TIME — On arrival of the rear formation (approximately 12.00 p.m.)

DURATION — Not more than thirty minutes.

ADDRESS — A short address is to be given by His Excellency, The Governor of Victoria.

MEDICAL — St. John Ambulance Australia, in conjunction with Ambulance Service Victoria, will provide Aid Posts in all areas covered by the Assembly, March and Ceremonies.

TOILETS — See signposts in Dispersal Area.

REFRESHMENTS — Tea, coffee and biscuits supplied by Bushells will be prepared and dispensed by the Salvation Army from the Dispersal Area at the Shrine, from 9.30 a.m. until the conclusion of ceremonies.

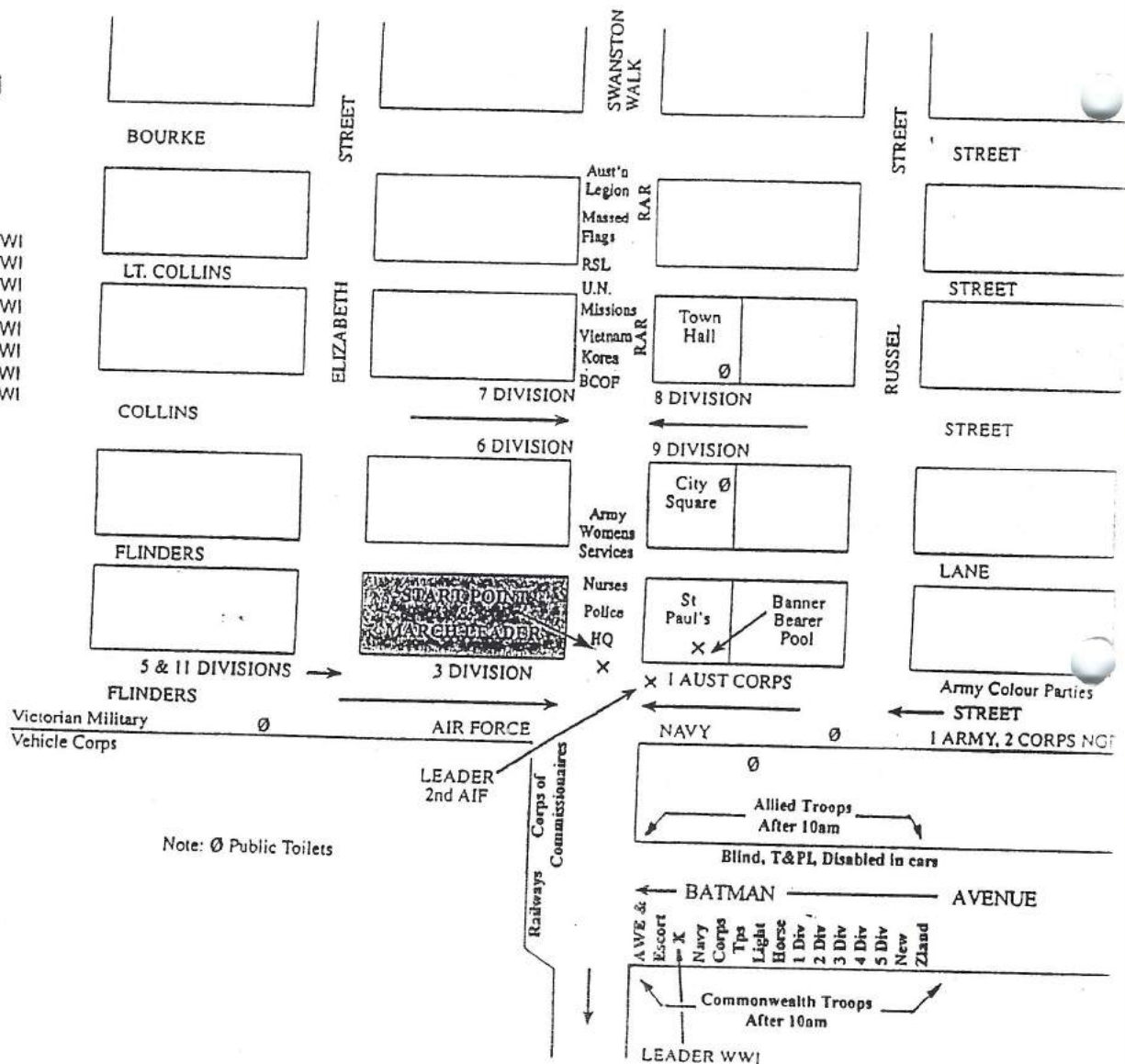

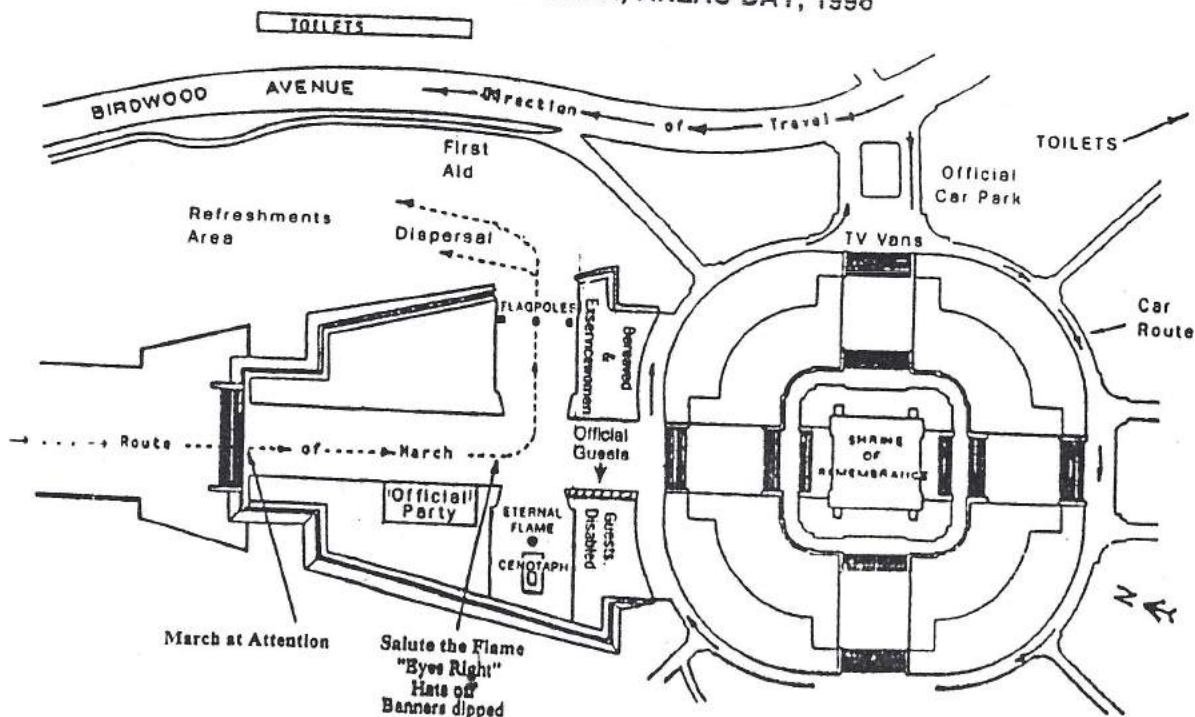

The National *Australian Remembers* Freedom Wall will be located in Brisbane at the Mount Coot-tha Botanic Gardens overlooking the city. The Freedom Wall is being erected for the permanent housing and display of individual *Australia Remembers* Plaques which are now available.

The Plaques are solid brass, featuring the "Australia Remembers" symbol.

After you receive your plaque, have it engraved with your special message, then return it in the prepaid envelope provided. Your engraved plaque will be fixed to the Freedom Wall where it will stand for generations to come, a life long symbol of your appreciation of those Australians, living and deceased, whose sacrifices should not go unrecognised.

Plaques are on sale until Anzac Day 1996, and the wall will be dedicated on 15 August 1996.

ELIZABETH ANN COLDICUTT
(Nee LACEY VF 508771)

Elizabeth was born on 9 April 1924 in Ringwood to her Montessori trained Kindergarten teacher mother, Helen Harper (nee Hughes) and her father ex-Captain C.L. Lacey M.C., 29th Infantry Battalion, 8th Brigade, 5th Division A.I.F. a WW1 Soldier Settler ("cocky-farmer": wheat and sheep in the Southern Mallee, 2 miles from Watchupga).

Elizabeth's childhood was very happy. Already able to read and write when she began to ride to school, aged six. Elizabeth enjoyed her Primary schooling at State School No. 3380 Watchupga initially in what is now year 8 - in a one-teacher school with an enormous enrolment of about 14 students, from Grades I to VIII.

In Grade VIII, Elizabeth won a Junior Government Scholarship, an R.S.L. Scholarship, and three Residential Scholarships - to Girton (Bendigo), Fintona, and Anglican C.E.G.G.S. Firbank as a Boarder for four years. On Matriculation, in 1942, Elizabeth won both a Free Place (unbonded in any way) to the University of Melbourne (Victoria's only University then) and again, a major Residential Scholarship - this time to Janet Clarke Hall, (Women's Section of Trinity).

At the news of the loss of H.M.A.S. "PERTH", (months after the actual event, 28.2.1942), Elizabeth aged 18 years and at the end of her Fresher Year Examinations,

joined the Australian Women's Army Service (A.W.A.S.) After a mere two-weeks 'Square-Bashing' at the Initial Training camp (A.W.A.S.) at Darley (near Bacchus Marsh) VF 508771 Lacey joined the Second Intake of female Radar Mechanic Trainees, of which there was a total of only 48 girls. There were two Intakes a year apart, with 24 Entrants in each Intake, 4 girls from each of the 6 States (in those days, the Northern Territory wasn't counted as a State. 6 months training at East Sydney Tech, Ultimo, there they were trained by civilian teachers, finishing on what they called Transceivers or Tank Sets, which were the forerunners of what are now call CB radios.

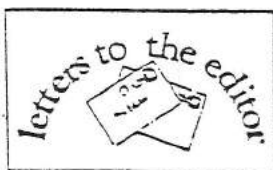
This was followed by another 6 months at Ingleburn N.S.W. where they were trained by British Army Dunkirk veterans from R.E.M.E. During 1943-45 Elizabeth was posted to Cairns, to her delight - it was as close to hostilities as non-Nursing female personnel could be sent at that time. Her responsibilities were the Ack-Ack Battery's G.L's, and the Searchlight Stations. Searchlights were scattered in the bush, and all positions designed for maximum protection of the vital Cairns Airstrip.

In 1945, at her own request, Elizabeth trained as a 3-ton truck driver, and again, alone, nearly lost her vehicle (a 12 CWT Ute) in the Brisbane River on V.P. Day since the over excited civilians decided so small a driver could be intimidated and military vehicles weren't needed any more, anyway, since "the war was over".

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
ANZAC Day a time to reflect (Cont. from P. 1, Col 2.)

Australia would suffer if Britain lost.

The reasons for our entry into WW II were almost precisely the same, although they changed as it became apparent Australia could not rely on the Empire for its security. There, too, Australians became aware of themselves as having developed beyond Colonialism. Yesterday (23.4.1993) the Prime Minister Mr. Keating, launched McCormack and Nelson's book, which argues the Burma Railway shaped the Australian State just as Gallipoli had. Australian POWs met and dealt with Asian peoples (not just the Japanese) as no other Australians had, were themselves changed by the experience and returned to Australia with an outlook that could only be called Australian. "The Australian prisoners seem to have been beneficiaries of those characteristics of nationalism they most hoped would transfer from the Diggers of World War I to themselves," the Authors wrote.

Enlarging on this theme, Mr. Keating said the POWs "also saw the British Empire as few Australians had ever seen it, and it led a lot of them to conclude that we Australians had evolved into a different race". ANZAC Day is a fitting time to reflect on that continuing evolution.

SENIOR NCO'S & WO's DINNER - Recently I attended the Senior NCO'S & WO's Dinner at the Bandiana Sgt's Mess, and had a great time. I was accompanied by John Lee, Jack Westernhagen and Peter Cartledge. The official guests being Colonel (now Brigadier) Ross Grant and Brigadier Conrad Ermert.

During various addresses by both gentlemen they talked about many changes about to take place with the Army and more particular RAEME in general during the coming years. We will keep our members abreast of changes as we see various reviews coming through.

The most apparent review recently was for all W.O. Class 1 positions in the ARA. We have been informed that this review was conducted in 3 phases.

FIRST - A desk audit was carried out with the intention of identifying W.O. 1 positions requiring more detailed justification, the process identified 356 Army positions - of these positions 69 were RAEME.

SECOND - Involved Heads of Corps, units and Commands - reviewing positions in detail and justification on positions that should be retained.

THIRD - This phase involved a meeting at which all 'Stake Holders' presented their justifications and final recommendations were made.

How did RAEME end up? Of the 69 positions identified - DEME-A recommended that 8 be downgraded and 1 be Civilised. Therefore our nett loss is 9 W.O. 1 positions. Fortunately, within this review RAEME suffered relatively lightly, the Director being pleased with the outcome.

This is only a brief extract of the overall review and as mentioned RAEME at this point, would appear from various reports and writings, fared well. RAEME soldiers will continue to have significant opportunities to achieve the rank of W.O. 1. However, some trades will appear to have reduced promotion opportunities as a consequence of this review. Nevertheless, it is important that we are not complacent, as further reviews are certainly on the horizons with progression of time.

CLOSURE OF STURT STREET RACT DEPOT - During December '95, my wife Sandra and myself attended a reunion at the RAASC (now RACT) Depot in Sturt Street, Sth Melbourne. I joined RAASC in 1958, later transferring to RAEME. The reason I mention this is that many RAEME soldiers and officers served in this Depot over many years as Workshop or RAEME Attached personnel.

This Training Depot was established in 1902 as a Service Corps unit. The first training there being "Hathe Tractor" Courses. Sturt Street Depot was the first AASC Centre, before it moved to Puckapunyal. Sturt Street Depot became the hub of all AASC/RAASC/RACT activating in the Melbourne Metropolitan area. The last RAEME units left this Depot in 1970, the units were 15 & 33 Tpt Coy RAASC Wksp respectively, both of these units I served with prior to returning to Chapel Street in the early '70's.

It was a sad day for many as the Depot officially closed in February 1996, to make way for the new underground City By-Pass. Thank you to the RAASC/RACT Association for organising that memorable day.
