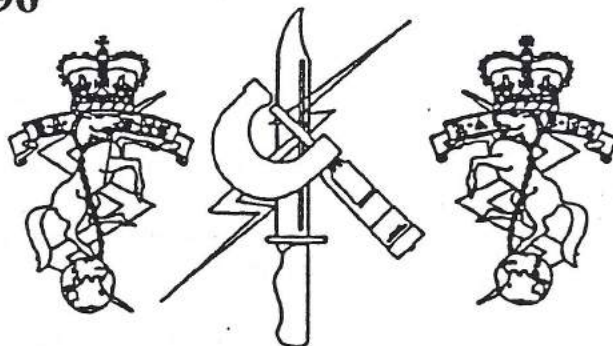

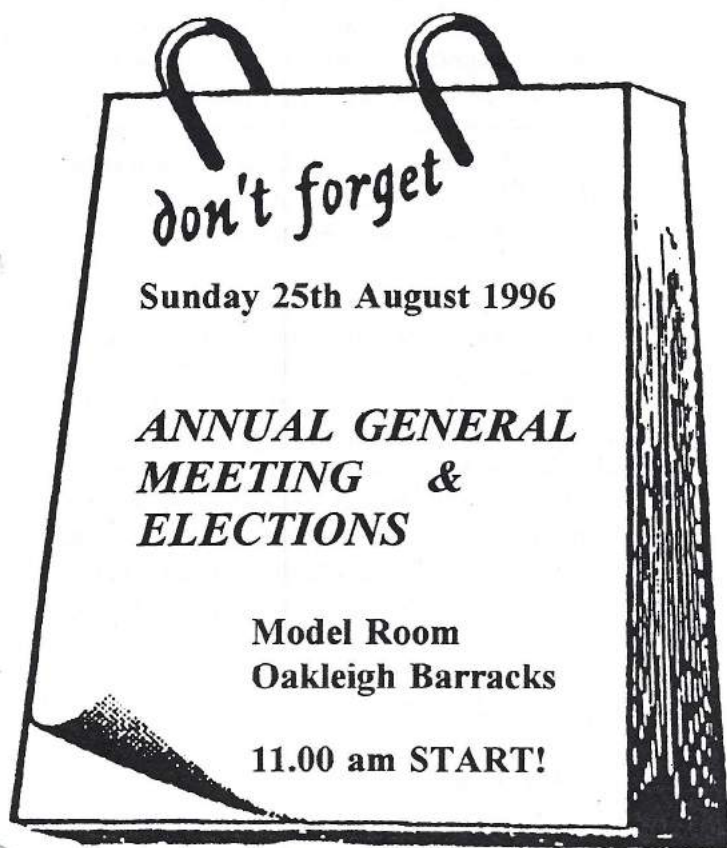

SICK PARADE

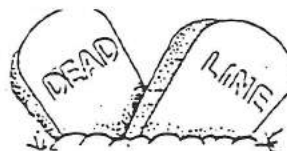

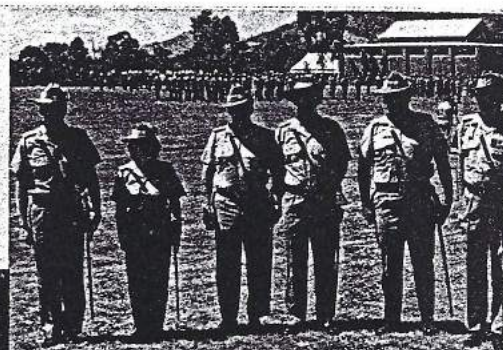

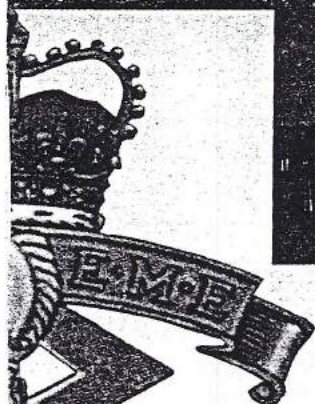

Member's Profile



Douglas George BRAZIER
(ex VX 131987)

Douglas Brazier was born in August 1921 and educated at Coburg West Primary and Brunswick Technical Schools. In 1941 Douglas received the 'British Institute of Carpenters' Best Apprentice Award', then later in 1985 became the president of the institute.

His first civilian employment was with H. Parsons Joinery Works, Coburg. He also trained with the Air Raid Precautions and the St. John's Ambulance while on Defence work.

Douglas served in the C.M.F. from April to December 1942, then in the A.I.F. from December 1942 to September 1946. As a Trade Group II Carpenter, Douglas joined the 113th Bde Group Ordnance Wksp, and disembarked from the SS Swartenhandt at Port Moresby New Guinea in June 1942.

Whilst in New Guinea, Douglas experienced many an air-raid, whilst working from dawn to dusk every day. He made the comment 'Who could forget the warm bully-beef and dog biscuits which we considered a luxury in those days'. Personal blackouts and acclimatisation were common as Kokoda Track equipment was maintained. From Dec 1942 the unit was redesignated as 113th Aust Bde Wksp AEME A.I.F. Douglas mentioned that two of our association members, Harold Chamberlain LM and Peter Mack were also members of that same unit.

After 18 months in Papua New Guinea, 113th Aust Bde Wksp returned to Australia for 21 days home leave. Then, after training with 7th Bde on the Atherton Tablelands we returned

to Madang New Guinea for three months, this was followed by a further fourteen months in Southern Bougainville.

(Note: Douglas is currently writing the history of 113th Bde Wksp AEME and stated that this has only been possible with his wife Thelma's great tolerance and support.)

After receiving his discharge from the A.I.F. Douglas married his wife Thelma in Feb 1949. To Thelma and Douglas was born a son Rodney, they now have 5 grandchildren and a great-grandson.

In civilian life prior to his retirement, Douglas spent twenty-two years in the building trade, including nine years in his own business. In 1959 he served as a technical school teacher, retiring as a senior teacher after 22 years in 1981. His hobbies include being a member of various movie clubs where he enjoys making videos.

This hobby, Douglas has put to good use in recording many of our association's activities, for which we are forever grateful to him, for it is through his patience and enthusiasm he has given to this association an unforgettable library of photographic history of our many activities from 1976 to the present i.e. the 1976 Reunion and ANZAC March, 1986 Prince Philip Banner Presentation, 1986 44th Birthday celebrations, Broadmeadows, 1991 & 1994 Family Farm Days at Bill Sledges farm at Jindivick North, the 1992 Golden Jubilee Parade, Bandiana, 1993/1994/1995 & 1996 ANZAC Day Marches Melbourne, the Entombment of the Unknown Soldier in Canberra in 1993, the 1995 Widows and Life Member's Luncheon and the 11th Nov '95 Remembrance Day and Dedication to the Memorial Garden at Oakleigh Barracks.

25 years ago in 1951, Douglas joined the AEME Association and is still an active member behind the scenes as our roving photographer whenever the occasion arises.

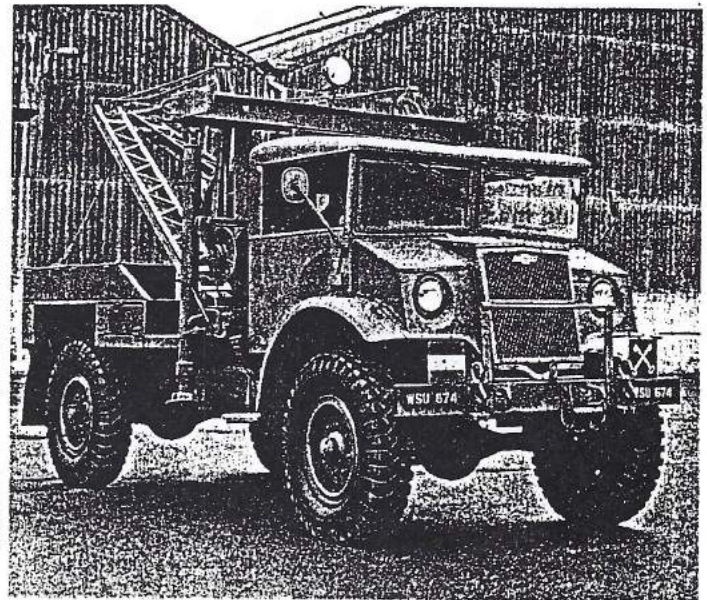
Nostalgia Rolls OK!

For the veterans of WW2 tangible reminders of the campaigns fought to defeat the axis powers can be recalled only too well on trips to the battlefields. The cemeteries are there as grim reminders: but for a more acceptable way of recalling the war, the friends, the more light hearted times, the comradeship when the Sergeant Major, rather than Hitler, was the common enemy there is little tangible material to jog their memories. A few men kept diaries (illegally), some still have letters which they sent home but censorship made them a poor source of information. There are medals and uniforms about but they were common. Very little of the scenery remains unchanged. Few wartime camps or barracks still exist and those that do, have all been modernised.

Old soldiers do sit up and take notice though if a Jeep rolls by and a parade or line up of old military vehicles in authentic colours and markings are an instant reminder of times gone by. If the owners of restored vehicles, and most are in private ownership, also wear authentic uniform of the period, the effect can be like a time warp bringing tears to the eyes of those for whom these vehicles were often a salvation in wartime: bringers of food, fuel, ammunition and mail, a means of a lift for the foot sore or at worse an escape from the battle-field for the wounded.

For many old soldiers - not all of them REME, keeping such vehicles on the road was their daily task. The technology of the age was less sophisticated, which was just as well since many of the vehicles of the period were not really robust enough, for what was demanded of them and they needed frequent repairs. Most succumbed to wear and tear and accidents more often than to war damage. It made little difference to those whose job it was to keep them going. There were never enough spares, rarely enough tools and there were certainly insufficient new vehicles to meet all needs. The very fact that a more rapid turn round of repairable vehicles were vital to victory was one of the reasons for bringing REME into existence.

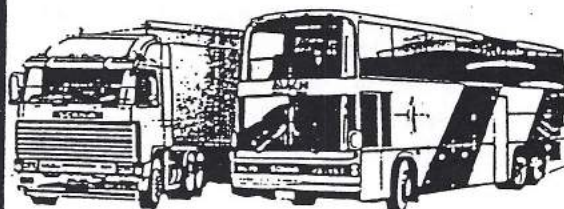
