



Please bear in mind that our Social Events are one of the main reasons why our Annual Subscriptions are able to be kept low.


Payment of Annual Subscriptions helps towards keeping this Association alive and providing its members with a very viable and informative Newsletter.

CHANGE OF ADDRESS - Don't fold your tent and steal quietly away -



HISTORICAL SUB-COMMITTEE

The following is the first such articles that will be appearing in this column.

**STANDING ON CEREMONY -
FUNERALS AND GUN CARRIAGES**

In the time of Henry VIII, military bands were not included in establishments, but every body of fighting men boasted a party of drummers and trumpeters; the former to set and maintain the marching pace, the later to break the monotony by blowing an occasional fanfare.

King Henry directed that these instruments should be employed in the funeral ceremonies of high-ranking officers. During the 18th century, coffins were carried on a bier, which was born by soldiers or officers depending on the rank of the deceased.

Behind them marched a party of drummers playing what was then called the 'Dede Sounde' to a pace beat in keeping with the extremely slow rate of progress of the bier party. Thus was born the 'Slow March' and "Dead March' of the present time. Although speedier means of transportation were introduced, the original Slow March was retained as more befitting the dignity of the occasion.

In 1723, the term 'Dede Sounde' was changed to 'Dead March' in military parlance. The procedure followed at the graveside was also inaugurated in Tudor times. After the coffin had been lowered into the grave, musketeers posted on either side fired three volleys.

The firearms of the period, being wheellocks, some six feet long and about 15lbs in weight, required support in the shape of a forked rest, which was stuck in the ground under the muzzle. In order to elevate the weapon, firing parties were formed in a kneeling position opposite each other. After the volleys, Last Post and Reveille were played. At that time, Last Post took the form of Taps, which was played at 10pm each night as a sign for

Reveille consisted of a series of long blasts in no prescribed form.

It is recorded that the funeral for the Duke of Marlborough in 1722 was the first occasion of using the drill movements Reverse Arms, and Rest on your Arms Reverse, this solemn ritual evidently having been invented specially to show an unusual degree of respect. The act of Reversing Arms no doubt was used prior to this time as a symbolic gesture towards death, as a Commonwealth soldier was punished for reversing his arms at the execution of Charles I in 1649.

Gun carriages are synonymous with military funerals, however, despite popular belief and Hollywood-made history, this has not always been the case. It was not until the mid 1800s that Queens Regulations authorised the use of a gun carriage and team, when available, to carry a coffin to a burial ground, providing said ground was more than a mile (1.6km) away.

Nowadays, the carriage and procession combine for the departure from the church or chapel and again on the arrival at either the cemetery or crematorium.

THE CHARGE OF JACKA'S BRIGADE

Capt Albert Jacka, VC. MC. legendary exploits in battle made him a sort of wartime Don Bradman.

Jacka won the Victoria Cross (VC) at Gallipoli on May 19 when he was only 22.

"Great battle at 3am" he wrote in his diary after the action. Turks had captured a large portion of our trench. Lieut. Hamilton shot dead. I lead a section of men and recaptured the trench. I bayoneted two Turks, shot five, took three prisoners and cleared the whole trench. I held the trench alone for 15 minutes against a heavy attack".

Jacka's subsequent actions on the Western Front were no less extraordinary. On August 6 1916, he won the Military Cross (MC) at Pozieres in an action many believe should have delivered him a second VC.

Jacka's battalion was shelled continuously from 9pm until 4.45am when German infantry attacked. Jacka and nine of his men sheltered from the bombardment in a

dugout. Two waves of Germans had passed over the dugout when a German appeared at the entrance and rolled a grenade inside, killing two Australians and stunning the rest.

Jacka was the first to recover. He raced out of the dugout and came face to face with a group of about 50 Germans rounding-up about 40 Australian prisoners.

Rather than surrendering, Jacka and his seven men charged the Germans - Jacka reportedly saying "This is no good boys - charge!" and not only succeeded in releasing the Australian prisoners, but capturing 42 German prisoners.

Official war historian C.E.W. Bean called it 'the most dramatic act of individual audacity in the history of the AIF'.

Jacka was wounded several times in this action alone and more than 20 times during the war.

He was demobilised on January 10, 1920, and started a business that was to fail during the Great Depression. He was elected to the St Kilda Council in 1929 and became Mayor in 1930. He collapsed after a St Kilda Council meeting on December 14, 1931 and died on January 17, 1932 at Caulfield Military Hospital. He was 39.

It was estimated 50,000 people lined Princes Bridge during Jacka's funeral procession.

On the day of Jacka's funeral, 10 soldiers were selected to form a guard of honor at the graveside and to deliver the gun salute.

One of the guards, was Les Bailey. Now 87, later to become a member of this Association. 'I was at the former Drill Hall at the corners of Commercial and Punt Roads when the Adjutant came in and picked out the 10 best-dressed privates', Mr. Bailey said.

A native Queenslander, Ron completed his Secondary education at Brisbane State High School, after which he entered the Royal Military College, Duntroon in 1960, graduation into RAEME in December 1963. In 1965, as the Army expanded for the Vietnam commitment, he was Seconded to Infantry and served with 5 RAR for two years. This included service in Vietnam as 2i/c 'A' Coy 5 RAR, an Advisor/Liaison Officer with a Vietnam Regional Force Company and OC Admin Coy 5 RAR.

On return from Vietnam, Ron served as the QM N Comd Wksp before being posted to RAEME Trg Centre where he served as an instructor in Corps Trg Wing and subsequently OC Corps Trg Wing. After a brief period as OC 106 Fd Wksp when it returned from Vietnam to become the Army's first resident in the old Migrant Centre at Bonegilla.

Ron was posted to the UK to attend the Technical Staff Officer's Course at the Royal Military College of Science, Shrivenham. On return to Australia he served in the Directorate of Trials & Evaluation (Army) and the Directorate of Trials (Defence) in Canberra.

Canberra was followed by three years as CO 4 Base Wksp Bn and then a return to Logistics Branch Canberra as SO1 Leopard, responsible for co-ordination of Logistics Support for the Leopard Tank. After attending Joint Services Staff College in 1982, Ron was promoted Colonel and appointed as Director of Technical Services (Army) working for the DGEME in his Defence Central role.

In 1983, he moved to Melbourne as Colonel, Electrical & Mechanical Engineering in HQ Logistics Command. His last appointment in the Army was as Controller Maintenance Engineering Agency from where he resigned in 1988 after 28 years service.

On leaving the Army, Ron joined Kodak where he spent time as a Staff Assistant to the General Manager Marketing, reviewing Customer Service and Inventory Control measures. In November 1989, he was appointed Transport Manager and in June 1992, assumed the position of Distribution Manager. His responsibilities include National Warehousing and transportation of finished goods to domestic customers, export orders to New Zealand and the Pacific Islands, control of the import process for the company and provision of a range of transport and administration services within the company.

Ron is married and he and his wife Janet, have a family of four 'young adults', none yet married. His interests are golf, wood turning and gardening.

' I WAS THERE '

Three days after the Second World War finished, and before the surrender of

Lt General Adachi to Maj General Robertson on the airstrip at Wewak, New Guinea, I was involved in an incident with the Japanese, which was both terrifying and humorous; in that order.

I was attached to a unit which supplied all the ammunition to the 6th Division, as a Bomb Disposal Officer, and a part of the job was to blow up any unserviceable or dangerous goods. I had received an aerial photograph of a suspected Japanese ammunition dump about 5 miles down the coast, near the beach, and was asked to investigate and clean it up etc. if required.

I managed to get a small motor cruiser to take me down to the general area, the area was so rocky that we could not land, however, we found a narrow channel that I could swim through so I stripped off naked and tied my boots around my neck and made it to the shore. As I started to walk up the beach to my amazement, 7 Japanese stepped out of the bush, in a line. I hoped that they knew that the war was over, and then I saw them invert their rifles, indicating a form of surrender, much to my relief, as I was stark naked except for my boots.

One of the Japanese could speak pidgin English, and was an N.C.O. He told me that they were part of a unit who were camped some 10 minutes away. He asked me if I would return to his camp with them, as his Commanding Officer was fluent in English. I agreed, and told him that I would have to get some clothes, so we all went down to the shoreline and I swam back to the boat and put some clothes in a bit of plastic and swam back to shore again, and then accompanied them to their campsite.


Upon arrival, he took me to his Commander, who told me that the unit was composed of two other Officers, (to whom he introduced me) and 53 Other Ranks, with only one ill with malaria. The camp was spotless, and was only built from native bush, they still had their weapons. but no ammunition.

We went back to his hut for some terrible tea, and during our conversation he disclosed that he had been a Wool Buyer for Mitsubishi & Co. of Melbourne at the Wool Exchange in Kings Street, where I had amazingly, been a Clerk for the V.P.C. in their wool department; that called for some more of their terrible jungle juice! I invited him to return with me, however, he would not leave his men. So I was escorted back to the rock channel by most of his unit, where I undressed again, and swam back to the boat, much to the relief of the crew, and the Japanese; as the tide had turned and the seas were not with me.

When I reported the incident to Divisional HQ there were howls of laughter and it was conceded that the surrender of so many armed enemy troops to an unarmed nude soldier would be an unheralded feat for the Division.

FOOT NOTE! ... I managed to meet up with the officer at the unit Detention Centre and made sure that he was well looked after together with his men, especially after I had disclosed the account of the incident.




Fort Queenscliff is one of the State's finest heritage assets and Victoria's only coastal fortress which offers an excellent opportunity for you to acquaint yourself and friends with an intriguing part of our living history.

Fortifications at Queenscliff date back to 1859, when the Victorian Government decided to emplace guns on Shortland's Bluff to command the entrance to Port Phillip Bay. Shortland's Bluff is the land on which the Fort now stands. Construction of the Fort itself began in 1882 and it was armed with large muzzle-loading cannons and later breach-loading cannons, many of which is still on display.

Lunch, at the conclusion of the Fort Queenscliff Tour, will be served at the Royal Hotel.

FERRY TO SORRENTO - After lunch we board the 1.00pm Ferry to Sorrento where we travel onto Point Nepean National Park in the coach.



Fort Pearce, built in 1912 and deserted after WWII, was buried under 44 years of sand carried by the gale force winds that whip over the point, until a retired Black Rock couple dug it up with a bucket and shovel. As the sand began to shift, the fort's rooms were revealed - a Dressing Station, Artillery Store and Shelter Room.

Of the five fortresses, Fort Nepean is the biggest and the oldest. It was built in 1882.
FORT RIDE - a "Tractor Train" transports people around the island to its many attractions.

It was the first time Australia formed a war cabinet dealing specifically with all war matters.
