HISTORICAL SUB-COMMITTEE ORIGIN OF THE ODE

The ode is the fourth verse of the poem "For the Fallen" written by the poet and writer Laurence Binyon and first published in London in the Winnowang Fan; "Poems of the Great War". For the Fallen was written by Binyon, as a

tribute to those who served their country in times of danger, and particularly, to those who paid the supreme sacrifice.

The Ode was in common use in commemoration services in Australia in 1921, and has since been recited in every RSL, each evening by the President or his Deputy. Also, all RSL meetings commence with a 'Silent Tribute', and at least part of the Ode. The intention is to remind ourselves, that we are about to attempt work, which is aimed at giving assistance to those who are bereaved, incapacitated or otherwise in need of help as the result of action against an enemy in times of war.

The few harmonious words of the Ode have become a universal eulogy on occasions, when ex-servicemen and women gather to honour their old friends who have passed on since the wars. A copy of the handwritten verse by Laurence Binyon and bearing his signature is held by both Albert James of Royston Park, S.A. Colwyn B. Williams (Author of this article) and RSL HQ S.A.

*They shall grow not old as we that are left grow old.
Age shall not weary them nor the years condemn.
At the going down of the sun & in the morning
We will remember them*
Laurence Binyon

This very clearly demonstrates, that Binyon was careful to cross all of the letters "T" and the word "condemn" clearly spelt with a "d" not a "t" as is often been mentioned by writers and speakers. It was printed in the Adelaide Advertiser on May 11, 1989 under the heading "Nor years CONDEMN, or is it CONTEMN". From time to time, there have been comments on the exact shades of intent conveyed. Yet it is commonly agreed, that the words kindle a feeling of reverence. We can probably consider such meaning and feeling as these: "They shall grow not old, as we that are left grow old" perhaps suggests: When we ageing ones think of them we remember them only as they were in their youth.

"Age shall not weary them"; The trials of life can no longer affect them - they have passed into a realm of contentment. "Nor the years condemn"; As time passes, there will be no lessening of the strength of their cause; their deeds will be immortal in the history of their country. and finally - "At the going down of the sun, and in the morning we will remember them"; On every day and throughout all nights, we will recall their sacrifices.

The Ode at RSL ceremonies By-Law 20 Sub-article 32.1 of the National Memorandum of Association, sets out the procedures for incorporating the Ode in RSL in RSL Commemoration Ceremonies, in brief, it calls for:

LAST POST

"They shall grow not old (short pause)
As we that are left grow old (longer pause)
Age shall not weary them (short pause)
Nor the years condemn (longer pause)
At the going down of the sun (short pause)
And in the morning (longer pause)
We will remember them (short pause)"
The gathering repeats "We will remember them:
Silence
Speaker says "Lest we Forget"
Rouse or Reveille is played. The ceremony is ended.
The words "Thank you" shall NOT be spoken to end the ceremony.

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THE AUSTRALIAN SUBMARINE AE 2
(Extract from "FIRST IN, LAST OUT THE
NAVY AT GALLIPOLI' by T.R. Frameland
& G.J. Swinden)

The AE 2 was the first Allied submarine successfully to penetrate the Dardanelles, an operation that had significant impact in the early stages of the Gallipoli Campaign and the morale of the ANZAC troops. The submarine had a very difficult road to acceptance as a weapon of war, not at least in Australia.

The cost of the new class of submarine, to be known as the E-Class was £115,000, a significant increase in the £85,000 price tag on the D-Class which the Admiralty had subsequently recommended as better suited to Australian conditions. In all, sixty E-Class submarines were commissioned between 1913 and 1918. They would see service in the North Sea, the Baltic, and the Pacific and twenty-eight were lost in the course of the war. Larger than their predecessors, they displaced 725 tons on the surface and 810 tons submerged. Overall length was 181 ft. beam 22.5 ft. and they drew 12.5 ft. of water (draught). The E-Class were powered by two sets of 8-cylinder diesel engines which produced 1,750 Horsepower, Diesel Oil replaced the dangerous and toxic petrol as fuel. Submerged, the electric motors produced 55 Horsepower. The machinery arrangements translated into 15 knots on the surface and 10 knots submerged. The battery gave a theoretical endurance of 50 miles submerged, but only at 2.5 knots.

The eight E-Class had four torpedo tubes

while the later boats (except those fitted as Minelayers) had five. configured for Minelaying had only three. The AE-2 was not fitted with a gun but that does not seem to have caused concern. The usual E-Class ship's company consisted of thirty-five, including three officers and thirty sailors, although the Australian Navy operated the boats with only twenty-eight.

The successful Tenderer was the firm of Vickers and Sons and Maxims Ltd. who were to build two submarines for Australia at a cost of £105,415 each. The delivery date for the first was set for December 7th 1912 and the second for January 18th 1913. The Australian Naval Board was also quick to decide that the submarines were to have the prefix "A" before the class designation to show they were Australian. Thus the two Australian boats were to be AE 1 and AE 2, making them distinguishable from their RN sisters.

The Commissioning Commanding Officer of AE 2 was Lieutenant Henry Hugh Gordon Dacre Stoker. He was born in Dublin on February 2nd 1882 into a family with no naval connections. He was attached to the London Depot of the RN from November 7th 1913 to stand by AE 2 while she completed her final fitting out. By the time he came to serve with the RAN he had seven years seniority in the rank of Lieutenant.

The First Lieutenant of the AE 2, and effectively the second in command, Lieutenant Geoffrey Arthur Gordon

Haggard was born in 1888, making him six years younger than his Captain, and joined the Training Ship Britannia in 1903. He was a natural for the Submarine Service and ideal as the Commissioning First Lieutenant for the AE 2.

The remainder of the AE 2s crew were volunteers who needed to have complete confidence in their Captain, the only man who could see the submarine's targets and hazards. They needed to trust him and give him what he wanted when he wanted it.

A small detachment of the Australian Naval Brigade was landed near Rabaul to capture the Wireless Station on September 11th 1914 and German communications in the Pacific was disrupted. Just three days later the RAN suffered its first loss. Sent to sea on a patrol off New Britain, the AE 1 vanished without a trace with all hands. The wreck of AE 1 has not been located to this day, nor has a reason for her loss been determined. It seems most probable that she struck a submerged reef which ripped open the thin hull, sending AE 1 to the bottom. AE 2 was now the sole Australian submarine.

The AE 2 was immediately given her first patrol in the mouth of the Dardanelles, alternating with other boats. Just after midnight on April 24th, AE 2 crept up to the entrance of the Straits. Stoker's plan was to enter the Straits after the moon set, and proceed slowly along the surface - slowly so that our wash would not attract attention from the shore, and on the surface, so as to conserve electric power. We hoped in this manner to complete some miles without being discovered by the enemy. Then, at break of day, we would dive.

After nearly an hour of avoiding mines, Stoker brought his submarine to periscope depth. "In order to take stock of the situation; Stoker later wrote, "I remained at 20 feet depth with periscope up". Back in the Straits, AE 2 went deep again with a general sense of direction. The periscope

was raised once more off the small but imposing town of Chanak.

Unknown to Stoker, it was sighted by a Turkish Battleship in the narrows which was shelling the anchorage off the landing beaches. On sighting AE 2s periscope, the Battleship ceased fire and ran for safety at a time when its shelling was becoming most effective.


For forty-five minutes AE 2 sailed up the Dardanelles at seventy feet, which was tremendous progress. Stoker thought he had eluded the enemy craft until he raised the periscope, AE 2 was surrounded by small craft and coming towards them were two tugs with a wire snare between them. At that time, anti-submarine warfare was in its infancy. There was no underwater detecting devices and all surface ships could do was to fire their guns at the submarine; ram or drag wires and chains through the water in an attempt to damage the submarine's hull. The only escape avenue for AE 2 was to dive and turn 90 degrees to the approaching snare.

Having altered course, AE 2 rose to twenty feet and Stoker raised the periscope again. The submarine was in the centre of the Strait and heading for the Sea of Marmara. The AE 2 ended her career on April 30th 1915.

The survivors were picked up by the Torpedo Boat 'Sultan Hissar'. It was also the first day of a long incarceration as Turkish Prisoner of War. For pay purposes the men in the AE 2 were all deemed POWs from May 15th while the Naval Board decided that all of the AE 2 men would receive their full wages and Submarine Pay until they returned to England.

On May 25th 1915, the American Ambassador in Constantinople reported that three Officers and twenty-nine men had been captured and made P.O.W.
