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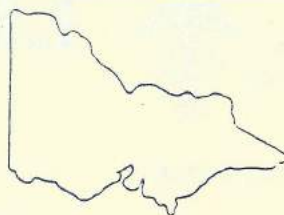

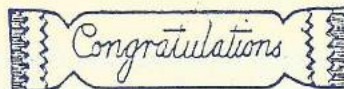
### WELFARE & BETTERMENT SUB-COMMITTEE

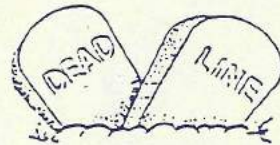
### EDITORIAL

### **SKILLS PUT TO THE TEST**

No amount of training can prepare you for the breathtaking experience of a 50-metre swim in a Puckapunyal Dam in August.

That was the verdict of the 4<sup>th</sup> Brigade Administrative Support Battalion (4 BASB), based at the army barracks in North Road, Oakleigh, after teams competed at an inter-unit weekend event.

The contest was part of the selection process for the Annual Military Skills Competition held at Puckapunyal on 28/29<sup>th</sup> August 1999.

Warrant Officer Class 2 Mark Latter said the contest subjected participants to a gruelling course which replicated – with one obvious exception – the conditions faced by troops in action.

Teams had to navigate through unknown territory, evacuate their injured colleagues from a deadly minefield, making split-second decisions and solve problems, hunt out the enemy and set up ambushes, and cross a raging river.

The winning team was composed mainly of personnel from the Health Services Division.

suitably mounted on a polished timber board, and all 4 B.A.S.B. Army Reserve personnel are eligible to participate annually. The successful participants of the Award have their names placed on the surround of the Trophy over future years.

This Trophy had been donated by the RAEME Assocn (Vic) Inc. from their weapon collection held at Oakleigh Barracks.

The President of our Association Peter Cartledge, 4 members of the Committee, (together with their wives), including Roma Cox and Geoff Maggs (LM) and his wife Nancy (seen in the Assocn's Blue Bomber Jackets and Caps), had been invited by the RSM 4 BASB WO 1 W.J.P. Gilbert to observe the Military Skills Competition on Saturday 28<sup>th</sup> August 1999.

The RAEME Assocn Committee members felt this invitation to observe the Competition first hand was very beneficial – most of the Other Ranks had never seen, let alone fire a .303 Mk 4 SM Lee Enfield Rifle, and showed considerable interest in this weapon. They were able to ask questions of members of the Assocn, Present. Some had served during WW II in Papua New Guinea and the South Pacific Areas of conflict during that period.

In addition, some of the Committee were ex-Army Reservists who had also handled

#### THE BOOK THEY BURIED IN CHANGI PRISON

went to Singapore and never came back)

On the evening of February 15<sup>th</sup>, 1942, General Arthur Percival, Commanding Officer, Malay Command, signed the document of unconditional surrender to Japan's victorious 'Tiger of Malaya' General Tomoyki Yamashita.

The surrendering of the British Singapore garrison represented the final confirmation that the Japanese 25<sup>th</sup> Army's 70—day long Malayan Campaign had not been in vain and had delivered Britain one of her greatest ever military defeats.

Immediately following the surrender, the beaten and demoralised British and Australian troops were ordered on a heart-breaking 25 kl march from Singapore central to their prison quarters in Changi on the island's north eastern tip. As they trudged past the gloomy walls of Changi Jail, the battle weary troops were thankful that this was not to be their destiny – not yet at least – and their initial POW camps were located at the nearby Selarang Birdwood and Roberts Barracks which were formerly occupied by the British garrison units.

The defeated troops were soon to learn that British and Australian women and children captured in Singapore and Malaya were being held inside the jail. Maintaining morale among the imprisoned Allied

civilian prisoners never lost hope added a further challenge to their problem.

As their first Christmas in captivity approached, an unnamed Australian in Selarang came up with a brilliant idea – why not make gifts for the children in Changi Jail.

To the surprise of Aussie POW's, their Japanese captors agreed and inmates began making toys to be delivered to Selarang's AIF Education Centre, a camp unit established to bolster morale through education.

As the troops completed their toys – model cars, dolls, trains and ships and many other creative gifts, they handed them to the Education Centre for the required inspection of the Japanese Commander, General Saito and his staff.

Twenty-seven year old Sgt David Griffin, NX 69235, one of those recruited to form the original nucleus of the Education Centre, could not make toys but he was able to write stories. Thus was born the idea of writing a book for the Changi Jail children. Griffin's friend and fellow inmate, Leslie Greener, was an accomplished artist and agreed to do the illustrations. They also sought the assistance of another POW, Bruce Blaikey, who operated the only typewriter in the camp to do the typing.

Christmas was approaching fast, and Griffin made due allowances for illustrations and handed his creation page by page on to Blaikey for typing. The typist in turn passed each page on to the artist. When completed, the pages were bound into a little book which 36 hours later, went on display along with the toys.

At the appointed time, General Saito arrived with his staff and was conducted round the exhibition. On leafing through 'The Happiness Box', one of the Japanese inspection party, with some command of the English language, suddenly became agitated. He noted that a key character in the book – Winston the 'Chi-Chak' lizard – bore the same name as the British leader

General Saito and his group became immediately suspicious. They believed the book was an ingenious collection of secret coded messages between the military prisoners housed outside the jail walls and the civilians imprisoned within.

The Japanese ordered the book to be confiscated and destroyed. In the confusion that followed, the Australian prisoners managed to spirit the volume away and hid it along with some Divisional documentations in an ammunition metal container which they buried within the grounds of their prison camp. There it stayed for the duration of the war.

Following the liberation of Singapore on September 5, 1945, 'The Happiness Book' was dug up and returned to its author. The original copy survives, lodged in the State Library of New South Wales.

#### MAJOR-GENERAL NORMAN VICKERY CBE, MC, ED – A SEAGOING SOLDIER

The Australian Army in two World Wars became famous as a fighting force and the Australian Infantryman was acknowledged as being among the finest, if not the best. But little is heard about the men in Supporting Arms – the Cavalry, Gunners, Sappers, Pioneers, Drivers and all those others whose job it was to keep the cutting edge sharp and ready. At the outset very few Australian soldiers were professionals, coming into the Army as they did from all walks of civilian life. Some of the older men may have had previous War Service and many trained in the Militia (or what is now termed the Army Reserve).

Such a one was Norman Vickery who died in Melbourne on 4<sup>th</sup> August aged 81 years.

He was educated at Sydney Church of England Grammar School and went on to

with a degree in Economics. His introduction to the Army was via the Sydney University Regiment in which he was commissioned in 1938. When the war was declared he wasted no time in volunteering for Active Service in the 2<sup>nd</sup> AIF. His official army number was NX 130, a very low figure which was indicative of his keenness to serve.

On 12<sup>th</sup> February, 1940, as a Subaltern (Lieut) in the 2/1<sup>st</sup> Fd Regt RAA, he arrived with the regiment at El Kantara in the Suez Canal, where they manned anti-Aircraft guns at Port Fuad, Sidi Bisir and Aboukir before moving on with the 6<sup>th</sup> Division into the Western Desert against the Italians.

In the Bardia battle, by now a Captain, he was FOO (Forward Observation Officer) for his regiment operating from a Bren Carrier, a small lightly armed tracked vehicle, which was 'On Loan' from the Queen's Regiment. Their task was to find and indicate targets and correct the fall of shot. As they approached the town of Gaza outside of Bardia, they suddenly found themselves behind an enemy field-gun battery and a garrison of 1,000 Infantry armed with Machine-Guns and Anti-Tank Rifles. Vickery's reaction was to call for regimental fire on the map-reference of the Bren-Carrier's position, and then charge the enemy's position firing their only weapon, a Boys Anti-Tank Rifle. The Italians surrendered!

Vickery returned with the whole garrison trudging along in front of the carrier. This action became known as 'Vickery's Bluff', and not surprisingly he was awarded the Military Cross. The first awarded to an AIF officer in WW II.

Vickery acquired a reputation as a highly efficient Gunner officer with the nickname of 'Hawkeye'. By 1943 he was a Major and 2 i/c of the Naval Bombardment Group, RAA. This small unit came into being in the South West Pacific Area due to the requirement for a specialised army group to liaise with naval vessels carrying out bombardment prior to landings.

After the war ended Norman Vickery

Law and was admitted to the Bar in Victoria. In 1961, at the age of 44, he became the youngest Judicial appointment in Victoria as a Judge of the County Court. He retired from the Bench in 1983. In the meantime, he continued his army interest becoming Commanding Officer of the Melbourne University Regiment in 1951 and Commanding Officer of the 31<sup>st</sup> Medium Regt RAA in 1956. In 1963, he was promoted Major-General and Commander of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Division and Citizen Military Forces Member of the Military Board in 1966.

The Bombardment Liason Officers were a very small unit and it is a very strange fact that after the war several of them became Lawyers and Judges, which indicates the quality of these very efficient soldiers.

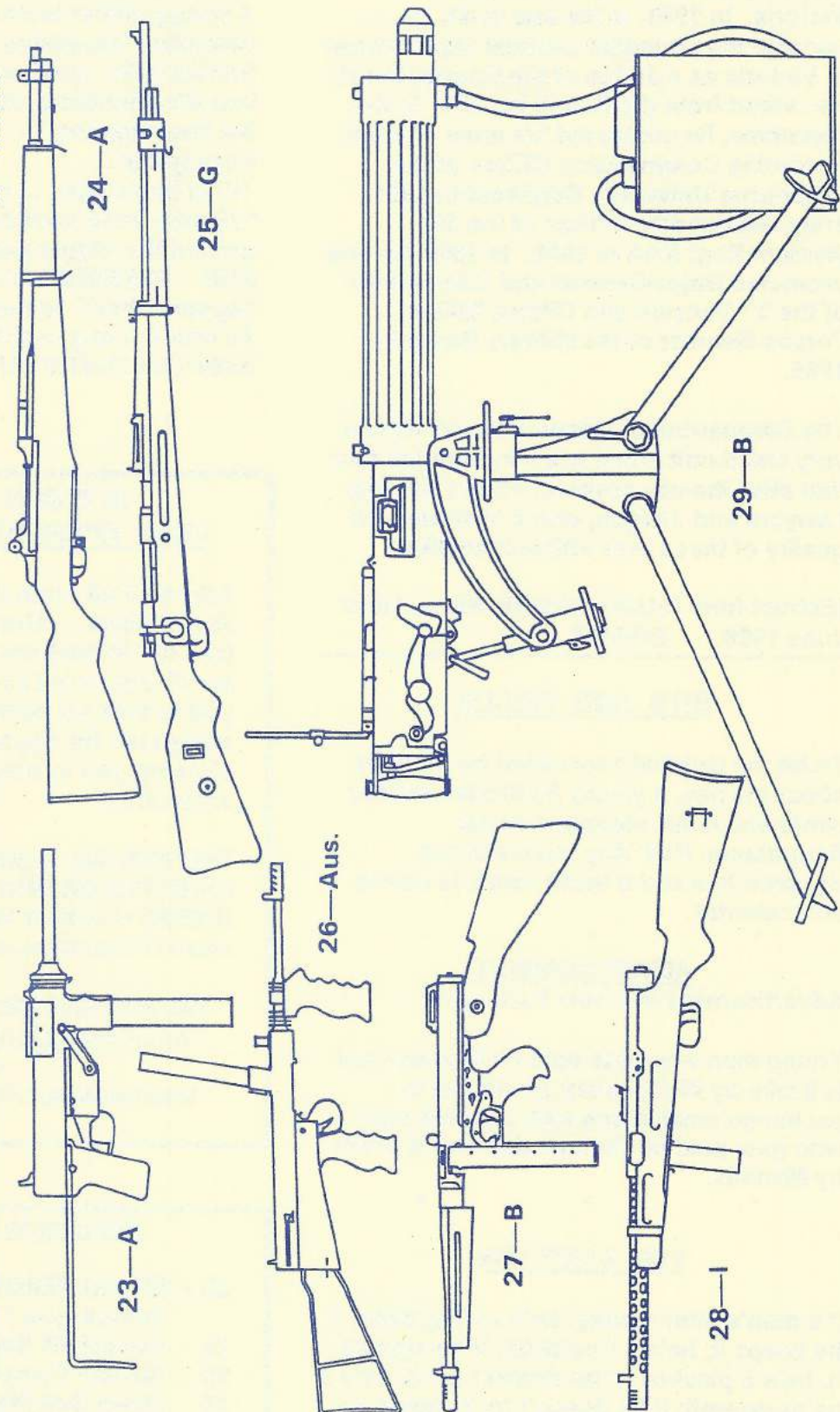
# INFANTRY WEAPONS OF W.W. II

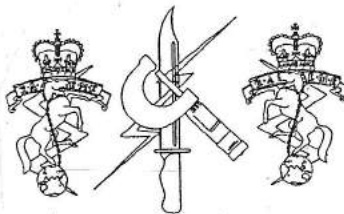

### A BOOK WITH A STORY AS GOOD AS THE STORY IN THE BOOK...

When Singapore fell to the Japanese in February 1942, many English boys and girls were among the civilian prisoners held within the forbidding walls of Changi Jail, on the island's Northeastern tip.

Facing severe morale problems themselves, a group of Australian soldiers, also captives of the Japanese at Changi, realised something had to be done for the morale of the youngsters condemned to such grim surroundings.

Thus 'The Happiness Box' was created for Christmas, 1942. It was written, illustrated and bound with such materials as could be found within the prison camp.

But the Japanese were highly suspicious of the little book, one of the key characters, Winston the lizard, bore the same name as the British wartime leader, Winston Churchill.

A ranking Japanese officer spotted 'The Happiness Box' and ordered its confiscation. In the confusion that followed, the Australian prisoners spirited the book away and it along with some Divisional documents in an ammunition container which they buried within the grounds of the prison camp.

There it stayed for the duration of the war. Following the liberation of Singapore in September, 1945, 'The Happiness Box' was dug up from its secret hiding place and returned to its author. The original copy survives, lodged in the State Library of New South Wales.

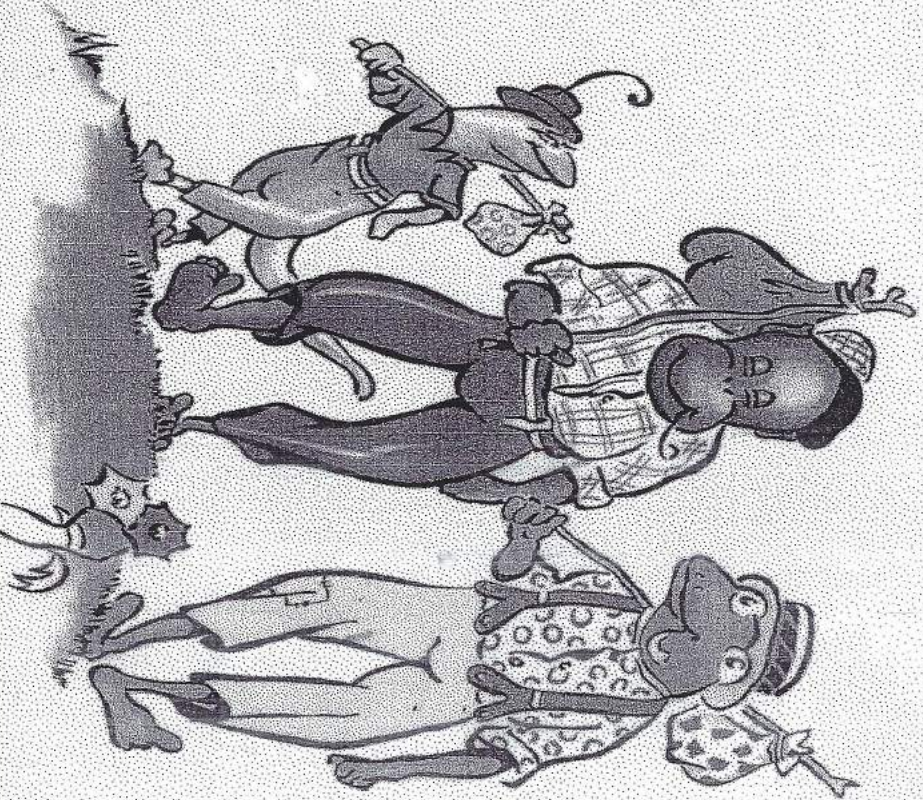

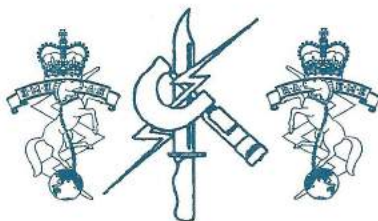
