

ANZAC DAY DAWN SERVICE – OAKLEIGH BARRACKS 25th APRIL 2001


For those who are able to attend the Dawn Service at Oakleigh Barracks, we look forward to members swelling our ranks at this impressive Service.




We have 24 people booked already for this trip, however the Motel can only accept another 12 Bookings for that weekend – so first in best dressed.







ANDREW (Jack) BALSILLIE MBE.

The longest serving member of RAEME since its existence as a Corps to have had continuous service in the Australian Army from World War II retired after 40 years of service on 22nd July 1985, marked the end of an era in Australian Military history, and for the Corps, the loss of one of our best loved and most dedicated members.

He was Maj. Andrew (Jack) Balsillie. Born at Bendigo (Vic), Jack enlisted as a RAEME Workshop Apprentice on 19th July 1945 in the days before the establishment of the Army Apprentices School Balcombe (Vic). His five year apprenticeship was undertaken at the then Victorian Lines of Communication Workshop, Broadmeadows, later redesignated Sth Comd Wksp, and later redesignated as 3 Base Wks, and on its completion, Jack served at the Workshop as a Fitter Armament.

By November 1957, Jack had attained the rank of Warrant Officer Class 2 and was posted to RAEME Trg Centre, Bandiana, where he served until August 1959, as an Assistant Instructor in armaments.

Jack's first full-time association with Artillery Corps came in 1959 with a posting to Malaya to serve as Officer (Warrant Officer) in Command, "A" Fd Bty, LAD and 101st Independent Fd Bty LAD. Whilst in Malaya, Jack spent many off-duty hours searching World War II battlefields for relics, and shipping those of historical value back to the Australian War Memorial in Canberra

His greatest find, and certainly that of most historical significance for Australian Military history was the locating of the site of the "ROSE FORCE AMBUSH". Using war diaries, and other accounts, Jack found the ambush location, and shipped back relics of this, the first action of the Second World War between Australia and Japanese Troops.

After serving in a number of postings in the rank of Warrant Officer Class 1, Jack was granted a Quarter Master's Commission in 1967 and was appointed to the rank of Lieutenant.

In 1969 - 1970 saw Jack, with the rank of Captain, serve on the HQ First Australian Task Force, and Australian Force Vietnam, in South Vietnam. During this time, continued his historical work for the Australian War Memorial.

From 1970 until 1972, Jack held postings at 3 Base Wksp Bn, Broadmeadows, and the 3rd Cavalry Regiment, Townsville, but in 1972 was posted back to commanding an LAD with an Artillery unit, this time 4th Fd Regiment. The Regiment clearly was predominantly manned by members of the Royal Australian Artillery Corps (RAA), but while he was posted there, Jack saw that he and his LAD became as much a part of "4th Fd" as any of the gunners.

To this end, he worked tirelessly to keep the Regiment's equipment in peak condition, and in doing so, earned a unique respect from the members of the Regiment and the Artillery Corps itself.

In late 1981, Jack served as OC Sydney Workshop Company. Part of the role of the workshop was to support the Royal Australian Survey Regiment, and through dedicated support, Jack developed a close association with the Survey Corps.

For his extraordinary services commanding supporting workshops, Jack was appointed an Honorary member of the Royal Regiment, Australian Artillery in July 1981, by the then Corps Director, and was entitled to wear Artillery insignia ... a rare distinction for a serving soldier, and as an Honorary Surveyor of the Royal Australian Survey Corps.

AWARDS - Maj Balsillie's awards include: the

Australian War Memorial. This Medal was awarded in the New Years Honour List 1970. War Medal GSM with clasp Malaya, Vietnam Medal, Long Service & Good Conduct Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, the National Medal, and the Vietnam Campaign Medal.

Maj Balsillie joined the RAEME Association (Vic) Inc. on 8th July 1995.

TOUR OF THE BATTLEFIELDS OF THE WESTERN FRONT IN FRANCE

(Following my Tour of Gallopli, which appeared in April 2000, Issue 39 of 'The Flash' I undertook a further Tour of the Western Front).

In the morning, we left Bursa for Istanbul, along the way we were taken to visit the Green Mosque, Ula Mosque (see what I mean), and the silk market.

We spent the next two nights in Istanbul visiting the Crimean War Cemetery, and the hospital where Florence Nightingale worked. Then flew to Paris, stopping at Vienna on the way.

On arrival at Paris, we were given a bus tour of that magnificent city, with the imposing Eiffel Tower. We were given the privilege to be the Honour Guard for the relighting of the Eternal Flame in the Arc de Triomphe at 6.00pm. This service is performed every night by the French Legion of ex-Servicemen.

Two days later, we travelled through the Verdun-Reims area, where we saw the underground tunnels of the massive forts of Veaux and Douaumont, which revealed the horrors of war on the Western Front.

The next day we travelled to Mont St. Quentin and viewed the Australian 2nd Division Memorial. In Peronne, we saw the displays of the Historaile Myseum and the nearby villages of Bray and Corbie. A full day was spent seeing the village of Villers Bretonneux, and the school that was rebuilt from a penny donation by Victorian schoolchildren. Standing in the quadrangle of the school, you can't help but notice the 2ft high letters spelling

“ Never Forget Australia “ painted on the front of the school’s sheltershed.

The Tour passed the rail junction of Amiens, which action cost more than 1,200 Australian lives, plugging the gap caused by the Germans. In the afternoon, we passed through the village of Le Hamel, and visited the Australian Corps Memorial Park at Saily-Le-Sac, and then onto the 3rd Division Memorial at Pozieres “Gibraltar Site” and the ‘Windmill Site”, where during the battle of Ponieres, Australia had 24,000 casualties.

A full day was spent travelling to Herleville and Bullecourt, where we were warmly received by the villagers and joined them in a short march to the Memorial Service in the town. What is very moving is to see the Australian flag flown from the Town Hall and the Victorian State flag flown on the town memorial along side that of the French flag. This was in honour of Lt Colonel C.W. Dailey, and the 413 men of the 6th Battalion AIF, of those who died (mostly Victorians) whilst liberating the village.

We were taken to the Town Hall for a light lunch, courtesy of the village. We visited the local Primary School, where the children sang ‘Advance Australia Fair’ for us. On viewing some of the displays these schools have, in one was a poster of an Australian soldier, with the caption, “This man is your friend. He fights for freedom”. Even in this day and age, these people are determined never to forget.

Then onto Flanders, Lille, Tymcot, Passendale, Polygon Wood, Hill 60, Messines Ridge, and the Menin Road, the scenes of battles that cost some 38,000 Australian casualties. A further stop at Vimy Ridge, where you can view the well preserved trenches and dugouts of WW I. That evening some of us marched with the British Legion at the Last Post ceremony at Menin Gate, held every evening at 8.00pm.

Then driving by coach to Calais and across the English Channel to Dover by ferry.



BRITISH COMMONWEALTH
BASE WORKSHOP
By Lt Colonel A. Chapman Rtd.

The following is intended only as an unofficial history of the British Commonwealth Base Workshop, a large integrated unit of considerable interest and importance in the general history of RAEME, if for no other reason than that literally hundreds of AEME and RAEME personnel served in the unit during the period of its existence, from 1946 to the time of its closure in 1956.

Apart from its function as an Occupation Forces Workshop, and later as a Base Workshop for the British Commonwealth Forces engaged in the Korean War, it was of importance and value in several other regards:-

It afforded valuable experience to Field Rank Officers in command, conduct, control, and operation of an integrated unit operating in a foreign country.

It afforded Junior Officers and NCOs in charge of Workshop Sections, practical experience on a large scale.

It, along with many other Occupation Forces and United Nations units throughout the country, provided steady employment for many thousands of indigenous personnel after cessation of hostilities.

After the surrender of Japan in Aug '45, the country was occupied by Allied Forces of World War 2, notably the U.S. and member nations of the British Commonwealth.

Research into the subject suggests that the first AEME personnel to arrive as part of the Occupation Forces was an RAE Regt LAD. Also that the first AEME Workshop to be established in Japan was 34th Bde Workshop.

This unit was formed largely from AEME personnel who were serving on the Netherlands East Indies island of MORATAI when the war ended, many being recruited from 13th Aust Adv Wksp, AEME. 34th Bde sailed from MORATAI on 13 Feb '46 and on arrival in Japan, was established in the Kure area of Southern Honshu, approximately 20 miles from HIROSHIMA.

In June '46, the main body of the U.K. Occupation Force also arrived in KURE Harbor from MADAS, INDIA. This force included a draft of 6 Officers and 180 Other Ranks from 10 Base Wksp, REME, and on arrival in JAPAN, combined with 34th Bde Wksp, AEME, to form an integrated British Commonwealth unit.

During the ensuing few months, strength of the British Commonwealth Forces increased and as a consequence the repair workload became heavier. During Oct '46, the workshop was enlarged, and to build up the workforce from as far away as KOBE and OSAKA.

On the outbreak of the Korean War in June '50, British Commonwealth Occupation Forces became British Commonwealth Forces Korea, with Base HQ in KURE. The workshop was now the British Commonwealth Base Workshop, and to cope with the added workload from KOREA, was enlarged still further.

HQ and No. 1 Shop, along with quarters, messes, and the various other essential administrative elements remained in the KURE area, while No. 2 Shop occupied a large Japanese locomotive workshop building, adjacent to the RAOC Vehicle and Gun Park at HIRO, 7 miles from KURE.

A prime function was now the Base Overhaul and repair of all types of vehicles, guns and other equipment used by the Commonwealth Forces in KOREA.

On instructions from "Q" Br., HQ, BCFK, specific Base Repair Programs were undertaken, e.g. "100 Trucks, ¼ ton G.S." or "50 Trucks 3 ton G.S." etc.

These vehicles would be concentrated at No. 2 Shop, HIRO, stripped to the bare chassis, and after return of fully reconditioned MUA's from No. 1 Shop, KURE, were reassembled, rewired, road tested, and returned to the Vehicle and Gun Park, HIRO. Similar procedure was adopted with regard to "A" vehicles, guns etc.

During the decade or so of its existence, approximately 7,500 "B" vehicles were Base Overhauled by the workshop, and in addition, the unit handled a proportionate commitment of Armt, S.A., "C" vehicles, instruments, telecommunications equipment, etc. Also Fd Repairs for Commonwealth units located in the Base area, were carried out.

In addition to the Machine Shops, No. 1 Shop at KURE contained several other large and important sections, e.g. textiles, wood-working, rubber, telecommunications, instruments, the armoury and the Ordnance Stores Section.

Total strength of the unit at the height of its activities was approximately 2000, made up of more than 300 U.K., Australian, Canadian and N.Z. military personnel, and about 1,650 Japanese male and female civilian employees.

Run-down of the unit began early in 1956 and Britcom Base Workshop finally closed on Sep 10th of the same year.


Several major articles of interest were sent back to Australia during the close-down period, and were located in the MOOREBANK/INGLEBURN area. Hopefully these items would remain as a lasting memory of a large Army Workshop in which many AEME personnel served.

The items referred to were two Japanese 50mm Naval cannons, the Officer name board at 2 Base Wksp Bn. MOOREBANK and the Gateway structure across the entrance to 101 Fd Wksp, INGLEBURN. The later item was originally erected across the main entrance to Britcom Base Wksp at KURE, and in this position carried the name "STURDEE BARRACKS", in Honour of Lt General V.A. STURDEE CBE.DSO. Colonel-in-Chief of the Corps of RAEME, prior to H.R.H. The Duke of Edinburgh, accepting the title.
