


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

Due to an extensive overseas business trip, followed immediately by holidays, I missed out on having this segment in the last Lightning Flash. I hope that Xmas was enjoyable and that 1993 is being kind to you.

NOW A CALL TO ACTION.

Anzac Day is close at hand and with it the Anzac Parade through the streets of Melbourne to the shrine. A prime opportunity for us to satisfy the main purpose for which the Association was formed " To preserve the memory of those Comrades who have died on service".

It will always be up to the individual to determine how he or she will observe this historic and revered occasion, however I am making a special appeal to members to participate in the Melbourne march.

For the first time permission has been granted to parade the RAEME CORPS BANNER in the Melbourne Anzac March. A decision not taken lightly as it requires a guard of at least 100 armed soldiers who have to be rehearsed, quartered and transported for the occasion. The Corps Banner is not likely to be on parade for many years to come.

The Colonel Commandant ,Brig Ermert, will be leading the RAEME parade. Brig Ermert is also contacting all RAEME Associations in the state (there are seven in all) asking them to support the parade by marching behind the RAEME Banner on this occasion rather than their normal place in the parade.

We have, of course, accepted the the invitation and also the responsibility to marshal the various elements behind the Banner on the morning of the march.

The role of RAEME requires that it be fragmented during war and training for war. In peace we should try our best to be united as one in all things. Here is a golden opportunity, not only for all Associations to get together, but for serving and former serving individuals, Associations members or not, to come along and take part in the march.

I say again, I am appealing to all RAEME Association members and recipients of this issue of the Lightning Flash to make a special effort to march in Melbourne on Anzac Day and to encourage others to do the same.

Details of the march and Reunion are included in this issue. Hope to see you there.

The ANZACs of 1915


Since that fateful day in April 1915, many tributes have been paid to those who fought and died on Gallipoli shores during the early part of World War I.

The following are some of the more memorable of these tributes and observations, and which are considered worthy of again being presented at about this time of the year. They portray "Anzac" in a somewhat different light.

Turkey

Unlikely as it may seem, one of the most moving tributes came from the lifetime Commander of the Turkish Forces, Kemal Attaturk, who in 1934, had a memorial erected on the shores of Gallipoli Peninsula, on which is embossed the following epilogue, dedicated to the fallen Anzacs.

"To those heroes that shed their blood, and lost their lives, - you are now lying in the soil of a friendly country. Therefore rest in peace. There is no difference between the Johnnies and the Helmets to us where they lay side by side, here in this country of ours. You, the Mothers, who sent their sons from far away countries, wipe away your tears. Your sons are now lying in our bosom and are in peace, after having lost their lives on this land they have become our sons as well."

Reciprocal monuments were also set up in 1985 in Canberra, A.C.T., Albany, W.A. and Wellington, in New Zealand.

Tributes

A British Wartime author, Ashmead-Bartlett, in his book "Dispatches from the Dardenelles", wrote as follows,

No finer feat of arms has been performed during the war, than this sudden landing in the dark, this storming of the heights, and above all, the holding on to a position thus won, whilst reinforcements were being poured from the transports. These raw Colonial troops, in those desperate hours, proved themselves worthy to fight side by side with the heroes of Mons, the Aisne, Ypres and Neuve Chappelle."

Truly a wonderful tribute, but at what a cost; for on the first day of the Gallipoli Campaign, of those 15 000 men put ashore, the casualties were over 5 000 wounded and 2 300 killed.

In another part of his book, Ashmead-Bartlett wrote,

told me that he could not praise the courage, endurance and soldierly qualities of his Colonials enough, and said the manner in which they hung on to the position the first day and night was a magnificent feat which has seldom, if ever, been surpassed."

Heroes

The Official Australian War Historian for many years, Dr.C.E.W.Bean, wrote, "Never in history was a campaign richer in pure heroism, and conscious self-sacrifice."

Another historian, describing the campaign, wrote as follows, "Had not the Anzacs been ordered away from the Peninsula, all the Forces of Darkness would never have availed to push them back into the sea."

A German military commentator, referring to the evacuation of the Australians and New Zealanders, when 40 000 men were evacuated over a period of several nights, suffering only 2 minor casualties, commented as follows;

"As long as wars last, the evacuation of Suvla and Anzac, will stand before the eyes of all strategists as a hitherto unattained masterpiece."

Shocking Lists

No Anzac address should be given, or no account written, without inclusion of the shocking casualty lists. It is here worthy of note, that in addition to the Australians and New Zealanders, other countries suffered extremely heavy casualties in the Campaign, notably England, France, and India.

About half a million Allied troops landed on Gallipoli between the first assault and the evacuation. half a million troops opposed them. In those 259 days, half of the one million men who fought on the Peninsula became casualties, about a quarter of a million men on either side.



In addition heavy casualties were suffered by the Sikhs, Punjabis, and Gurkhas.

A British War Correspondents tribute is a fitting final quote. "All was done that men could do, but all was done in vain."

He added, "That is Anzac's Epitaph."

An interesting letter appeared in the above Issue relating to our Association in Victoria I have included in this Issue the extract in full, but make no comment apart from saying we are in fact here for all Wars and Conflicts where RAEME have served, and that many of the Vietnam members are now members of our Association also: I think it is also fair to advise you that we have always had a good working relationship with the RAEME Vets. Association.

This is an extract verbatim from 'The Bluebell' and where comments appear in brackets they are from the Editor of 'the Bluebell' and NOT 'The Lightning Flash' or the Committee of your Association.)

The following letter is published but, it is to be pointed out that it is not, nor will it be (at this stage) the opinion of the current Executive.

Members,

The purpose of my submission is to bring to your individual attention, some of my thoughts gleaned from my past association with the Association and the knowledge I acquire due to my employment as a member of the Dept of Defence.

FIRSTLY THE PAST:-

It's not secret that the Vietnam Veterans community has had a rocky acceptance since 1972, but it's true to say that those days are behind us. Because of the atmosphere at that time, a few of us decided on ANZAC Day 1984, with a bit of amber help, to do something about it and so, for the first time, the RAEME Vietnam Veteran community marched as a separate group within the Vietnam contingent.

Later, at Chapel Street, after the March and a few pithy comments and suggestions, the Association was born.

The Inaugural Committee Meeting was held on 23 Sep '84 and consisted of Dennis Clarke (Pres), Noel Catheray (Sec), Bill Slegers (Treas) then John Forster, Bob Fuller and Graham McNees. 'The Bluebell' hit the streets in Nov 1984. You all know what followed, the Welcome Home parade in Sydney, followed by the Melbourne March, Vietnam Veterans Day and, now, in Oct 1992, the Memorial in Canberra. Between 1984 and now, a lot of people have done a lot of work. We were, and are, a success.

THE FUTURE:-

First let's get one thing straight, the next comments are not intended to denigrate the work that has gone

view to developing the future.

The following facts are relevant:-

- a. As an Association we are restricted to one conflict, Vietnam.
- b. Kuwait has already been added to the Memorial Wall at the Shrine in Melbourne and we have some RAEME Veterans but they are not eligible to enter our Association.
- c. The home of the Corps is still RTC, but the primary focus in Victoria is in the new depot at Oakleigh. (I query that very much. ED)
- d. The RAEME Association includes many members from other conflicts.
- e. Brig Ermert, previous DGEME, is patron of the RAEME Association in Victoria as well as Colonel Commandant of the Corps.
- f. There are no separate RAEME Vietnam Association (as distinct from the RAEME Association) in NSW. (We cover the whole of Australia. ED)
- g. The RAAOC Association is able to march under separate Banners but all congregate at Oakleigh after the March.
- h. The RAEME Colours, accompanied by a guard, will be present at the next ANZAC Day March (in Melbourne) - arranged, I believe, by Brig Ermert.
- i. While there are two separate Associations, there is a potential for disagreement and our must eventually die by virtue of our restriction to a certain conflict.

I, therefore, suggest that our future lies in amalgamation with the RAEME Association where we can bring our collective knowledge and experience to bear to help build a long lasting Association.

Then we would have an Association where all RAEME personnel, including those still serving, can be a full member.





MEMBERS PROFILE

As has been our custom in all issues of the Lightning Flash to date we are including potted histories of well known members of the Corps. In this issue we intended to give you details of the oldest member of the Association, Tom Money. Due to editorial difficulties I will not be able to do this but pledge that it will be published in our next issue.

The following are tributes to younger members who, I am sure are well known to all of us.

THE RADAR MAN

3166577 Warrant Officer Class 2, James Harold Breeze, OAM, RFM, EM enlisted with 14 National Service Training Battalion on 6th January 1954 having spent previous years in the senior school cadets. After 90 days initial training he was posted to 40 Heavy Anti Aircraft Regiment (40HAA) RAA at Coburg in Melbourne's northern suburbs.

Initially GNR Breeze served as a Technical Assistant, Royal Artillery (TARA) (CP operator for anti aircraft) where he learned to mirror write on aircraft plotting boards.

He was promoted to temporary Bombadier on 20/10/57 and three months later to temporary Sergeant.

With the disbanding of 40HAA in 1957, SGT Breeze transferred to 132 Div Loc Bty located at Batman Avenue, Melbourne. SGT Breeze was made substantive Sergeant on 7th June 1959 and on 24th January 1963 he was promoted to Warrant Officer Class 2.

During a camp in 1967 CAPT Snowball from 15 Fd Regt helped start a unit workshop for 132 Div Loc Bty. WO2 Breeze, a qualified radar mechanic and electronics technician made constant use of the workshop facilities for equipment repair. In that same year WO2 Breeze was awarded an efficiency medal.

In 1971 WO2 Breeze completed a corp transfer to RAEME to become ASM of 132 Div Loc Bty, then located at Landcox St, Brighton. In 1986 WO2 Breeze was awarded 2 clasps of the RFM. He held the posting of ASM until 132 Div Loc Bty was disbanded in 1987, a period of 16 years. He is the longest serving member of 132 Div Loc Bty and holds the twenty-sixth number ever issued by the Bty.

WO2 Breeze then transferred to 2/15 Fd Regt in September 1987.

Now after 37 years service to the Army Reserve, 17 served with RAA and 20 with RAEME, WO2 Breeze has retired.

Of great significance during this lifetime of service to the Defence Force of Australia was the awarding of an Order of Australia Medal on 26th January 1979. This medal was awarded in recognition of his application of exceptional civilian skills to enable 132 Div Loc Bty to train and exercise over many years at a level that would not have otherwise been achieved.

The award goes on to state:-

"In the early days of locating, no mortar locating radar was available in the Australian Army and WO2 Breeze was instrumental in conversion of a number of aircraft tracking radar (3MK7) to this task from designs developed by Unit Officers. This design was accepted by the Regular Army and incorporated in all subsequent modifications."

Jim's reserve army career has been supported by his wife Barbara and their children. Amongst Jim's personal interests is his membership of the Templestowe RSL.

From his many friends in both RAA and RAEME Corps we wish Jim well in his retirement.

THE MAN IN THE WRECKER

WO1 Brian (Tinga) Tingwell, a staff member at RAEME training centre, retired on 11th July 1992 after 36 years of service.

Brian began his Army career with the 20th National Service Battalion on 3rd January 1956 as part of a compulsory National Service program. After joining the Army he was posted 19 times throughout Australia in Land, Logistic as well as Training Command postings. Brian also saw service in both Vietnam and Papua New Guinea.

A formal Farewell Dinner was held in the RAEME Corps Sergeants Mess on 26 June 1992. This dinner celebrated his service to the Army and commiserated with him on reaching the end of his career. As testimony to his achievements, in excess of ninety guests attended from around Australia to officially say farewell.

During Brian's outstanding career he was awarded the Vietnam Medal, Defence Force Service Medal, GOC Field Force Command Commendation and a Commanding Officers Commendation from the RAEME Training Centre.

Prior to his retirement, WO1 Tingwell has been working as the OIC Recovery Section. During Brian's time at RAEME Training Centre it was noticed that Brian considered himself a budding capitalist as he endeavoured to establish a trout fishing farm in the Vehicle Wing wading pool. This enterprise was undertaken with the SI of Vehicle Wing at the time, MAJ Mark Martin, in order to establish a trout fishing day for the hard working Vehicle Wing staff.

Vehicle Wing, on behalf of the Corps and the Recovery trade, would like to say 'thank you' to Brian Tingwell, not only because of the work that he has done during his time with the Army, but also his invaluable advice and expertise which he has freely offered to all members of the Defence Force.

We take this opportunity to wish Brian, his wife Elaine and family, good luck and best wishes for the future.



History and Meaning

The Flag of Australia, the winning design in a contest which drew some 32,000 entries, was created in 1901 at the same time as the Commonwealth of Australia itself was inaugurated under the slogan

"One People: One Destiny: One Flag".

It was a Flag that had been a whole 400 years in the making, beginning with the Union Flag of England and Scotland and ending with the emblazoning of an ingenious and striking device of stars.

The Flag was accepted immediately by the people and, although originally intended mainly for use by the Government and Armed Forces, by 1947 it had become so immensely popular that the Prime Minister, Mr. J. B. Chifley, declared it was to be flown "freely" and "with appropriate respect". In 1953, the Prime Minister, Mr. R. G. Menzies, and Opposition Leader, Mr. A. A. Calwell, both strongly supported The Flag Act, signed personally by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, which designated the blue ensign to be The Australian National flag was proclaimed by Act of Parliament and acclaimed through the length and breadth of the land as the symbol of a fully independent and autonomous, mature and united Australia.

Some people today talk rather vaguely about "having our own flag" because we are now "grown-up" and independent".

If they were more familiar with Australian history they would know that we gained our Australian National Flag in the first place for the very reason that we were then already grown-up and independent, it simply isn't true that our parents were not just as mature and patriotic Australians as we are.

History shows in many ways that they were, some would say, more so. Certainly, our generation would not be acting as responsible, grown-up people by tearing up our birth certificates and disowning our parents, family and friends. "A sign of true maturity is a proper perspective about values, goals, achievements and relationships" (Dean Emeritus T. W. Thomas).

A nation's flag, if it is a good one, is not only distinctive and pleasing in design but, more significantly, tells the important things about that nation. The flags of many nations look much the same and their meaning is quite obscure but - just look at our Australian National Flag and think about it for a minute, and you will realise very quickly that it is recognisably Australia's flag and no other country's.

The Union Jack, Southern Cross and Commonwealth Star tell us the important things about Australia; together they reveal our national character and clearly distinguish us - our history and geography, our founding and federation, our true entity and identity.

THE UNION JACK The Union Jack which incorporates the three Crosses of St. Andrew, St. George and St. Patrick, symbolising the spiritual attributes of loyalty, chivalry and devotion, is the most illustrious of all flags but, more directly relevant to us, the Union Jack is the flag under which each of the six Colonies on the Australian continent had been founded. It affirms our Christian and British origins, culture and institutions - the Crown, Parliament, common law, religion, language and literature - which are the enduring foundations of the liberty we enjoy. It reminds us, too, that it was the people of the British Isles who ventured as far as this remote, unknown continent, not just to look for trade and riches and return home but to settle, explore, pioneer and civilise this harsh primitive land and to found, inspire, defend and prosper a virile new nation.

Above all, they gave us the highest form of democracy devised by mankind: Sovereign with Parliament.

The exploits and fortitude of these British men and the courage and devotion of their womenfolk is a source of inspiration to all generations of Australians.

Their proud descendants later were to open their gates and hearts to millions from less-happy lands coming here to share in our freedom and good fortune.
