





Member's Profile



As promised in our last Issue here is the Profile of Tom Money, a name which is familiar to us all in the Association. (EDITOR)

Tom Money was born in Port Melbourne, and after marrying, he and his wife moved to Northcote in 1925 and still resides in that area. Tom worked for Machin and Co. in Elizabeth Street in the city for 43 years, brought up 2 boys and now has 6 Grandchildren and 5 Great-Grandchildren.

Tom joined AEME the day it started on 1st Dec, 1942. After joining AEME, Tom spent five years away from home and family in the South Pacific area as an Automotive Electrician, Welder and Motor Transport Fitter. He recalls that most of the men who formed AEME were first-class Tradesmen well into their thirties.

We went as groups everywhere - from Field to Base Workshops. The war was a proud time for Tom, but carried a lot of sad memories.

There were a few good pals - six of us - who used to be old cobbers, but five of them never came back from overseas. My worst memory was being away from home and family for five years.

Enduring shell attacks and illness, Tom modestly said of AEME "We were required to get out a bit, but I don't think it was really that dangerous." Tom lost more than 12kg during the war, suffered skin complaints and severe eye and ear infections and when he returned home - weighed less than 57kg.

Recently, RAEME celebrated its 50th Anniversary at Bandiana and Tom Money was the Guest of

Honour. The oldest living 'original'. At the Parade celebrations, Tom cut the Golden Jubilee Cake with RAEME's youngest member - an 18 year old Apprentice. Tom said "It was an honour to me to represent the "originals" at the Jubilee festivities in the presence of high-ranking officials from Australia and around the world.

Tom Money, you are a credit to our Association, and we are all proud to know you and have you as a member.

OPENING OF THE DEFENCE CHAPEL, VICTORIA BARRACKS, MELBOURNE



The earliest reference to the present Victoria Barracks site was an advertisement in the Victorian Government Gazette, dated 15 July 1856, calling for tenders "for the erection of a temporary office and stores, and for a two rail fence at the site of the new Military Barracks." The first substantial building erected was the Soldier's Barracks (G Block). Then followed F Block 1856-57; J Block in 1858. The basalt buildings A,B and C Blocks were constructed or commenced between 1860 and 1862.

The Defence Chapel, Victoria Barracks, is one of the eight remaining buildings dating back to the 1850's-1869's period. Erected as quarters for Married Soldiers in 1862, this residence is one of the few surviving links with the original residential functions of the Barracks. The Illustrated Australian News, 19 Apr,1869, page 98, refers to it as follows: "passing through the South Gate are first the Guard Room, next a range of rooms set aside for Married Quarters." The construction of rendered brickwork and with hipped slate roof was in contrast to the stone work of the other 1856-64 era buildings and provide a useful foil to their solid and austere qualities. Surviving garden remnants enhance this Married Men's Quarters.

Plans for the Married Men's Quarters were

Pickering was approved as the Contractor on 31 Oct,1862 at a price of 207.19.0 (\$414:00). The work was obviously carried out satisfactorily as a contract for additions in fitting a water closet was signed with James Duncan for 807.0.0 (\$1,614.:00) The cottage has remained substantially intact over successive years until circa 1981-82 when the timber skillion sections to the North and East were demolished.

During the greater part of its 130 years history, the Cottage served first as Married Men's Quarters and then as residence of the Barracks Caretaker, the last Caretaker being Maj. Kenworthy. Since 1970's it has housed in turn the Federal Police, gardeners and Barracks Tradesmen.

In Sep.1991, the Head of the Defence Centre - Melbourne, Brig. D.J. Noble, accepted a submission by Chaplain A.K. Thoms to convert the Cottage into a Defence Chapel for the benefit of all members of the Defence community in the inner Melbourne area. The Defence Chapel would also be a centre for the collation of Chaplains from the three Services.

Refurbishment of the Cottage began in May,1992 under the supervision of the Regional Heritage Architect, ensuring that the preservation and restoration were in harmony with the historic nature of the building. Construction work was carried out by the Department of Administrative Services Asset Services.

The Defence Chapel was Blessed and Dedicated by members of the Religious Advisory Committee to the Services, assisted by representatives of the Principal Chaplains Committees, and opened by the Chief of the Defence Force, General P.C. Gration, AC,OBE. on 10 Nov, 1992.

It was with great deal of pride and pleasure that I assumed the restructured Head of Corps Position as the DEME on 12 December, 1992.

In this latest restructuring, the combined Head of Corps and Head of Service functions have been separated. The Head of Corps function of prime personnel adviser to the MS and to SCMA for all ranks remains vested in DEME, together with the responsibilities for providing advice to HQ ADF, Army Office Divisions and Functional Commands on EME Operations, Establishment Planning, Organisation, Doctrine and Training. These responsibilities are discharged through the Director-General of Land Warfare Policy to the Deputy Chief of the General Staff.

The Head of Service function of Materiel Maintenance, enhancement of Engineering Standards and associated policy now resides with the Director-General of Engineering. The Maintenance Engineering Agency, our premier engineering institution, now comes under his direct control as part of Materiel Division. EME systems and procedures has also been transferred from Head of Corps to HQ Log Comd.

As the second largest Corps in the Army and the

very active partner in the ongoing reviews and studies on how the Army will do its work in the future.

In the afternoon, a Sports Day was held, followed by a traditional Australian Barbecue in the KANGAROO CLUB to celebrate the occasion.







THE ENTOMBMENT OF AN UNKNOWN AUSTRALIAN SOLDIER AUSTRALIAN WAR MEMORIAL, CANBERRA - REMEMBRANCE DAY, 11th NOVEMBER, 1993

Our Association is one of the numerous ex-Service Associations that has been advised by the Australian War Memorial, Canberra of their proposal to have an Entombment of an Unknown Australian Soldier on Remembrance Day, 11th November, 1993.

This event will coincide with the 75th Anniversary of the end of World War 1 and will be the last significant anniversary at which surviving Australian Veterans of that conflict can be present. Apart from being a final opportunity to experience a direct link with the nation's past, the return of the Unknown Australian Soldier will focus national attention on what the Australian War Memorial represents - the universal spirit of sacrifice.

The Unknown Soldier, one of the thousands of unidentified Australian soldiers of the First World War buried in a battlefield cemetery in France and Belgium will be returned to Australia. While it was in this region of the world that Australia experienced its greatest loss of life in war, the War Memorial regards the Unknown Soldier as a symbol of the sacrifice of all Australians who served and died in all conflicts.

It is proposed that the Unknown Soldier will lie in state in two locations before departure for Australia - at the Australian National War Memorial at Villers Bretonnens and at the Menin Gate at Ypres, Belgium. The remains will then be conveyed by an aircraft of the national carrier QANTAS from Paris to Sydney early on Sunday 7th November, 1993, then a RAAF aircraft will convey it to Fairbairn's Airport, Canberra. A gun carriage will be used to transport the coffin to King's Hall at the old Parliament House where it will lie in state for three days.

To make this a truly national event, it is the War Memorial's desire to have a high level of community participation in particular from ex-Service Associations.

On the morning of Thursday, 11th November 1993, it is envisaged that representatives from as many Associations as possible will form a Guard of Honour for the Unknown Soldier during the last stage of his journey up ANZAC Parade. Here it will be carried to the Memorial in a funeral procession befitting the burial of a Field Marshal.

Following a simple ceremony at the stone of Remembrance the Unknown Soldier will be carried into the Memorial, past the Pool of Reflection and the Roll of Honour and laid to rest in the Tomb at 11.00am.

The Australian War Memorial also welcomes as many members of all Associations and their families as possible to be present at the Memorial on that day.

Full details of the Memorial Service, itinerary (similar to the 50th Birthday Weekend), cost for transport and accommodation will be advised at a later date when more information comes to hand.

The RAEME Association (VIC) requests as many of its members, and their families, to keep this important event free in their social calendar of events if they are desirous of attending.

In 1967, HQ CRAEME 3 Div was relocated from HQ 3 Div "Grosvenor", Albert Park to the above Depot, 8 Fd Regt LAD and 3 Base Wksp (CMF Component) was raised and also located there also.

Chapel Street Trg Depot became the home to RAEME Reserve Units within Victoria from which all technical and Promotion Courses were conducted.

To this end RAEME Assn Social Committee have organised an afternoon for Past & Present Members and their partners to enjoy a luncheon and Mess hospitality in the Depot where we established many memories over the past 34 years.



ELECTION OF OFFICERS AND VACANCY

- 23(1) Nominations of candidates for election:-
- (a) shall be made in writing signed by two members of the Association and accompanied by the written consent of the candidate (which may be endorsed on the form of nomination); and
 - (b) shall be delivered to the secretary of the association not less than 7 days before the date fixed for the holding of the annual general meeting.
- (2) If insufficient nominations are received to fill all vacancies on the Committee, the candidates nominated shall be deemed to be elected and further nominations shall be received at the annual general meeting.
 - (3) If the number of nominations received is equal to the number of vacancies to be filled, the persons nominated shall be deemed to be elected.
 - (4) If the number of nominations exceeds the number of vacancies to be filled, a ballot shall be held.
 - (5) The ballot for the election of members of the Committee shall be conducted at the annual general meeting in such usual and proper manner as the Committee may direct.
 - (6) The Committee shall meet within 14 days after being elected and shall from its members elect the Officers of the Association.
