

'The Lightning Flash' continues to receive 'RAVE REVIEWS' from various quarters, particularly from other Associations who envy the standard we have reached so far.


You, as a member, can make the efforts of the Sub--Committees worthwhile by:


Where Are We?

Open shop with light refreshments and a tea's with seating for 50 plus








See the Japanese Tank captured by the Australian soldiers at Milne Bay in August 1942. The first land defeat of the Japanese invaders in World War 2.

This display is an important part of our Australian History. Nearly every piece of equipment shown here was manned, operated and maintained by Australian soldiers in order to keep this country free.



THE MELBOURNE TANK MUSEUM VISIT



Member's Profile



Harry Wallis SWITZER

Warrant Officer Class 1 Harry Switzer (Ret.) was always affectionately known as 'DAD' SWITZER.

Born 17th MARCH, 1918, at Yarraville, VIC. Harry enlisted in the RAAF during 1939-45 as an Instrument Maker. Have you ever heard Harry tell you on of his escapades in the RAAF?? Like the time he and a few other RAAF ground crew members were detailed to dig a female latrine for the WRAAF and for a joke they installed a loud speaker in the bottom of the pit. Boy! What a scurry there was by the ladies in all stages of undress, when a voice below them shouted, "Not now ladies we're not finished in here yet!" HA! HA!

During WW2, Harry married his lovely wife Peggy and raised two daughters. On being demobbed from the RAAF, Harry joined the P.M.G as a signwriter at their Workshops in Sturt Street, South Melbourne.

On 13th Sept, 1956. Harry enlisted in the ACMF with 112th Inf Wksp RAEME with the rank of Temp/ Sgt. On 21 Jan '58 he was confirmed in this rank, and on 4th April, '60 was promoted to Warrant Officer Class 2.

30th June, '60 saw him transferred to the newly formed 8/13th Victorian Mounted Rifles (APC) Regt Wksp RAEME then located at Chapel Street Trg Depot, East St. Kilda,

under the then command of the late Capt. (later Maj) Derek Snowball, who had as his 2 i/c a young Lieut (later Maj. Frank Bell.

It was during their 1st Annual Camp with the parent Unit at Wangaratta that a humorous incident occurred. The CO of 8/13th VMR (APC) Regt (Col Allard's) Command Ferret Scout Car had developed radiator trouble. This was removed and placed against a tree in the Vehicle Park. Harry remembered reading in one of the cfn's Record of Service that he was a qualified radiator mechanic - a gift horse sent from heaven, or so Harry thought at the time. Detailing the young cfn in question to go down to the Vehicle Park and see what he could do with the problem. After a while, the cfn reported to Harry that he could not find the radiator. Taking the Cfn in tow, he took him back to the Vehicle Park to where the radiator was located. "Oh!" Was the reply when shown the object, "I can't fix that - I can only repair elements on electric radiators." At this, Harry tore off his Beret, throwing it on the ground and jumped on it in frustration. (THIS IS THE TRUTH, AS I WAS THERE AT THE TIME... The Editor.)

On 2nd JUL, '60, Harry qualified as a Motor Vehicle Testing Officer, and on 4th JUL, '61, qualified on the 2/61 'A' Vehicles Course conducted by a certain WO1 DON HORSELY (the name sounds familiar). 17th JUL, '62 Harry was promoted Warrant Officer Class 1, (Artificer Vehicles). 5th NOV, '62, Harry added another string to his service record by qualifying on the 1/62 (CMF) 105mm Howitzer M2A2 Course.

With the re-organisation of the ACMF, Harry saw further service with 2 Recovery Coy (4.9.63 - 13.1.64) and then with 7 Coy RAASC (GT) Wksp (14.1.64 - 7/7/65). His final unit was 3 Base Wksp (CMF) Component from 8.7.65 until his retirement on 17th MAR, 1968.

On making enquiries into the origin of his nickname of 'DAD', your Editor was told it was because he looked older than anyone else, and he took the young recruits under his wing like a father - hence the nickname.



Have You Made Your Will?

In these days of increased hazards on the roads and even in homes, it behoves us all to make our wishes known regarding a Last Will and Testament.

No matter how much or how little we may possess, we cannot take it with us, but unless we leave behind some directives as to its disbursement we can cause a lot of headaches, and possibly bad feeling among relatives and friends.

the act of making a will is a simple one, and as long as your signature is witnessed by two persons - other than beneficiaries, your desires can be acted upon, but the aid of a Solicitor in drawing up of a will can avoid costly litigation later in clarifying vague clauses.

Regardless of who assists in the preparation and the witnessing of your will, an important act to bear in mind is the fact that it is imperative that all signators use the same fountain pen when signing.

The increased popularity of the use of ball-point pens have increased the suspicions of the Probate Office, as these inks do not have a uniform degree of 'fade' and although the same pen might be used on the same piece of paper for the three signatures, after a lapse of even three years they can appear as if signed at different dates.

your completed will can be lodged for safe keeping with any of the following:

- a. your Bank;
- b. Solicitor;
- c. Insurance office; or
- d. you may prefer to keep it at home.

For people belonging to large organisations, like the Services, provisions are made available where you can receive advice, and lodge your will.
