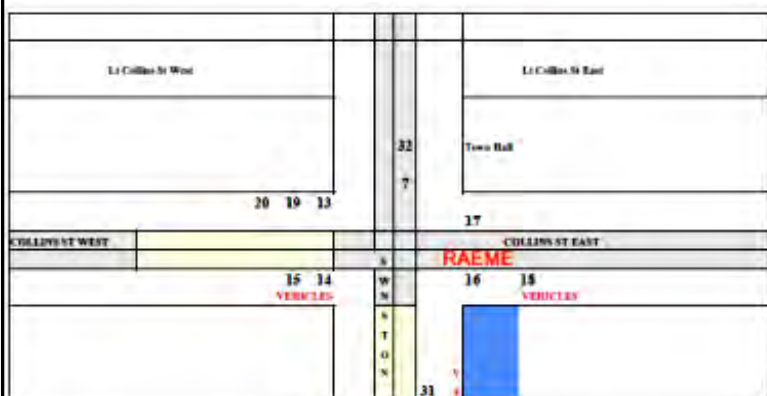

News

The Government has recently announced that Rheinmetal secured the \$5.2 Billion Land 400 Phase 2 Contract. The ASLAV fleet will be replaced by over 200 Boxer CRVS. The first 25 vehicles will be built in Germany, with the remainder to be built at the yet to be established Military vehicle Centre of Excellence in Ipswich Queensland. Rheinmetal under Land 121 Phase 3B are supplying over 2,500 specialist modules to the Australian Defence Force.

A Slight Mishap

A group of five sappers and one craftsman came into the American Camp at Long Binh after a number of days setting up two Fire Support Bases. They decided to go for a feed and drink at a large club within the base. After a couple of drinks the craftsman left them and walked back to the Australian Section within this enormous camp. The Australian Section, comprised of five well built level areas, with a different logistic unit occupying each, dug into the side of hill.

There were metre deep horizontal drains across each level, draining into a two metre drain at one end. A road climbing up the hill beside the drain provided access.

There was also a minor road in the centre, connecting the levels with culvert, covering the lesser drains, which were ideal cover during rocket or mortar attacks. On return he entered the tent and took to cleaning his SLR.

Some time later heard an almighty crash, which caused him to look out of the tent. What he then saw was a Mk 5 International tipper upside down over a drain, about 40 meters from the tent. The craftsman could count only four dazed men, near the truck.

There were originally three sappers in the cabin and two standing on the rock fill, in the tipper behind the cab. One of the sappers on the truck tipper managed to jump clear, but one was left beneath the tipper tray amongst the large rock fill. Some quick communication established the dilemma.

A TD 15 International bulldozer was sitting parallel, with its tilt-bed trailer, which had been disconnected from the truck sitting away from it, opposite the tent. He jumped into the dozer's driver's seat and reversed it over to within two metres of the truck. He noted there was heavy chain with a large heavy hook at one end conveniently placed beside the operator's seat. The hook fitted the 50 MM tube integrated into the top of the tipper tray. He then wrapped the chain around the rippers on the rear of the TD 15, drove the dozer forward to roll the truck back on its wheels, causing it to clear the drain. The drain was full of rock ballast from the tipper. One sapper picked up a shovel and proceeded to move some of the rock. This was quickly removed from him and thrown clear. At this time they had attracted a large number of helpers American and Australian to help, remove the rocks. It wasn't too much longer before we had a very red faced sapper removed from the drain. All in attendance were most relieved. It was amazing that he had suffered no injury or showed no outward signs of shock. He was placed in an American ambulance and taken to the nearest medical centre.

The Mk5 tipper would tow a tilt-bed trailer with a TD 15 International, D4 Caterpillar or Case back hoe. The rock was used as ballast-weight to stabilize the truck, when mobile.

The Sapper returned to us the following day, looking none the worst for what would have been a traumatic experience. This craftsman later lost a close friend, in an Army truck accident in Western Australia: Warrant Officer Class II Graeme McNees (The Quiet Achiever)

NEWS FROM THE ARMY SCHOOL OF ELECTRICAL AND MECHANICAL ENGINEERINGS (ASEME)

New Badge and Flag for the Army School of Electrical and Mechanical Engineering.

Army and Air Force personnel at the Army School of Electrical and Mechanical Engineering (ASEME) assembled on the 8 Aug 18 to conduct a Unit Insignia, Flag and Unit Shoulder Patch change ceremony.

The changes from the RAEME insignia to the current unit symbology have been brought about to cement the bi-service nature of training to RAEME, RAE and RAAF technicians.

The reference to the Army Apprentices School insignia, which was also used for the Army College of TAFE, reflects on the Army Apprentices' School's history and is symbolic of the values that are required of all military technicians, values which still remain unchanged to today.



The meaning of the badge shown above is as follows: At the apex of the badge is the Crown of the Sovereign, expressing allegiance to the Sovereign, Superiors, Duty and Country. Superimposed on a cogwheel, which represents trade and technical training, is the English Cross of St. George, depicting the virtues and development of character. The St. George's Cross is then overlaid with crossed, doubled-edged swords, representing military qualities of courage, discipline and physical fitness. Superimposed upon the swords and the cross is a flaming torch of learning.

Prior to becoming ASEME, RAEME Training Centre was the Corps school, which all members of RAEME attended throughout their career to develop technical mastery.

Today ASEME conducts initial training for ground technicians, as well as Army aviation technicians, as they progress through their careers.

In the future, ASEME may also include elements of the junior officer training. It will continue to have an important part to play in the provision of maintenance management training and development.

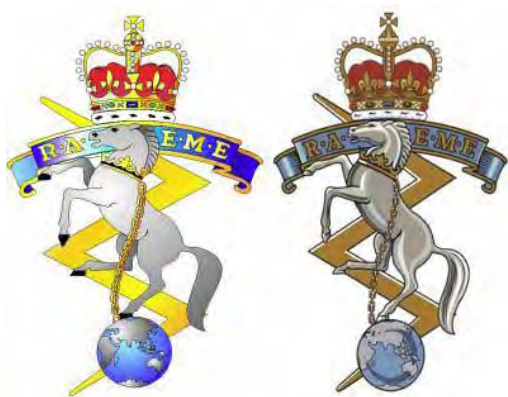

Spanners lead the way for Army Drone Racing

ARMY has a Drone Racing Team and has raced admirably at their first hit out at the Australian Drone Racing Nationals, held recently in Nerang on the Gold Coast.

First Person View (FPV) Drone Racing has been called the 'next big thing' in motorsports. Racers control small radio-controlled quadcopters equipped with cameras and wearing head-mounted displays showing the live camera feed from the drones for navigation, directional control and obstacle clearance. The goal is to complete a set course as quickly as possible, racing in heats of four.

The team brought Army racers from around Australia together in Canberra to qualify under Australian FPV Racing Association scrutineering, and teamed these racers with Defence Force Recruiting to support the Drone Nationals 07-09 Jul 17.

Top placed from the Army racers was LT Mark Sheppard, an Army Reserve maintenance engineer from 5CSSB in Sydney, placing 45th amongst Australia's best. He said that "it was great to talk technical with like-minded racers. I was really impressed with some of the unique ideas that people had incorporated in their builds to make each drone a little faster and more durable."

Second placed, immediately behind in 46th position, was CFN C, a Vehicle Mechanic from 2 Cdo Regt in Sydney. CFN C commented that, "the camaraderie and sportsmanship between competitors was awesome - everyone is willing to help each other, even if that means they might get beaten by them in the next race".

Once eliminated during the fly-offs, the Army racers spent time in the crowds. CFN C explained that, "engaging with the people in the crowd who have never seen drone racing before was fun, especially when we showed them racing the goggles for the first time: seeing their reactions was great". The Army team showed hundreds of spectators this view over the course of the weekend.

Army has two messages about Drone Racing. The first, most immediate, is in support of Army UAS operations: "Do you like flying drones? Army flies them for a job – talk to us!" Secondly, Drone Racers are STEM'ers: people invested in science,

technology, engineering and maths (STEM).

To build and race a drone requires soldering, circuits, coding, aerodynamics, control theory, image processing, and datalinks. This skill set is applicable, to differing extents, across most of the Army trades as we know them in the 21st century. We want these people in Army.

Dear Mum and Dad,

I am well. Hope you are. Tell Brothers Bill and George the Army beats working for old man Jones by a mile. Tell them to join up quick before all of the places are filled.

I was restless at first because you get to stay in bed till nearly 6 a.m. But I am getting so I like to sleep late. Tell Bill and George all you do before breakfast is smooth your Bed, and shine some things. No Pigs to feed, Cows to milk, wood to split. Practically nothing.

Men got to shave but it is not so bad, there's warm water.

Breakfast is strong on trimmings like fruit juice, cereal, eggs, bacon, etc, but kind of weak on chops, potatoes, steak, Pig trotters, pie and other regular food, but tell Bill and George you can always sit by the two city boys that live on coffee and smokes Their food, plus yours, holds you until noon when you get fed again. This next will kill Bill and George with laughing. I keep getting medals for shooting. I don't know why. The bulls-eye is near as big as a Possum head and don't move, and it isn't shooting at you like the Smith boys at home. All you got to do is lie there all comfortable and hit it. You don't even load your own cartridges. They come in boxes.

Then we have what they call hand-to-hand combat training. You get to wrestle with them city boys. I have to be real careful though, they break real easy. It ain't like fighting with that old pig at home. I'm about the best they got in this except for that Bluey Jordan from over in Sea Lake. I only beat him once. He joined up the same time as me, but I'm only 5'6" and 130 pounds and he's 6'8" and near 300 pounds dry.

Be sure to tell Bill and George to hurry and join before other blokes get onto this setup and come rushing in.
