PROGRESS REPORT – WW I Gun Restoration

Great effort and work thus far from our Vice President, Peter Crosby.

Sunday 13 Jan 2019 saw the start of the dismantling process for a WW1 captured gun by 4 BDE. Thanks to the OC and members of 105 WKSP COY and 22ER for their efforts with the dismantling. Various parts will now be sent for sand blasting and undercoating while others will be refabricated. All in all a good days work.

Since then, a letter of correspondence has been received from the Australian War Memorial, with detailed information in relation to colour codes, colour samples and possible disruptive pattern configurations that would help with the restoration process to preserve the historical significance of the gun and to match it to appropriate data for guns captured within that era.

RAEME and CAV Future Capabilities

Plan Centaur

Addressing maintenance constraints within the Armoured Cavalry Regiments (ACR) is the initial focus of Plan Centaur – the most comprehensive and significant improvement program in 30 years to consider the way RAEME may deliver maintenance to Army in the future.

With Phase 2 of the program now underway, work has concentrated on gathering data that will inform a clear understanding of all maintenance-related constraints, issues and interdependencies. Work Streams include:

- A detailed workforce and work practices analysis;
- A review of deployed maintenance structures and lines of maintenance support;
- An examination of actual demand and vehicle usage;
- An evaluation of supply chain practices and procedures; and
- An analysis of maintenance outcomes and root causes of identified issues.

Two "quick wins" projects are also included as part of the Phase 2 program of work, including a "lean" process improvement project at 2 Cav Regt Wksp in Townsville.

The data and issues identified during Phase 2 will be presented at a major stakeholder collaboration event in Darwin in April, where potential solutions will be identified and evaluated by the maintenance community prior to the preparation of business cases for approval by the Army Capability Resource Management Committee. Outcomes of Plan Centaur will also be suitable for other elements of the Combat Brigades.

Plan Centaur's Director General, BRIG David McGahey, said that it is vital that the Land Materiel maintenance workforce and the extended maintenance community get involved with the program.

"RAEME Corps in particular has a vested interest in getting this reform right," BRIG McGahey said. "Centaur presents a critical opportunity for the maintenance community to shape its future."

"We need everyone's input to make sure that Centaur delivers the most effective maintenance capability to support the modernised Army," BRIG McGahey said.

The First Pattern - February 1902

During this time, a badge was urgently sought for the Australian contingents raised after Federation for service in South Africa during the South African (Second Boer) War. The most widely accepted version of the origin of this badge is the one that attributes the selection of its design to a British Officer, Major General Sir Edward Hutton, the newly appointed Commander-in-Chief of the Australian Forces.

Hutton had earlier received as a gift from Brigadier General Joseph Gordon, a military acquaintance of long standing, a 'Trophy-of-Arms' composed of mounted cut and thrust swords and triangular Martini-Henry bayonets that were arranged in a semi-circle around the Crown. To General Hutton, the shield was symbolic of the cooperation between the naval and military forces of the Empire.

The **second pattern** (1902) badge added a scroll with the words 'Commonwealth Horse' and changing 'Australia' to 'Australian'. This badge was a modified version for the Commonwealth Horse.

The **third pattern** (1904) Rising Sun badge carried a scroll inscribed with the words 'Australian Commonwealth Military Forces' and was worn throughout both World Wars. There were, however, a number of variations of the badge; a special version was struck for the coronation of King Edward VII in 1902 and there were badges of the Commonwealth Horse and the Australian Instructional Corps, each with its respective title on the scrolls. This pattern badge formed the template for all subsequent General Service badges.

Corps and regimental badges were reintroduced into the Army and the inscription on the scroll was changed to 'Australian Military Forces'. (1949) **4**th

The **fifth** (1954) pattern badge substituted the Imperial State Crown with the St Edwards Crown. It was approved in 1954 and issued in 1966.

The badge went through another alteration, with the introduction of the Federation Star above a heraldic wreath and the inscription was once again changed to read 'Australia'. However, this design was never fully issued. **6**th. (1969).

The current **7**th (1991) design was produced with 'The Australian Army' on the scroll and the removal of the Federation Star and heraldic wreath.

The Rising Sun Badge was originally called the General Service Badge, but it is now officially labelled the Australian Army Badge. It will, however, always be referred to as the Rising Sun Badge.

Heraldry and tradition should be considered when producing material for Army.

THE AGEING EYE

any of us are aware of the deterioration of our eyesight as we begin to age. Most individuals over the age of 50 require reading glasses as the lenses in our eyes stiffen and lose their ability to change shape to focus on near objects. This deterioration in vision is called presbyopia and is not a disease but just a reflection of ageing. Fortunately, it is easily remedied with reading glasses.

A common condition affecting the eyes as we age is cataract, in this condition, the lenses in the eyes lose their transparency and gradually become opaque. Vision becomes dimmer and it is sometimes described as 'like looking through tissue paper'. Cataract surgery has now become quite sophisticated and the a few are fortunate enough to not need any glasses at all.

In recent years, laser-assisted cataract surgery has been introduced but unfortunately the high expectation of better outcomes compared to usual surgery have not been shown. So there is no justification for spending a few hundred dollars more for laserassisted cataract surgery.

Prevention of cataract is still important by avoiding ultraviolet light. Wearing of hats and sunglasses is now recommended to protect the eyes, even for children.

Another eye disease associated with ageing is called age-related macular degeneration (ARMD). The macular is the part of the retina at the back of the eye, which is used for best or central vision. We use peripheral vision mainly to

cataracts can be removed through a very small incision in the eye and a replacement intraocular lens inserted though the same incision. Preoperative measurement of the eye will allow a lens with the appropriate correction to be inserted. ARMD is now the most common cause of permanent visual loss in Australia, It usually appears

loss in Australia. It usually appears as: a gradual decline in the ability to see objects clearly; distorted vision; dark or empty spaces blocking the central field of vision; and dimming of colour vision.

ARMD affects one in seven Australians over the age of 50 and increases with age, affecting nearly one in five people over 85. It is about three times more common in smokers and appears at an earlier age. Ceasing smoking for 20 years reduces this risk to about normal. The associated visual impairment affects healthy and independent aging and is associated with a risk of falls, depression, hip fractures, and earlier admission to nursing homes.

'Wet' ARMD is twice as common as the 'dry' type and is associated with an increase in new blood vessels in the retina. These can leak or bleed, destroying the cells. in the retina. The exciting news about macular degeneration is that the injection treatment developed a decade ago now appears to stop or reduce the progression of the 'wet' form of this disease. The injections into the eye reduce the growth of new blood vessels. The treatment is now widely available and is listed on the Medicare Benefits Schedule. This has been one of the most exciting developments in preventing blindness in recent years.

The sooner ARMD is detected, the better the outcome, so we recommend regular eye checks.
