These are some of the images from the unveiling ceremony of the refurbished WW1 Artillery Gun that was set in place in Richmond.

Richmond.

1. 150 mm Heavy Field Howitzer Model sFH13

Manufactured by the German firm Krupp in 1915, this 150 mm Heavy Field Howitzer become the Imperial German Army's principal gun of battle in World War I (WW1). Known to the Allied Forces as the 5.9 Inch Howitzer, Australian soldiers respected this weapon for the damage it was capable of inflicting on front line trenches and on artillery batteries behind the front lines.

This gun, serial number 548, was captured by the Australian Corps in northern France under Lieutenant General Sir John Monash in September 1918.

On 18 September 1918, as part of an Allied Un 13 september 1918, as part of an Allied offensive that would ultimately lead to German defeat, the 1st and 4th Divisions of the Australian Imperial Force took a major part in attacking and breaching the Hindenburg Outpo: Line, part of the Germans' heavily protected defensive zone.

defensive zone. The Austrollians' striking success in breaking through German defences, supported by British and French forces, opened the way to a direct assault on the main German defensive position. The Allied offensive presisted until the German command agreed to an armistice, an 11 November 1918. On 18 September alone, Austrolian forces suffered over 1260 casualties, but succeded in taking 4300 prisoners and 76 guns like this one.

2. Recognition for Collingwood

Can 548 arrived in Melbourne in 1919, and was initially stored in the Domain, an St Kildio Road, with other captured weapons, including field guns, trench mortars and machine guns. Here it availed distribution by the Commonwealth Trophies Committee, whose task was to allocate trophies to local municipalities.

Local communities widely regarded war trop as a recognition of their contribution to the as a recognition of their contribution to the war. Large weapons such as field guns could be particularly valued as an affirmation of a community's scarfices, while other smaller trophies such as machine guns were often derided as an affrant to community pride. Thus when offered a howitzer in 1921, the then Collingwood council voted up accept the gun into its care. usly to

The City of Collingwood placed the gun on display in Darling Gardens, facing Hoddle Street, where it remained for more than ninety years.

3. 'A relic of barbarism'

3. A felic of Darbarism Displaying weapons of war in public space could be controversial. To some, the presentation of the gun acknowledged local people's sacrifices, including both those who enlisted and the families who watched them depart. It was a sign of community pride in what their soldiers achieved. It could also recognise what communities had endured in sending their loved ones away to war.

The attempt to remove the gun failed, but it caused local people to consider its meaning. While some saw it as celebrating violence and conflict, others insisted that it reflected the glo of the soldiers' sacrifices and achievements.

Councillor and returned soldier William Ruthve VC, attempted to reconcile the two parties. The gun commemorated the deeds of soldiers, he insisted, but is could also act as a warning. 4. Removal and restoration

Once installed in outdoor spaces, mointaining large weapons of war proved difficult. Wooden parts deteriorated and metal components rusted and corroded. Before and after Word War 2, numerous municipal councils sought to relieve themselves of responsibility for maintaining trophy guns due to their deteriorated state.

Varia City Council removed the Collingwood gun from Darling Gardens in 2013, and began to evaluate its future. Relatively few trophy guns including the Rhomond Returned and Services including the Rhomond Returned and Services the Richmond and Burnhey Historical Society, subsequently advacceted for the restoration of the gun and its reinstallation.

Following a decision of the Council, restoration work commenced in 2018. This included stabilisation of metal components and repainting in the gun's original comouflage scheme. The gun's comouflage was designed to avoid detection from both the ground and air. 5. A new home

In October 2019, Yarra City Council reinstalled Collingwood's trophy gun in the Barkly Gardens. It flanks the former City of Richmond's memorial to its soldiers in two world wars, Korea, Malaya, Borneo and Vietnam.

On the memorial's other flank is planted a descendant of the Lone Pine tree that originally stood on the Gallipoli battlefields in 1915. stood on the Gallipoli battlehelds in 1915. Together they represent the start and end of 1 terrible conflict of 1914-1918. They ask us to think again about the experience and impact war in our own communities.

Battle of Long Khan

If you ever thought that the Vietnam War was over by 1971, despite the fact that our troops were still there, think again. This intense battle proved otherwise, and it again showed that at platoon level, well trained and disciplined soldiers could overcome huge odds. This was the biggest operation 3RAR had been involved in so far on their second tour, and it pitched 'B' Company, [with field engineers 'tunnel rats" from 1 Fld Sqn attached] against tough and experienced North Vietnamese troops with long years of combat achievements behind them.

At the centre of the action was "5" platoon, and to their credit they were able to hold their ground until support from other "B' Company Platoons arrived. For Operation Overlord permission was granted by Prime Minister Gorton, as it was outside and north of Phuoc Tuy province. There was nothing new about this system of working outside of our TAOR province, as each TET Offensive, a large number of Australian forces were deployed out of our TAOR to Bien Hoa province. The enemy had been using the buffer zone between the two provinces to train 3/33 PAVN Regiment. & D445 VC Battalion. before moving them in our TAOR for attack and harassment of military bases and the local village population.

The combined operation of 1ATF – US was aimed at destroying the enemy buffer zone training installations. Artillery fire support would come from American Gunners along with Australian "A" Battery and 104 Field Battery from Fire Support bases Pamela, Trish and Cherie. The plan was for a large blocking force to be inserted, with 4 RAR ANZAC deployed along the line of Suoi Ran river, A Sqn 3 Cavalry Reg to their west and 2/8 Battalion, 3rd U S Cavalry Regiment to the north-east and east along Suoi Ran river. 3 RAR, A, B and C Companies and C Squadron 1 Armoured Reg. with 2 Troop 1 Field Squadron field engineers were tasked with searching for any offensive weaponry such as mines, booby traps and IED destroying enemy bunker systems found in the cordon designated as AO Gwenda. 3 RAR D were held in reserve. 2 Troop two-man splinter teams, carrying mine detectors, were also attached to the tanks and APC supporting 3 RAR.

On the 7th June 1971 the assault commenced. The B Company LZ was only 500 metres, from the enemy and secured by A Sqdn 3 Cav. The RAAF helicopters conveying troops were sighted by "Charlie" and A Company were immediately engaged by intense fire.

5 Plt. B company were also attacked with fire, as they began their search and sighted a large bunker system. The PAVN heavy weapon fire-power was able to stall the 5 Plt. Forward movement, for eight hours till around 5.00 PM. They established what was thought to be the main communist position. With impending nightfall, it was decided to not press the attack. A few shots were exchanged during the night.

This enabled a number of the enemy to escape rapidly on pre- designated routes.

The following morning at 0600 an attack was launched again by 5 Plt. who had only gone 90 metres when all hell broke loose. In the initial burst Pte Hack was wounded and Pte. Mitchell shot through the throat. They engaged the bunkers aggressively with M60 fire, but received heavy fire from all flanks pinning them down. Any withdrawal would have caused higher casualties, so they held their ground. Enemy RPGs were skilfully fired into the trees overhead of 5 Plt. Attempting to gain a better fire directing position, B Company Forward Observer Lt. Ian Mathers was killed.

An Infantry and Armoured assault, using tanks and APC carried D Company along with their splinter teams. The tanks on one flank edged their way towards 5 Plt. And as they reached contact point they received RPG fire from all directions. They countered with H E and canister into the bunkers. RAAF and U S gunships were overhead with gunfire and rockets within 15 metres of the diggers. By 09:15 6 Plt. were able to link up with 5 Plt. and, joined by the rest of B Company. An aerial re-supply of ammunition for the beleaguered platoon, which temporarily

stabilized, the situation. At 11:00 however a second attempt by an RAAF Iroquois re-supply helicopter to B Company with ammunition was shot down by heavy ground fire. Two crew members were killed and another two injured. A number of very brave diggers, ran to save the survivors, while ammunition was exploding among the burning wreckage. Subsequently, another winch point was established to the rear of the Australian positions for casualty evacuation and resupply.

By mid-afternoon, D Company had finally moved into position and commenced an assault with the field engineers, infantry and tanks pushing through, the bunker system from the north-east. The bunker system was found to cover nearly a square kilometre and was wider than the assaulting company. The 100 bunker system was systematically searched with B and D and their splinter teams. The tanks in close support crushing many bunkers and their occupants with their tracks. A defensive overnight harbour position was then established.

C Company had also located an abandoned second bunker system located further south, which, were also destroyed by engineer and pioneer demolition teams.

The Operation ended on 14 - 6 - 1971. Artillery had fired over 1,453 rounds of 105 mm and 200 rounds of 155 mm high explosive from the three FSB. There were 6,000 rounds of M60, along with 6,000 rounds of M16 ammunition. This was then last joint US - Australian battalion sized operation. Long Kahn province, is now known as Dong Nai Province.
