RAEME Remembrance Day - Victoria and Tasmania Region

This is an early warning order that it is proposed to hold a RAEME Day of Remembrance For Victoria and Tasmania in 2006, which subject to support is likely to become an annual event. The date chosen is the nearest Sunday to 1 February 2006. It was decided that it would be appropriate to use the demise of the RAEME Training Centre as a suitable occasion to use for a Day of Remembrance to also commemorate those RAEME personnel we have lost over the years. Regrettably, I was informed last Friday (21 Oct 05) by Ann Martin that our own Corps Birthday of 1 Dec (1995) was sadly used as the date for the official unveiling of the Army Logistic Training Centre. I have therefore gone back into history to find an appropriate date to use for the beginning of RTC. As it took 18 months to move from Ingleburn to Bandiana with numerous milestone dates, I have chosen the date when the order was struck to raise the unit, by the appointment of the first Commanding Officer/Chief Instructor. The official date of raising was therefore 1 Feb 1951, when LTCOL H.L.C. Martins was appointed as CO to raise the unit. It is also fitting to use this date as this renowned officer later, as a Brigadier, became our first DEME when the title was changed from Head of Corps. He served as DEME from 8 Jan 67 - 29 Dec 69, during the turbulent years of the Vietnam War. Further more, the "Brigadier H.L.C. Martins OBE, Memorial Encouragement Award" is still competed for today and awarded to the top junior NCO attending the RAEME Subject 4 (Sergeant) courses at ALTC and the Aircraft Maintenance School in any given year. Sadly Brigadier Martins passed away on 17 Jul 84 and the service will commemorate 21 years since his passing.

For 2006, the nearest Sunday to "1 Feb" will be 29 Jan 06. A booking has already been made at the Shrine of Remembrance for the laying of a Wreath and Last Post ceremony in the inner sanctum to be held at 1100 hrs. It is hoped that those working to form the new Bandiana Sub-Branch will hold a simultaneous Commemorative Service at the RAEME Memorial at the Memorial Park, South Bandiana. It is anticipated that the RAEME Association will hold a further Commemorative Service in Hobart at an appropriate venue. I would therefore ask for all RAEME to mark this timing and date in their 2006 diary. Further details will be supplied ASAP.

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

Lt. Col. Lawrence Raymond Sargeant (RL) E.D.



Lt. Colonel Lawrence Sargeant who passed away on 2nd December 2004, had a long and distinguished military career, well respected within the Corps of RAEME and well remembered by the 1st to 8th Intakes of Balcombe Army Apprentices.

Born on 17th June 1916 at Prahran, Victoria. He commenced his military career in the Militia on 26th January 1939 with 3rd Division AASC.

On 1st April 1939, he was promoted Cpl. on 13th October 1939, was promoted Sgt, Discharged 12th May 1940. He enlisted in the Permanent Military Forces on 13th May 1940.

3rd February 1940, saw him promoted T/Warrant Officer Class II and transferred to the Australian Instructional Corps.

On 3rd February 1942, he was transferred to 46th Infantry Battalion (The Brighton Rifles) and appointed Regimental Quarter-Master Sergeant. He transferred to the Australian Imperial Forces on 2nd February 1943.

30th January 1943, he was promoted Acting Warrant Officer Class I and saw service in Papua New Guinea from 25 Aug - 12 Nov 1943.

On 12th November 1943, he was posted to 114th Lt. AA Regt RAA.

On 4th February 1945 he was posted to Land Head Quarters, School of Infantry.

On 19th November 1945, he was transferred to 3rd Military District Recruiting Staff.

On 24th September 1947, he was posted to 3rd Military District Detention Barracks.

His next posting was to the newly formed Army Apprentices School at Balcombe, Victoria as the School's first Regimental Sergeant-Major from 19th April 1948 until 8th January 1953.

Here was this rather tall impressive military bearing figure greeting apprentices to their first taste of military life.

Whilst at the Army Apprentices School, in an abandoned hut (left over from the days when it had been previously occupied by members of the United States 1st Marine Division recuperating after fighting the Japanese Forces on Guadalcanal Island in the Pacific) he set up a miniature Rifle Range and taught early Intakes of Apprentices how to fire a .22 rifle (you had to pay for your own bullets).

On 28th June 1948, he enlisted in the Australian Regular Army Special Reserve. was discharged on 29th June 1950, and enlisted in the Australian Regular Army on 30th June 1950. On 8th Jan 1953, Lawrence Sargeant was posted to Northern Comd. Wksp in Qld. 3rd

August 1961 he was appointed Regimental-Sergeant Major of 2nd Base Wksp Moorebank N.S.W. On 5th July 1963, was Commissioned as Lieutenant (Q.M.) His next posting was 105 Infantry Wksp (CMF) (later redesignated as 105 Fd Wksp Type 'A')

RAEME ACMF Trg Depot at Chapel Street, East St. Kilda from 28th Sept 1965 - 1st Dec 1965 when he was appointed Staff Capt HQ CRAEME 3rd Division Chapel Street, East St. Kilda.

On 5th August 1966, he was posted to AHQ (Melb) DEME Albert Park Barracks serving under Brig. J. Dean OBE. On September 1968, he was promoted T/Capt. and whilst serving at Albert Park Barracks he had the pleasure of being the Escort Officer to a visiting REME DEME at that time and escorted him around Australia whilst he visited several RAEME units.

Lawrence's postings were as follows:-

12th June 1968, he was posted to PNG Wksp. On 4th September 1968, was promoted Capt. On 17th August 1970 was posted to 1st Avn Regt Wksp at Oakley QLD. On 23rd July 1971, was posted to 3 Base Wksp (ARA) Camp Road, Broadmeadows (formerly 3rd MD Wksp, later as S Comd Wksp. Later redesignated as 3 Base Wksp (ARA) until 17th June 1973. On 24th April 1972 he had been promoted Maj. On 17th June 1973, was placed on the Retired List and on 18th June 1973, was granted permission to wear the uniform of Lt. Colonel.

In later years, Lawrence Sargeant joined the RAEME Association (Vic) Branch at Oakleigh Barracks Oakleigh South and attended many ANZAC Eve Re-Unions and the Annual Widows and Life Member's Luncheons where he renewed many of his old RAEME acquaintances both from the ARA and the Army Apprentices School, Balcombe days.

The RAEME Association Dux of Subject 2 CPL RAEME Victorian Regional Trophy



The History of the Trophy

In 1985 Mr. Geoffrey Maggs (then President of Vic. RAEME Association) and the Association Rep on the Victorian Corps Committee, was requested to produce a trophy for the Dux Subject 2 Cpl RAEME.

Mr. Maggs commissioned Max Moore to produce the Trophy.

The Trophy consisted of a large RAEME Bronze Badge, that was a copy of the Badge on the front gates of Bandiana Officers Mess, The lower base was from an Engineering Trophy presented in 1938 to the top Student of the 1938 Engineering Skills course, the upper base was turned from a CES Jack base.

In 1986 it was presented to the Corps Committee as the Victorian Regional Trophy and was awarded to the Dux of Subject 2 Cpl RAEME that year and every year, until in the 1990's when the Corps Committee withdrew all Regional awards from their Register and only National Awards were retained.

At a RAEME Association (Vic) Committee meeting it was proposed and approved that the Trophy be offered to the Corps Committee as a National Association Award.

The Association Trophy will be awarded to the Dux of Subject 2 CPL RAEME and to be presented to the Winning Student by the Regional COL Commandant and a member of the regional Association.

2005 Corps Committee Meeting & Seminar Report – by COL Terry Beaton

RAEME Corps Committee (RCC) Meeting

The RCC meeting was held on 19 Oct 05. BRIG David McGahey (HOC) officially congratulated COL Graham Smith (Rep ColComdt and ColComdt SA & NT), BRIG George Jacoub (ColComdt-NSW) and COL Terry Beaton (ColComdt – Vic & Tas) on their new appointments and welcomed them to the Committee, before handing over to COL Smith to chair the meeting.

New National Award – At the committee meeting on 13 Oct 05, The RAEME Association of Victoria (RAV) generously presented their magnificent trophy - previously used for the Victorian Regional Award for Subject 2 Corporal - for passing onto the Corps Committee. With due ceremony it was presented to BRIG McGahey. The RCC gratefully accepted the generous gesture and agreed that it would be used for a new National Award of “Craftsman Regimental” acknowledging the top Crafty of the 6-10 Subject 2 for CPL Courses conducted at ALTC in any given year. Like the Brig Marten’s Encourage Award for Subj 4 for SGT, it was agreed that the final name to be used will recognise the generous donation by the RAV.

Corps Subscriptions – SO2 Corps briefed the meeting on the initiative to encourage subscriptions from serving members to the Corps Fund by subscribers receiving a numbered medallion, which will feature our patron saint ST Eligius – Patron Saint of Artificers. To date only 64 serving members have subscribed out of a total Corps manning of 3200. It is hoped that this initiative will prompt more to contribute.

CCEME Note: Although initially targeted at serving members, after debate RCC agreed that any former Corps member could receive this token upon receipt of his contribution to the Corps Fund. Contributions are: ORs - \$26, SNCO/WO - \$39, Officers - \$54. Subscriptions can be made direct to SO2 Corps, HOC Cell

It was also decided that a system would be introduced to indicate year of subscription to encourage subs each year. SO2 Corps also suggested a Dutch Raffle for subscribers seeking specifically numbered medallions. The medallions will come with a hole to enable them to be used as a key ring. When the initiative was presented to the Seminar delegates, its use “to obtain free drinks” in the same vane as the “Old Bastards Card” was floated. This was very well received by the Seminar attendees.

National Awards – The RSM presented the list of winners for the National Awards. These are to be published in the next issue of “The Craftsman”.

At this moment, the Craftsman of Year (GRES) for the Victoria and Tasmanian Region is still undecided.

Banner Miniatures – The RCC agreed to produce another 200 Banner Miniatures. Expressions of Interest can be sent now to the SO2 Corps. A payment in advance will secure purchase and prevent missing out on this next production run before it is sold out. Expression of interest in specific numbers from 200-400 can also be passed to SO2 Corps at time of ordering.

Corps Instructions – It was agreed that all Corps Instructions would be updated next year. Having raised the requirement, COL Beaton volunteered to assist HOC Cell in this task.

Craftsman of Year – It was agreed that Corps Inst No 17 would be the first re-written due to the ambiguous nature of its content that creates several interpretations of the outcomes. The RCC agreed that wef 2006 the recipient of the National Award is automatically eliminated from being also awarded the Regional Award, which will then be awarded to the second named candidate for that region, unless there are no other nominations. It was also agreed that for 2006-07 the National and Regional Awards would not be a monetary prize. Instead the recipients will be presented with a suitably engraved Banner Miniature and the National Award recipients for both ARA and GRES will be flown to Bandiana to have their awards presented at the Corps Seminar.

National Association Meeting 2006 – DHOC (LTCOL Andy Adams) advised that the ability to hold the 2006 National Association Meeting was dependent on funding availability. More advice next year.

Corps Historian – The RCC was briefed on the work carried out (to date) on the EME Display at the Army Museum. Seven of the 12 cabinets allocated to RAEME have been significantly improved, resulting in 178 items being catalogued under the new EME Historical Collection. An appeal was made to the Seminar for contributions of small historical items to be placed in the five remaining cabinets, which currently hold other Corps items. HOC asked for the minutes to reflect a vote of appreciation to COL Beaton for his efforts and to acknowledge the significant improvement in the display.

CCEME Note: Prior to departure from Bandiana, a number of new historical items, including a Bottle of RAEME “Rapier” Port 2005, engraved Wine Glass 2005, place mats from Corps Dinner and a trophy presented in 1953 were placed on display in Cabinet 5.

C-In-C’s Annual Report. COL Beaton raised the issue that in the past the Rep ColComdt and HOC would send an annual report to the Colonel In Chief on his birthday to pass on best wishes from the Corps and to update him on Corps activities. It was agreed to resume this tradition

in light of the BRIG McGahey's attendance at the C-in-C Dinner late last year. HOC reported that Prince Philip stated that this had been his first dinner in about 50 years and to make the most of it, as it will probably be his last. Following discussion, it was agreed that the HOC/RepColComdt would approach Prince Philip to ascertain his availability and willingness to attend a Drumhead Ceremony to re-dedicate his banner during his Commonwealth Games' visit. It will also serve to commemorate the 20th Anniversary of his presentation of the Banner on 20 May 1986.

CCEME Note: At this very late stage, the chance of this activity happening rests with Prince Philip, followed by support from Chief of the Defence Force.

HOC Cell Capability – BRIG McGahey highlighted the difficulty facing the HOC Cell when both he and the DHOC have full time service commitments and that their Corps positions are Extra Regimental Appointments. However HOC reported that at the Seminar, BRIG Barnett (RAAC) will present his findings into the Corps Capability Review initiated by BRIG Ross Grant's farewell letter to Chief of Army. Without doubt the greatest problem facing RAEME at the moment is the significant imbalance in the Equipment Liability to Manpower Asset ratio. BRIG McGahey welcomed the results of the study and their presentation to the Army Capability Management Committee (ACMC) meeting on 28 Oct 05.

Regional RAEME Representatives. The RCC agreed that Corps Inst No 32 should be re-written following the apparent lack of commitment to Esprit de Corps and doctrinal matters by a number of RRRs fulfilling positions appointed by Corps Instructions. It was agreed that from 2006, selected RRR will receive an official letter of appointment from HOC, which will also highlight their responsibility to promote Esprit de Corps in their region in support of the Colonel Commandant.

Pictorial Corps History. Last year it was proposed by BRIG Ross Grant that a Coffee Table style pictorial Corps History be published to follow on from the excellent work done by Theo Barker in his book "Craftsmen of The Army". The RCC was briefed on the inability of the assigned project officer to continue with this task due to personal difficulties. Moreover the suggested compiler/author, James Mason, would not be available until mid 2006. It was agreed to put this project on hold until personnel are available.

Corps Seminar

The Corps Seminar was held 20-21 Oct 05. Over 200 attended. It was opened by LTGEN David Hurley (Chief of Capability Development Group) who has responsibility to achieve the requirements from the Defence Capability Plan. He briefed the Seminar on the processes required to complete the current 29 equipment acquisition projects worth \$2.1 Billion, as well as

presenting the CDF's two primary objectives for the ADF. These were both directed at looking after the ADF's greatest asset – its people; especially as the CDF firmly believes that paramount ADF capability is dictated by its people. Equipment is useless if you don't have people to operate and maintain it. He addressed the current problems on recruiting and retention.

Seminar Highlights:

HNA – LTCOL Jeremy Hansen gave a presentation on CA's concept of a "Hardened and Networked Army (HNA). HNA is a conservative development plan, which in simplicity is based on an Army of "twos" rather than "three", to remove the hollowness (previously called void or deficiencies) from affecting operational planning, ie make two strong from three weak. It is hoped that by 2009 under HNA, the future manning level will rise to 26,442 with few manpower deficiencies and provide an increased response to Governmental directions. Under HNA there is proposed to be a redeployment of units from Sydney and Darwin to form a second Mechanised Battalion, using 3 RAR, around Adelaide. SME is to be re-located to Puckapunyal.

Land Material Maintenance Support Review – BRIG Barnett presented the results of his study, which has identified the need for seven further studies as follows:

- Study One – Training of Tradesmen
- Study Two – Recruiting and Retention (Both operators and maintainers)
- Study Three – RAEME Officer Training – too much logistics and not enough Corps specific.
- Study Four – Operator Training
- Study Five – Use of Data info systems (SDSS/MMM)
- Study Six - Maintenance Mgmt, Procedures and Processes
- Study Seven - Philosophy, Policy and Doctrine (or the lack of new developments)

REME Brief – LTCOL Larry Ratchell (from DEME) presented a brief on the current situation facing REME. Currently 1,741 "All Ranks" are deployed overseas, which represents 18 percent of REME's manpower asset. DEME is staffed by about 60, with DEME(A) under the ACGS with executive, management and professional head of Corps roles. DEME has started its own recruiting drive using two brightly coloured vans travelling to schools and recruiting direct to REME. A great initiative to overcome the drawback of the global outlook taken by Army Recruiting. As such they are meeting 94% of their intake requirements. Sadly the Apprentice School is closed and trade training has been moved to Harrowgate. There is also a possibility that Arborfield may be lost, which means that the beautiful old West Court Officers Mess will be lost and the REME Museum and other REME Schools will have to relocate. The British Army is undergoing restructuring and downsizing. It appears to be undergoing an equivalent process to our DCP project.

This has thrown up many REME personnel who are seeking to continue their Army career in RAEME; especially in light of the unofficial policy of 22 years service and you're out. LTCOL Ratchell highlighted the REME initiative of TSF. However, after groans from the audience had subsided, he said that it stood for Tactical Services Flash and he demonstrated his tri-colour strip flash worn on his DPCU to identify his Corps whilst wearing such a uniform. He also stipulated that in REME, competency has become a very important issue.

TenixToll Brief – Former RAEME Officer Bernie Launger gave a brief on DIDS (Defence Integrated Distribution Systems), which incorporates the commercial responsibilities to warehouse, distribute and maintain ADF equipment currently contracted to a combined venture by Tenix and Toll Logistic Systems, which defeated the bid by the combination of ADI and Fox Logistic Systems. DERs not being met - still seems to be one of the main issues.

RAEME Trade Management – MAJ Mike Opie, (SO2 Trades and Training) gave a presentation on the work being carried out with trade management and trade pay. With the loss of DEME it appears that a trade pay submission has not been presented to the Defence Force Renumeration Tribunal (DFRT) since 1994, ie nobody available to do the work. The establishment of a Trade Cell at the Army Logistic Training Centre (ALTC) some time after 2000 is finally addressing this important issue. The first trade to be reviewed was ECN 226 – Recovery Mechanic. MAJ Opie confirmed that the previous “One Army Policy” was dead and now the emphasis is on providing the “gap” training to enable the Reserve to provide an effective capability. It is hoped that in future all trades will be reviewed on a 3 year cyclic programme starting with ECN 146. It was good to hear that the RAAOC Operator Supply Courses from Jul 05 are teaching Prod Clerk competencies to students. Let's hope they will be posted to RAEME units on completion of training.

New National Award. The Corps RSM, WO1 Tobor Fekete, at the School of Electrical and Mechanical Engineering (SEME) at ALTC - presented to the Seminar the generous Award donated by the RAEME Association of Victoria (RAV). A rousing applause resulted from his announcement that it would be used from 2006 as the new National Award for Subject Two (CPL) – The Craftsman Regimental Award. Everybody was very impressed with the quality of the trophy donated by RAV.

HOC Cell Tasks – On the afternoon of Day Two a forum of all attendees agreed to a number of tasks significant issues being reviewed by HOC Cell over the next 12 months and for presentation at next year's seminar.

These involved such issues as:-

Recruiting (VM courses cancelled due to the lack of interest by Army recruits. As with civil industry nobody these days wants to get their hands dirty). Need to re-think target audience eg 15-16 years olds having signed the UN Agreement preventing recruitment of boy soldiers under 17 years and 8 months of age – this would require some form of pre-enlistment trade training before final qualification as an Army Tradesmen.

- Posting tradesmen to contract repair to improve trade skills and “respite” from operational activities,
- professional development of engineers under the programme (PDP) and whether it should become compulsory,
- the formation of quarantine pools to ensure better fleet availability and management,
- technical satisfaction and competence at all of repair, now called light, medium and heavy and not first to fourth lines.
- Provision of contractor support in ADF units in barracks to offset deployed tradesmen.

Summary – In summary, it was fascinating to hear that the Army is continuing to ignore history and reinventing itself, repeating the issues faced 20-30 years ago and that decisions made in the last 15 years are causing the majority of significant issues currently facing the Corps: - like loss of a Directorate responsible for Corps Management, the loss of Clerk (Prod), failure to train to required competency levels by streamlining course content; thereby creating issues where unqualified tradesmen are unable to repair specialist pieces of equipment, like unit repairs to hydraulic hoses due to need for certification. Without doubt it was a far more productive and professionally conducted seminar than the one attended last year. The Corps Dinners were well attended and very enjoyable. The seminar organisers should take a well-earned pat on the back.

The RAEME Association of Tasmania has been re-formed. Its first Newsletter (Issue 1) was issued in September 2005

Service after 1946 can only be claimed for the issue of the medal.

1. Recipients will have been required to serve for at least 6 years in the regular or reserve forces.
2. Holders of the National Service Medal will have to have served an additional volunteer period of at least 6 years, after completion of their National Service.
3. The award of other long service medals or decorations will not preclude the award of the Australian Defence Medal for concurrent service.

The decision for the exact terms and conditions was to be made in Feb 05 and publication from the Minister for the Defence Office could be expected.

Negotiations are proceeding for around the 6 year requirement for those who have left the service with some other consideration for those who completed an agreed time of service??

3 Recovery Coy Mid-Year Update

3 Recovery Company is the only RAEME recovery company in the Australian Army. As a part of LSF and 9FSB the unit's role is to provide Force level (third line) recovery support to deployed forces.

Since our last update the activity and challenges for the unit have continued.

In the first few months of 2005 three soldiers were engaged on Continuous Full Time Service to complete the ARA MRV and HRV recovery mechanic's course of five month's duration, at ALTC. We also supported the Recruiting Campaign at Avalon Air Show by providing an MRV, F1 Twin Boom Recovery Vehicle and support personnel. At short notice one of our recovery mechanics deployed to East Timor to fill the gap while a replacement ARA person became available. Over time the company has developed rapport with the School of Armour and continue to provide personnel support for the ARVM and MRV crews. Personnel while in training to commence the Recovery Mechanics course have provided driver support to Special Forces and 15 Transport Squadron. Recently our drivers helped 15 Transport Squadron (a GRES unit that is also part of 9FSB) transport M113 APCs from Sydney to Puckapunyal. The company broke new ground recently when our female GRES recovery mechanic served with 17 Engineer Regiment for the first phase of their AACAP task based at Fitzroy Crossing (WA). It is a mark in history, the only female GRES recovery mechanic in the Australian Army she thoroughly enjoyed the experience and is keen to repeat the experience.

Our largest and most recently completed support effort was Ex Talisman Sabre 05. The company provided direct supply of 12 personnel and 4 Wreckers with 20T trailers to the multinational exercise based at Shoalwater Bay training area (which according to their signage is the best training area in Australia). Personnel also backfilled positions at 9FSB home base to enable others to deploy to Ex-T-S.

3 Recovery Coy October Update

The role of the 3rd Recovery Company (3 Recov Coy) is to provide force level (third line) recovery support to deployed forces. It is the only General Reserve Sub-Unit dedicated to recovery in the ADF. Subsidiary to its primary role, the company prepares General Reserve soldiers for courses that lead to the trade qualification of Recovery Mechanic. The company is located in the multi-user depot at Doveton, approximately 35 kms south east of the Melbourne CBD.

To become a Recovery Mechanic the General Reserve soldier must complete a series of courses. The first course qualifies the trainee as an ADF licensed driver for light (Landrover), medium (Unimog) and heavy (Mack) rigid vehicles. The first introduction to recovery techniques and equipment commences with detachment training. After detachment training the trainee completes an advanced theory and practice course at the Army Logistics Training Centre (ALTC) to become a qualified Recovery Mechanic. Under normal conditions of service as a General Reserve soldier this qualification would take three years to complete. In the first quarter of 2005 three soldiers from the company signed on for continuous full time service and completed the full-time Army Recovery Mechanics course at ALTC.

Prime candidates for deployment on Exercise Talisman Sabre, these trainee soldiers joined nine other company members to provide support to Australian and American forces in the Rockhampton and Shoalwater Bay Training Area in July and August. Unsure of what to expect besides fun in the sun, the heavens decided to open giving the Rockhampton camp a WW1 muddy working environment. These muddy conditions meant vehicles left overnight were bogged where they were parked, fortunately recovery support was only a short walk to the detachment from 3 Recov Coy. A full compound of vehicles, there was often no choice but to park in the same spot upon return from tasking, hoping it had dried up just that little bit to avoid the embarrassment of being bogged again. At times it did and at other times the Recovery Mechanics were rubbing their hands with glee that they had another job.

In addition to recovery tasks in the Rockhampton area, a Recovery Post was strategically located in the Shoalwater Bay Training Area to ensure prompt response should an emergency arise. Within days of the post being manned a land rover had rolled over, the driver and passenger fortunately walked away from the wreck. Recovery support from the recovery post was prompt and timely when compared to available support had it come from the force support maintenance area at Rockhampton.

In April 2005 a need arose in East Timor for a Recovery Mechanic at short notice. 3 Recov Coy's Corporal Tim Knowles was available and deployed to East Timor. He faced his first of many recovery tasks within hours of stepping off the plane. Of his brief time in East Timor Corporal Knowles enjoyed the experience saying, "it was a challenge doing a live recovery task and not many locals understanding me, but it eventually got done safely".

In May and June the ADF's and 3 Recov Coy's only female General Reserve Recovery Mechanic, Craftsman Kristy Dowel provided recovery support to 17th Construction Squadron (17 Const Sqn) when they deployed to Fitzroy Crossing on AACAP tasks. When not exercising her recovery skills Craftsman Dowel improved her general trade skills by working as a trades assistant for soldiers of 17 Const Sqn.

Later this year the company will welcome delivery of the new Heavy Recovery Vehicles (HRV). Based on the existing Mack Truck platform the new HRV with underlift replaces the existing HRV that has had constraints on lift, tow and salvage capability due to winch safety restrictions. The new HRV will give the unit a capability they have not had since 1995.

When not deployed or fine tuning their military skills, soldiers of the company practice recovery techniques by retrieving dumped vehicle bodies from difficult to reach locations in National Parks and State Forests. The vehicle bodies are relocated to an accessible area for collection by contractors and are recycled. These challenges add to the unusual art of recovery and provide soldiers with a sense of community spirit.

Morale in the company is high, recruit numbers are steadily increasing and the skill level of soldiers steadily improving. The Company is an integral sub-unit of 9 FSB and can offer the General Reserve soldier regular opportunities to engage in a diverse range of activities in support of deployed forces. Progressively there is a growing awareness of and demand for 3 Recov Coy to support ADF units and engage in beneficial community activities. This growing trend is set to continue and provide challenges for its General Reserve soldiers.

3 Recovery Company parades on Wednesday evening and usually one weekend per month. Opportunities frequently arise to deploy soldiers and equipment to support a diverse range of live tasks such as forces on exercise, training courses and to aid the community.

Typically these periods of deployment are 16 days duration but can be longer should the circumstances demand.

Craftsmen Also Died on The Burma Railway

Sixty three years ago on 15 February 1942, Lieutenant General H. Percival surrendered to the Imperial Japanese Army Commander in Malaya, General Tomoyuki Yamashita. In surrendering to the “Tiger of Malaya”, the British Malayan Command forced into captivity around 80,000 Commonwealth troops, including over 20,000 Australians. The Aussies came from the Australian 8th Division, which had valiantly fought down the unfortified West Coast of Malaya, through Jahore Bahru and had then fiercely opposed Japanese landings on Singapore until the surrender.

Contrary to common knowledge, prisoners were not initially housed in the renowned Changi Gaol, but instead sent to more than fifteen makeshift POW camps spread throughout Singapore. The infamous Gaol was originally used by the Japanese to hold male and female ex-pat civilian internees and their children. This situation did not change until the Changi airport was built by POWs in May 1944. Then once all civilian internees had been relocated, all POWs were shifted from Selerang Barracks on the Changi Peninsula to the Gaol, so that Japanese aircrews could be billeted in the vacated Barracks.

Once all POWs were confined after the surrender, the Japanese began a programme to persuade native troops in the Indian, Malayan and Singaporean Armies to defect and fight for the Japanese cause. Under skillful propaganda the Japanese claimed that their just cause was to rid Asia of all Western Imperialism and to make “Asia for Asian”. Some 30,000 native troops defected to the Japanese cause, with the majority forming the basis of the Indian National Army, which fought alongside Japanese troops to force the British out of Burma and India. Of the 50,000 remaining Caucasian prisoners, by 1944 all but about 5,000, had been systematically sent on working parties throughout SE Asia and the Pacific as forced labourers to help the Japanese war machine.

One of the most notorious projects was the building of a 415 km light railway linking the existing British built state railways in Thailand and Burma. This infamous railway became known as the Burma railway or the “Death Railway”, due to the loss of over 110,000 lives during its construction as a result of starvation, deprivation and extreme brutality. General knowledge of the Burma railway is unfortunately limited to an academy award winning movie directed by David Lean called ‘The Bridge On The River Kwai’. Although a great movie with fine

acting and moving music, the movie was actually made from a fictitious story written by French author Pierre Buole in 1952, based on an actual event, but which has little factual content. Moreover, the movie was shot in Ceylon and the actors blew up a wooden bridge that did not look like any bridge ever built on the railway.

In reality the steel spans of the real bridge across the Mae Khlong River (now renamed the Kwai Yai River to conform with this popular movie), were stolen from the Batavia Railway in East Java and is one of only eight steel and concrete bridges out of the total of 688 bridges built by the Japanese railway engineers. The remainder were made from timber, which POWs had to fell, move to the site and haul into position.

As usual, most people when discussing the railway think only about the men from the fighting units, which would have been captured with the Fall of Singapore. Yet there were tradesmen repairing equipment throughout the Orbat for the Australian 8th Division. Unit names included those possibly unknown to today’s young soldiers, such as LADs, Fd Wksp, Medium Wksp or Base Ordnance Wksp – there were no TSSUs in those days.

At the time of the Fall of Singapore, responsibility for the maintenance of Army equipment was primarily an Ordnance responsibility, which had a dual supply and repair role. Other Corps, like RAE, also had their own integral workshop support. The birth of AEME came from the sands of the desert, when it was decided to centralize all repair and maintenance functions into one technical organisation, thereby creating our Corps on 1 December 1942. However for most POWs, that was the last thing on their minds, as they were trying to survive the next three and a half years of captivity and starvation. In fact, most never even knew of the Corps formation until well after their liberation from POW camps throughout Asia and Japan following cessation of hostilities on 15 Aug 45.

On ANZAC Day 2005, the Commemoration Service held in the beautifully maintained War Graves Cemetery at Kanchanaburi, where 1,362 Australian servicemen are buried, presented a rare opportunity to search for the graves of the eight Australian EME tradesmen who have rested there for nearly 60 years. I managed to find three graves. Interestingly, the headstones of the two “Crafties” and one Corporal had all been marked as having belonged to the “**Corps of Elec. & Mech. Engineers**”. Knowing that the original graves in 1946 had been marked by a 1m high white wooden cross with just their number, name and initial, this Corps identification confirmed that the placement of the bronze plaque, to replace the cross, occurred before the end of 1948, as RAEME was granted its “Royal” title on 10 Nov 48.

In Nong Pladuk POW camp, adjacent to the marshalling yards, 79 Dutch POWs were killed in one raid by US B-24 Liberators flying from China. Fortunately the RAF, using mixed crews of British, Australian, NZ and Canadian airman flying Liberators from India, attacked targets from lower altitudes causing less POW casualties.


