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
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This is a photo of the classrooms at Oakleigh Barracks set up ready for our Widows and Life Members Luncheon. Can you see what is missing?

OC 1 Independent Armoured Squadron Workshop RAEME

PUCKAPUNYAL & NUI DAT

OC 1 Armoured Squadron Workshop RAEME NUI DAT

I wish to advise the peaceful passing of Bruce Dittmar in a Canberra nursing home.

In 1967 Bruce was the OC Armd Regt LAD. On the announcement that Cents would go to SVN Bruce was posted as OC 1 Independent Armoured Squadron Workshop. Along with his senior NCO's they slogged long and hard to establish the unit, receive 95 odd march ins draw 100% of the units equipment from 1 COD Bandiana - prepare it for export and have it on Sydney Docks within 60 days of the unit's forming. The troops on march-in had to be processed - sent to JTC for three weeks then home across Australia on Pre- em leave for a week plus travelling time and be back ready for deployment to Nui Dat in around sixty days.

Bruce arrived with the unit Advance Party of 25 in Nui Dat on 28 Dec 67. Across the next month the Wksp Adv Pty allocated a plot of rubber and banana plantation set about building defences on two separate TF perimeters Armd Regt & Wksp, laying 45,000 sandbags , building unit facilities ,messes, theatre, tent lines, hot water systems, perimeter fencing and finally establishment in conjunction with 17 Const Sqn the Workshop facilities particularly a little later the building that became known as the Opera House and the centre piece of the later 106 Fld Wksp.

In late January the Wksp Main Body a party of 55 arrived from Australia two days before the South Vietnam nation erupted with the 68 Tet Offensive and Nui Dat came under assault and for a time 24 hr Stand To was the plan. Bruce Dittmar was OC Wksp throughout this period in fact the unit was the largest Unit Workshop ever raised in the history of the corp.

What was achieved in high pressure time frames, from the time the unit was raised in Puckapunyal until the unit began its role of supporting the Centurions in SVN following their arrival in late Feb 68 was a great credit to those who made it happen and Bruce Dittmar was the OC coordinating that accomplishment.

In Nui Dat the endless walking about on rough surface aggravated Bruce's amputated toe stump (put his foot under a lawn mower in a PNG Wksp) and the MO declared him unfit for Nui Dat duty hence his transfer to 102 Fld Wksp (vice Brian Coulter) in mid 68.

Bruce served as Cfn in Korea and later saw service in PNG, Adelaide, RTC Bandiana Veh Wng, 1 Armd Regt LAD, SVN, 4 Base Wksp Bandiana then Corp transferred to RAAOC for his final posting as a Major in 31 Sup Bn Bandiana. Retirement saw him work in Howlong for a number of years before moving to Canberra after his civilian retirement.

Farewell Bruce - you always did your best- Rest in Peace old Soldier.

From the Daughter of an Australian Soldier

Last week I was in Melbourne attending a conference.

While I was in the airport, returning home, I heard several people behind me beginning to clap and cheer. I immediately turned around and witnessed one of the greatest acts of patriotism I have ever seen.

Moving through the terminal was a group of soldiers in their uniforms, as they began heading to their gate everyone (well almost everyone) was abruptly to their feet with their hands waving and cheering.

When I saw the soldiers, probably 30-40 of them, being applauded and cheered for, it hit me. I'm not alone I'm not the only red blooded Australian who still loves this country and supports our troops and their families Of course I immediately stopped and began clapping for these young unsung heroes who are putting their lives on the line everyday for us so we can go to school, work, and enjoy our home without fear or reprisal.

Just when I thought I could not be more proud of my country or of our service men and women a young girl, not more than 6 or 7 years old, ran up to one of the male soldiers.

He knelt down and said 'Hi,' the little girl then asked him if he would give something to her daddy for her. The young soldier didn't look any older than maybe 22 himself, said he would try and what did she want to give to her daddy. Suddenly the little girl grabbed the neck of this soldier, gave him the biggest hug she could muster and then kissed him on the cheek.

The mother of the little girl, who said her daughters name was Courtney, told the young soldier that her husband was a Corporal and had been in Afghanistan for 5 months now.

As the mum was explaining how much her daughter, Courtney, missed her father, the young soldier began to tear up. When this temporarily single mum was done explaining her situation, all of the soldiers huddled together for a brief second. Then one of the other servicemen pulled out a military looking walkie-talkie. They started playing with the device and talking back and forth on it.

After about 10-15 seconds of this, the young soldier walked back over to Courtney, bent down and said this to her, 'I spoke to your daddy and he told me to give this to you.'

He then hugged this little girl that he had just met and gave her a kiss on the cheek. He finished by saying 'Your daddy told me to tell you that he loves you more than anything and he is coming home very soon.'

The mum at this point was crying almost uncontrollably and as the young soldier stood to his feet he saluted Courtney and her mum. I was standing no more than 6 feet away as this entire event unfolded.

As the soldiers began to leave, heading towards their gate, people resumed their applause. As I stood there applauding and looked around, there were very few dry eyes, including my own. That young soldier in one last act of moment turned around and blew a kiss to Courtney with a tear rolling down his cheek.

We need to remember everyday all of our soldiers and their families and thank God for them and their sacrifices.

I know that he was a grunt, but the person looking for her is a member of the Association. Her married name was Charleen Trzecinski and the last Darby heard of her she was living in or around Coffs Harbour.

She has two children, Paul Junior and Shelley. Paul Senior was a National Serviceman and was possibly an Acting Corporal when he was killed.

If someone has access to the Electoral Rolls it may be worth having a look there. You may have to look for Charleen's son Paul and we would be able to trace her from there.

Unfortunately, in the West we do not have access to the Eastern Electoral Rolls.

Any advice or help would be gratefully accepted.

ASLO

Working title of “The Army School of Logistics (ASLO) is alive and well” or Guys attendance at the Logistic Officers Intermediate Course (LOIC - RAEME) during Feb 08.



It all started with a slowish train trip from Melbourne to Wodonga, this was a good relaxed start to what turned out to be a less than relaxed course at Bandiana.



The Officers Mess accommodation was basic but livable, except the spider that had taken up residence in my room and was soon told to leave the house, which he did after jumping on my chest first (he was about the size of my hand!).

As with most Army Reserve course we started on Friday night moving into our rooms and then reported for first lessons at 8:00 am on Saturday morning.

There were about 30 starters on the weekend; most were reserves and some late starting regulars, each from all over the country and from every kind of officer. RAEME, RACT, RAAOC, Medical were all represented, we had armourers, movers, RAEME-aviation, lawyers, caterers, a vet and every trade in between, all in the form of 75 odd logistic officers.

The first couple of lessons on the weekend were to bring us up to speed with the remainder of the course (regulars who had started a week earlier). So there after we were “belt fed” the first week over the weekend. And then there was homework!!

Fortunately I was with a group of likeminded individuals in my ‘accommodation block’ and there was time for study, homework, humour and the odd cleansing ale.

The instructors were all great, of particular note, the SI (MAJ Scott Bradford – RAEME) was excellent and led us on an ‘adult learning path’ which meant we played a more active role in all of the classes. We were also fortunate enough to have him in the second week for our Special To CORPS (STC) phase, where we developed the RAEME key information for the TEWT and briefing series, including Critical Logistic Events (CLEs) and Culminating Points. All of this helped us get the most from the short time we had.

MAJ Ian Anfruns was another one of our RAEME Instructors (and a reserve on contract to ASLO) and he was able to spread a good deal of direct and passionate speech our way during the sessions, including us being part of the teaching process, which made for entertaining lessons and memorable learning, mixed with a good dose of solid humour.

We had some great RAEME lessons and entertainment, confirming that the spirit in training is far from dead.

We had a chance to see the new M1A1 tank, now that is a piece of military art. 60+ tonnes and more than 60 kph, wow, that is motoring. We were able to climb around and look at the outside, they are a formidable sight when they are going fast!!





A MEMORIAL service in honour of former army craftsmen will be held at their "spiritual home" on Monday.

The Royal Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers Association at Bandiana encourages members, former members and widows of craftsmen to attend.

Association president Andrew Turner said the efforts should be recognised and remembered.

"The men have shown a lot of camaraderie over the years and most of the RAEME craftsmen served for many years together in different parts all over the place," he said.

"But this is the home of the corps, with the school being here — a lot of them call it their spiritual home."

The event marks the 55th anniversary of the signing of the order to form the training centre.

Mr Turner said the service would be held by Chaplain David Grulke and include an honour guard and wreath-laying.

The 6pm service will be held at the Craftsmen Memorial statue at South Bandiana.

WODONGA'S Barbara Prenter was one of many proud locals remembering the courage and discipline of army craftsmen, including her late husband Bill, yesterday.

Mrs Prenter, 72, laid wreath at a memorial ceremony at South Bandiana's Royal Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers training centre — something Bill would not have liked. "He hated flowers," she joked.

"When his ashes were laid (at the craftsmen memorial), all the nice blue flowers died — and I reckon he had something to do with it."

"I come down and see him and bring him some gum leaves instead."

Major Prenter died in October 1997 at the age of 64, after serving as an army craftsman for 33 years.

The mother-of-five enjoyed meeting her husband's friends at the annual service, which marked the formation of RAEME training centres in 1951.

RAEME Association president Andrew Turner said camaraderie was the ceremony's focus, which drew about 80 people, some from as far as Brisbane.

Lt Col Nick Stanton reflected on the past year at the ceremony and said in the past 65 years the army's mission had not changed.

"It's important to keep the tradition going for RAEME, and for the guys who served in the army and who are overseas," Mrs Prenter said.


Dictionary

Joe was born and raised in the Port Melbourne area and was a typical Port boy. He played both cricket and football and believed that that VFA was the only decent football played in Victoria or any where else for that matter. He was often heard to quote that the only kick that VFL players would get in the VFA would be a kick in the bum.

Joe and Kath were married for fifty seven years and have three loving daughters' six grand children and eleven great grand children. Joe was proud of each and every one of them. Although he did mention when the Great Grandies started to arrive "I think I might be getting a bit old. Only might be mind you."

Joe joined the Army on 30 Sep 1946 and was discharged on the 8 Jul 1978. A career which contained 3 regimental numbers and three different Armies, the AIF - Interim Army, A.R.A. Special Reserve and the A.R.A. Prior to the Army was a brief stint with the RAAF, but we forgave him for that. You will see from the record of service the wide range and diversity of the units in which Joe served. Looking at this wide ranging experience it was no wonder that he was a font of knowledge for all of the younger soldiers. Joe was always available to lend a hand or give some timely advice.

Joe was always firm but fair with the soldiers under his control.

Although maintaining a facade as a tough WO in reality he was pretty soft in the middle. I remember at 1st Armd Regt a "crafty" being late for the RSM's parade Joe saying I will deal with him.

Later he was heard to say he won't do that again, I let him have a good blast. When I asked the lad what had happened he told me Joe asked him why he was late, and he said "my wife had morning sickness". He was told in no uncertain terms OK but let me know next time.

In 1969 Joe was posted SVN. I was on the same flight. As we had a lot of spare time on the day of departure we had partaken of a few fizzy drinks by the time the plane took off. To our horror the plane had only Courage beer on board, so we decided to have a sleep and then have some more ales in Darwin. On landing in Darwin I went to the little boys' room and Joe went to the bar to get our drinks. On returning from my visit all I could hear was a very familiar voice telling the inn keeper that "I do not wish to buy your bloody air port all I want is two stubbies, you can stick them where the sun doesn't shine. I quickly said what about mine Joe, and he replied "at that price he can stick yours too".

I will tell you a short story, not a "warrie" but factual. After a clash with the bad guys one of the vehicles in my APC section was not going and had to be recovered. The recovery team arrived and out stepped Joe "I heard it was your section so I thought I would come up and see how you were". I might add that he also brought a bottle of tonic to help calm our nerves. Joe was a backbone member of the RSL Sub branch and club. He was the appeals member for the Sub branch for many years and the money that he and his band raised is in the hundreds of thousands bracket.

Joe was the purchasing officer for the RSL club and that also included ordering the stock, receiving, stocking the fridges and serving behind the bar. The club awarded him life membership in gratitude for all of his efforts although this was small rewards for the countless hours he unselfishly gave. Joe was also a life member the RAAC museum.

Joe was also a long serving member of the Seymour Legacy group and gave up his time freely in the care of the widows and children entrusted to the care of Legacy.

Joe loved to run raffles and would start selling tickets at the drop of a hat. Once on bus trip returning from Shepparton he started selling raffle tickets, when reminded that we did not have anything for a prize "no worries" was all we heard. All tickets sold, scrunched up in a small box, Joe called for someone to draw the winning ticket. Holding the box up towards the roof of the bus, directly under the fresh air vent, all the tickets were sucked out through the top of the bus. Alas we didn't need a prize as we had no winner.

I promised to keep this eulogy short, but how can you abbreviate such an active and dedicated life span such as this one? Joe will be sadly missed by a great number of people all over this wide country of ours but most of all by those gathered here to-day. To Kath and the girls and all of the grand children plus Great Grandies you have the best wishes and deepest sympathy from all of us gathered here today.


