### TRIBUTE TO PETER CARTLEDGE

#### CMF/ARES

Peter enlisted 12<sup>th</sup> April 1960 at Chapel St East St Kilda (As a CMF person not NSM). He was 1 of only 2 **Craftsman/Recruits** in first camp (Neil Charter being the other!!) It was held at Site 2, Puckapunyal.

Peter on completion was transferred to 105 Inf Wksp 30th June 1960 (Later 105 Fld Wksp). He was upgraded to Craftsman 1<sup>st</sup> March 1961.

He qualified as a Recovery Mechanic Class 3 on 27 August 1961.

Peter became an Assistant Instructor in numerous Recovery Courses under Joe France and Reg Wildermouth.

He was Promoted Corporal 16<sup>th</sup> October 1961, then to Sergeant on 13th March 1963.

Peter qualified for WO2 but never promoted due to no posting being available at the time.

He was discharged on February 1972 at own request as his civilian occupation had to take precedence and was beginning to build on his trade.

Peter is a Plumber and is running his own business nowadays.

#### Family Life

Peter was married on the 2<sup>nd</sup> January 1965 at St Georges Anglican Church Malvern to his lovely wife Leonie. The first of their children to arrive two or three years later was Jennifer, then Roslyn and finally after the 3<sup>rd</sup> try along came a boy Luke.

They have five Grandchildren Peter 17, Jonathon 14, David 10 and Luke 7, Trent 4.

Peter's siblings are now all living Interstate.

Peter built their first home in Ashburton, moving to a larger home in Glen Waverley some years later where Peter and Leonie still live.

Peter not only has had a life in RAEME but he also spread his interests to his Church, He loves army movies, coupled with his annual Bus trip with the Association. For some time Peter also played cricket with Glen Iris.

#### RAEME ASSOCIATION INVOLVMENT

Peter joined the AEME Association sometime during his CMF service at Chapel Depot, possibly in the late 60s to early 70s (it later became AEME/RAEME Association).

Peter and Leonie attended the Mess functions and the dances held at Chapel Street on Cup Eve; he also attended the ANZAC Re-Union AGM and ANZAC Day back at the Mess but not forgetting the days of the "**hole in the wall**" prior to heading back to the Mess.

Peter did not take an active role in Association (although remaining a member after his discharge) until later when the AEME/RAEME Association looked like changing and a move was imminent to have it incorporated. He was present at the meeting in 1989/90 when it was finally moved to become incorporated and bring the Association into the future to protect committee members and Association members from litigation as many organizations did in those days.

Peter became more active with Association after the move to Oakleigh in 1991

#### MOVE TO OAKLEIGH

Peter was welcomed onto the committee Tuesday 21<sup>st</sup> March 1995 and was placed into the **ANZAC EVE/Day & Remembrance Day Sub-Committee**. Of course he became involved in the Social Committee and later became the conveyor as well as also being actively involved in membership and the production of the Lightning Flash and its distribution now for a number of years as well.

**In 1996 Peter was approached to take on the Association as President**, he accepted that role which he has diligently held since that time, as well as being involved with the Social activities and the successful bus trips over those years. (Probably always directed by Leonie who has always been his backbone wherever support was needed in his most active role as our President) Peter not only has had to attend to Association matters at a cost to him and Leonie, as they also had their own Plumbing Business to run as well (both names make up the business name "Leopet"). Peter gave up many days of work to act in the capacity as President on our behalf.

Unfortunately many of minutes during his time as President have been mislaid and the history of Pete's time in the early days is hidden for the moment (due unfortunately to unforeseen changes in our Secretaries) but that doesn't stop us from recognizing the total commitment Peter has put into this Association.

Pete is standing down after 13 years of extreme dedication to the Association.

However, what we do know Peter was the instigator of bringing not only the RAEME VIETNAM Association as a Chapter into the fold where others had failed over many years, also the inclusion of our other Chapters, Bandiana and Seymour as well as the annual Pilgrimage to the Shrine and the dedication at the RAEME tree. Also during his time our membership has grown and developed from around 120 in 1991 (when we were incorporated) to approximately 450 members today, a great achievement.

Peter was also instrumental in putting together the Annual RAEME Birthday Dinner held at East Malvern RSL, and for the first time last year he achieved his ambition of having the **Prince Phillip Banner** paraded at the East Malvern RSL in his final year of his Presidency - a very proud moment for Pete.

Under his leadership the RAEME Association of Victoria Inc has become one of the most active Corps Associations nationally and he is well recognized in all areas where our Association is involved. He has continued the tradition of numerous past Presidents from the days of the AEME Association then to the RAEME Association as it is today, and has kept this Association ongoing, helping to make it the only RAEME Association to soldier on since 1945 without a break.

Pete has a lot to be proud of in his time as President and before, and we all owe him a great deal of gratitude for the time and effort he has put into the task of being our President.

It was a proud moment at the 2009 AGM to honour Peter with his Life Member Badge - more than well deserved by Peter who has given 13 years of his valuable time.

## Forty Year Anniversary of the Battle of Hat Dich

On the 16<sup>th</sup> February 1969, 4 RAR/NZ, supported by tanks from 1 Troop B Squadron, their RAEME ARV, and Artillery from 102 and 104 Field Batteries.

From intelligence gathered from a local “Hoi Chan” Whisky Company, along with tank support had been tasked with locating a weapons and rice caches, located just outside AO Tiki in an area known as a mouse trap. The search proved unsuccessful. B Company had formed in a clearing, about 800 mts. wide. Just after midday 1 Troop arrived at the location of B Company.



After a meal break Company Headquarters entered the jungle, but were immediately engaged from the flank by directional mines and automatic weapons, suffering one killed, four wounded. The enemy were hidden in bunkers sited amongst thick clumps of bamboo. The closest tanks, call signs TwoZero Echo and 21Alpha, immediately moved toward the contact, assisted by infantry Guides.

Troop Leader, Brian Sullivan (Callsign 21) was hindered by infantry on the ground and had to follow the other tank tracks. Crew Commander of 21 Alpha Sergeant Len Swarbrick was directed to a position to the left and slightly forward of the infantry casualties, most of whom had fallen within 5-10 metres of the enemy horseshoe-shaped bunkers, where they engaged them with canister rounds to clear the jungle blanket. 21 Alpha returned fire with the tank's 0.30 cal and 0.50 cal machine guns, as the preferred HE could not be used due to the close proximity of the Infantry.

Two Zero Echo, a HQ Troop replacement tank for 21Bravo and 21 Charlie commanded by Corporal Nobby Clark was 30m to the left of 21Alpha, which was out of view. After verbally warning any Infantry in their fire path, Two Zero fired splintex to remove undergrowth and then driver Trooper Robert Splatt moved within 15m of 21Alpha, with Crew Commander Clark using suppressive machine gun fire, to suppress the enemy bombardment.

Unfortunately 21Alpha's RMG and co-axial 0.30 cal jammed at the same time. While operator Trooper Graeme Jackson tried to clear the stoppages, Swarbrick continued to engage the bunkers using the Commander's machine gun. The enemy, however, had already seized the moment. The lull in heavy

firing allowed them to fire RPGs. The first destroyed the operator's periscope. The second penetrated the right front turret wall and dissipating in the traverse gearbox, wounding gunner Trooper Howard. Shrapnel splash went down through the open driver's hatch wounding Trooper Mick Ingram and rendering him unconscious. It also set the canvas mantel cover alight.

Unaware of Ingram's condition, Swarbrick attempted to silence the bunkers to his front. An RPGs from the right side bunker penetrated the lower turret wall, wounding Jackson in the thigh. Another RPG penetrated the turret near the crew commander's station, seriously wounding Swarbrick in the lower body and legs. Smoke filled the 21 Alpha causing the Crew Commander to order a "Bail Out".

With wounded infantry on the ground Callsign 21 moved up close behind 21Alpha and silenced the bunkers of RPG fire, with TwoZero Echo in support. Swarbrick rose out of the turret using his arms, followed by Jackson and Howard finding cover under the rear petrol tank, with small arms fired at them. Brian Sullivan left his gunner Trooper Rod Burgess to cover while he left 21 to extinguish the fire on Alpha 21.

The already wounded B Company CSM WO Jock Richardson called for casualty assistance.

Enter the RAEME ARV under Sergeant Sandy Toccock's control, with recovery mechanic Craftsman Brian Willis manning a machine gun and radio, while he, his driver Corporal David Ovens, electrician Neville Spencer and the 1Fld Sqn mini team Sappers Rob Woolley and Geoff Andrews did what they could to help on the ground.

The Sappers improvised a "hootchie" for a stretcher. Andrews then assisted Sullivan to carefully remove Ingram from the Alpha 21 driver's hatch. Two hours later with the enemy fire suppressed, Sullivan climbed into Alpha 21 and reversed it back from the bunkers. Seeing this, Sgt Toccock and Cpl Ovens quickly came forward and completed the recovery. Without pausing, Sullivan immediately returned to 21, took over from Burgess and directed his driver Trooper Rod Bellot, back into the contact.

Two Zero Echo almost suffered a similar fate to Alpha 21, with a main armament misfire and a machine gun out of ammunition, but for some smart work by Clark with his 9mm pistol, causing the VC with the RPG to miss the tank. While reloading his machine gun Clark was dismayed to see the RPG being aimed again. Two more rounds from his pistol, then a stoppage! Despair turned to relief, when the main armament fired, causing the RPG threat to disappear in a hail of canister pellets. The canister exposed another bunker, which was dispersed with an APCBC (Armour Piercing Capped Ballistic Capped) round.

Sullivan's 21 Centurion finished the remainder of the bunkers APCBC and hand grenades. Two helicopter gunships arrived to give additional support. A fire from a coloured smoke grenade to guide gunships now started. While still assisting B Company medic Corporal Brown with the casualties, Sgt Toccock's team also dealt with the bushfire, which got close to the unmanned 21 Alpha. Artillery, including the American A Battery. 155 mm guns were then brought on the area. Whisky and Bravo Companies were then able to recover the body of one of their soldiers.

The wounded were dusted off to hospital along with the body of the dead soldier. On a sad note Private R A McGuire one of the wounded passed away during the dust-off flight.

Callsign 21 driver Trooper Rod Bellot was now removed from the driver's seat, as he had been wounded in the head, but continued on. His place was taken by RAEME Corporal Ovens with Craftsman Willis taking over as driver of the ARV.

Two more black hats (Armd Regt), Sergeant Reg Steer and Trooper Brian Wright were choppered in to drive Callsign 21 back with the return convoy. This would create the effect that the tank had not been affected by the heavy RPG 7 fire.

The subsequent repair was carried out by 106. Repair procedures had to be developed, so that the tank armour was not weakened by welding or the plugs used in the holes would not become secondary projectiles in later combat. 106 Fld Wksp OC Major John Sinclair later stated that repairs needed to be done in such a way that tank crews did not have constant markers in front of their eyes of their vulnerability, or anything that leads them to lose confidence in their to perform.

Sergeant Swarbrick, Troopers Bellot and Ingram were casualty-evacuated back to Australia from 1 Field Hospital in Vung Tau on the 26<sup>th</sup> February 1969; Troopers Haward and Jackson followed two weeks later.

Sergeant Ken (Sandy) Toccock was subsequently mentioned in Dispatches, but to this day believes it was an equal achievement by his ARV Team – Brian Willis, David Ovens, Neville Spencer, Rob Woolley and Geoff Andrews. His citation referred to the fact that:

*At all times during times during the action, Sergeant Toccock displayed coolness and foresight. He showed admirable leadership which was evidenced by the manner in which his crew and others reacted to his directions. His conduct under fire was of a high order and reinforced the bond between the combat arms and supporting services.*

OC B Company Major Bill Reynolds was awarded the Military Cross, Second Lieutenant Brian Sullivan a Mention In Dispatches, while Corporal Sam Brown was awarded the Military Medal.

### UNKNOWN – YET SO WELL KNOWN The British Unknown Soldier

In ancient times, kings, chiefs and the famous were often buried in magnificent tombs, which stand as their memorials. After a great battle, the victors would set up a trophy of arms, helmets and armour and even a cenotaph or empty tomb, but the idea of an unknown man being buried with honour is a comparatively recent one. It sprang from the imagination of a British Army Chaplain, the Reverend David Railton, MC (1884-1955).

During World War I, near Armentieres, he saw a grave bearing a pencilled inscription 'An Unknown Soldier of the Black Watch'. It gave him an idea that later became a national memorial.

It was not until 1920, the year that the Cenotaph in London was unveiled, that he was able to put forward his plan. He approached the Dean of Westminster, the Right Reverend Herbert Ryle, and suggested that an unknown soldier be brought from the battlefields of France and buried among the nation's illustrious dead in Westminster Abbey. The Dean was able to persuade the Government of the day to accept this innovative idea.

A committee, headed by Lord Curzon, recommended that the foreign minister should arrange for an unknown soldier to be disinterred in France and brought to the Abbey. It further recommended that the burial should be on Armistice Day and that King George V should be asked if, after he had unveiled the new Cenotaph in Whitehall, he would follow the gun-carriage bearing the body to Westminster Abbey.

Brigadier-General L J Wyatt, DSO as general officer in charge of troops in France and Flanders, and director of the Imperial War Graves Commission, was given instructions that the body of a British soldier, whom it would be impossible to identify, should be brought in from each of the four battle areas - the Aisne, the Somme, Arras and Ypres - on the night of 7 November and placed in the chapel at St. Pol.

The bodies, each covered with a Union Jack, were placed in a row on stretchers. At midnight on 7 November the Brigadier, accompanied by Colonel Gell, entered the chapel. He selected a body, and with the Colonel's help placed it in the shell and screwed down the lid.

As Brigadier-General Wyatt said, "I had no idea even of the area from which the body I selected had come, and no one else can know it." The other bodies were re-buried in the military cemetery at St. Pol.

The following morning, chaplains of the Church of England, the Roman Catholic Church and Nonconformist churches held a service in the chapel. At noon the body was sent, under escort, to Boulogne.

At 3.30pm, after passing through troops lining the outskirts of the city, the ambulance drew up at an old castle, the local headquarters of the French Army.

Eight soldiers including a sergeant-major of the Royal Army Service Corps, a sergeant of the Royal Engineers, a gunner of the Royal Field Artillery, an Australian Light Horseman, a private each from the Canadian infantry, and Machine Gun Corps, and a rifleman from the 21st London Regiment (First Surrey Rifles) stepped forward as bearers.

At noon the next day, the rough wooden shell was placed in a plain oak coffin sent from Britain the previous night. This had wrought-iron bands through one of which was passed a 16th century Crusader's sword from the Tower of London's collection.

It was taken into Boulogne, where the destroyer HMS Verdun was waiting, sent by the Admiralty as a special tribute to the French nation and the gallant defence of that city. The cortege was a mile long.

The French Government sent a division of all arms to pay their last tribute. Marshal Ferdinand Foch, representing the French nation spoke, and Lieutenant General Sir George Macdonagh replied on behalf of King George. General Weygand, together with many other distinguished high-ranking French and British officers were present.

As HMS Verdun moved off, a guard of Bluejackets and guns on shore fired a salute. An escort of six destroyers joined the ship and, later, as she steamed into Dover Harbour, a 19-gun salute was fired from the castle. Six warrant officers from the Royal Navy, Royal Marines, the army and the Royal Air Force acted as bearers and six officers from all services brought the body ashore.

It was followed to the marine station by Sir George Macdonagh, the officers of the garrison and the Mayor and Corporation of Dover, where it received a salute from a guard of honour of the 2nd Connaught Rangers and the **Duke of York's Military School\*** (*see note below*). The carriage in which the coffin was placed was that which had carried home Nurse Edith Cavell and Captain Fryatt.

The coffin, covered by a Union Jack, with a steel helmet, side arms and a webbing belt placed on it, was put on to a gun carriage drawn by six horses and slowly made its way to the Cenotaph, led by the firing party and the bands of the Coldstream, Scots, Irish and Welsh Guards. Troops from all services followed.

At the door of the Abbey, the coffin was met by 100 holders of the Victoria Cross, some in uniform, some in plain clothes, under the command of Colonel Bernard Freyberg VC.

After the burial, the two lines of VC holders filed past. The honours paid were those due to a Field Marshal.

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
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
