William (Bill) CHALLONS (Life Member)

He was born on 21st January, 1913 at North Hamersmith, London. On leaving school, Bill commenced work as a Sheet Metal Worker at the Royal Armoury at Woolwich. He also tried his hand at being a Copper Smith.

On 21st November, 1940, 7651304 (War Substantive) Cpl Challon enlisted in the 4th Training Battalion, RAOC, Llanio Barracks, Pembroke Docks. Recruit Training was in Wales and he later transferred to 185 Infantry Workshop, REME. He was Assistant Military Instructor in Coppersmith at the Wandsworth Technical Institution by this time with the rank of Lance Sergeant (Unpaid).

Prior to embarking overseas, Bill's unit was camped at Boxhill-On-Sea, here they were waterproofing their vehicles and equipment. The Adjutant, Capt. Kinniar had given instructions that the unit, when required, was to mount an efficient guard at all times. On one occasion, dressed in his No.1 Uniform (Blues) Capt Kinniar decided to check the efficiency of the sentries. By an odd coincidence, he ended up face down in the mud with the sentry's bayonet prodding him. "Sorry, Sir" replied the sentry, when the Adjutant identified himself, "I did not recognise you in the dark as you failed to answer the challenge!"

On D Day + 5, (11th June 1944,) Bill landed in Normandy with the 43rd Wessex Division. Whilst serving with 214th Infantry Brigade Workshop, REME, Bill relates that this unit's' Recovery Section had the distinction of recovering the first German 'TIGER' tank prior to it being transported back to the U.K. for valuation on its weapons and armour. Bill also saw service at Arnhem where he was wounded in action and returned to the U.K.

Whilst his unit was leaguer at the Normandy town of Caumont, Bill was given the pleasant task of organising the unit's social functions. Taking one of his unit's vehicles, Bill went into the town and happened to meet the Mayor and Army Commandant of the Free French Forces stationed there. Given two FFF members to act as interpreters, they visited all the deserted farmhouses nearby. Here in the root cellars were found many carboys of wine and bottles of Cognac left by the previous owners. These were taken back to the unit lines to a deserted barn in which a dance was to be held. This social function, due to the supply of free liquor from Bill's foraging, almost bought about the loss of the 'TIGER' Tank off the back of its Tank Transporter by the Recovery crew.

At the end of WW 2, Bill was discharged and enlisted in the Territorial Army from 4th June 1947 to 29th May 1951.

In Oct 1951, Bill Immigrated to Australia with his wife Isobel and their three children. They were first lodged in a Hostel Camp at Bathurst, NSW. Later he and his family were put into a 'Hostel Camp' a Woolshed at Brookland, VIC. Later the family were able to purchase better accommodation in Pascoe Vale. Bill was employed by TAA from 3rd December 1951 till 20th January 1978 when he retired. On 17 March 1954 Bill enlisted in the CMF firstly with 4/19 PWLH LAD and finally served, until his discharge on 17th March 1954, with 3 Fd Engineer Regiment LAD.

Lt Col H.C. Gunther, MBE (then CREME 3 Div) on meeting Sgt (later WO2) Bill Challons for the first time and on hearing of his previous U.K. Service; granted Bill special dispensation to continue to wear his REME Corps badge in lieu of the RAEME badge whilst in the CMF.

When Bill was presented with his RAEME Association Life Member's Medallion he stated to our Secretary that he had also been made a Life Member of the REME Association on 27th June 1987. When asked of his views in comparison between REME and RAEME, Bill replied, "The British Army was very regimental, but in all, both Corps were on an even par with each other.

Bill joined the RAEME Association in 1964. He also cherishes the many social functions he attended at Chapel Street Depot Sergeant's Mess, and the camaraderie he formed during those years

I MISS MY ARMY LIFE IN RAEME By Tony See, Capt Rtd.

I believe in fate and deeply believe that the good lord wanted me to serve my adopted country in His way by joining the Army Reserve.

One night in 1968, I walked into the Army Depot in Chapel Street and inquired whether I could see someone in charge. One of the soldiers kindly led me to an office, and it happened that the officer Maj. Snow, was available at that time. He asked how he could help me and I told him I wanted to join the Army Reserve.

He asked me what qualifications I possessed. I told him I had completed a Diploma in Electrical Engineering and I was doing a post-Graduate Diploma course in Management. He advised me that because of my qualifications it was better to attend the Officer Cadet Training Course and become an Officer on graduation. I was led to believe that at the time Direct Entry as Army Reserve Officers for Professional Engineers was not yet available. I left the Depot after the initial inquiry and no further action taken.

However, two years later, I decided to enrol with OCTU. I do not remember what course number it was, but I do remember Lt Col D. Bullard was the C.I. then, Capt Mike Kawalevski and Lt Col Bow-water were in the same course. Once again, due to unforseen domestic circumstances I had to give it away midway during the course.

It was not until about ten years later that I applied as a Direct Entry Officer. In June 1991, I was accepted and appointed as Lieutenant in RAEME. At the same time, at the Chapel Street Depot, Lt Col A. Nolan was CO of 3 EME Services Unit; and Major (later Lt Col) J. Wilson was OC of the Wksp Coy. My first posting was OC General Engineering Platoon, 3 EME Svcs Unit.

I can tell you now that I was scared to death of being in charge of a platoon of rough and tough Aussie soldiers for the first time in my life, especially as I was the yellow skin OC. I thought they might overrun me and give me hard times; and thinking back, I also believe that Lt Col Nolan was very worried and anxious about my performance (whether I could do my job well).

Surprise to all, including myself, the entire

platoon fully accepted me as one of them; they were very understanding and helpful. The cooperation, and the comradeship between me, the Senior NCOs and all Other Ranks of the platoon was excellent - We became a team. All jobs no matter how large or small were done on time with good quality. In my heart I salute and thank them for their efforts.

I specially remember Capt Chris Wrangle, he had spent a lot of time teaching me Military Tactics, Strategic Maneuvers and Military Principles so that I could improve my military knowledge of how the Army actually functions. For this, I thank him for his unfailing efforts to put me on the right track in my Army career.

Sometime later I was posted as OC Vehicle Platoon. Once again I did not know much about cars, not even my own car; let alone Army vehicles. Indeed it was a big challenge, as before I took charge, there were some disharmony within the platoon. However, once again, I had some good supporting soldiers prepared to help me to rebuild the platoon and its morale again. WO1s Max Moore, Sandy Powell, WO2 Peter Hollingsworth and many other Senior NCOs, they all put in a lot of personal and selfless effort to uphold the platoon. In fact because of this team spirit, I should say the Esprit de Corps, the performance and productivity of the vehicle platoon was greatly improved. Max, Sandy, Peter and I became good mates; we understood each other well.

Later I was posted as SO3, HQ CDEME, I was assigned to look after the Career Progression Plans of the RAEME ARes Officers within 3MD.

During my time at Chapel Street Depot, I was assigned as the Officer's Mess Treasurer for a number of years. I have to thank Capt Bob Hunter for his help in showing me how to reconcile the Financial Affairs of the Mess. I think the Mess never made a loss during all the time I was the Treasurer. I enjoyed serving the Mess; it was our HOME.

In the short period that I was with the Army Reserve, I served under Lt Cols A. Nolan, B. Williamson and B. Cahill as CDEMEs. They are all good and respected Senior Officers of the Australian Army Reserve. I shall always treasure my time in the ARes and I shall never forget my comrades, whether Officers or Other Ranks. I miss them all.

A DRINK TO YOUR HEALTH

Next time you charge a glass, raise it and say "Cheers", spare a thought for the early Greeks, who are credited with having started the art of toasting.

Exactly how and when the art of toasting, and drinking healths started is lost in time. But it is believed that early Greeks drank to every God on Olympus. Romans added a pledge to Caesar, and downed a cup for each letter of his name. Vikings offered a drink to Odin and Thor, then added cups to love, memories and friends. Later on, as all the accepted toasts were toasted, merry-makers drank to each other's well-being, or health.

Drinking to a man's health back in those days was something of an Insurance Policy.

DEFENSIVE DRINKING

A man was particularly vulnerable to unfriendly swords while drinking and so, by pledging himself to the health of another, maintained security by numbers.

In ancient Greece, after-dinner drinking grew so boisterous, a chief overseer became necessary. It was his task to control the quantity of liquor and the order in which toasts were drunk. he is to-day's Toastmaster.

The word "toast" originated in Bath, England, in the mid-1600s. At that time, it was an acceptable drinking habit to float a piece of toast in a drink. But the term "toast" first began when a famous beauty was in the Public Baths. An admirer filled his glass with the bath water to drink her health. A companion remarked he didn't care for the drink, but he liked the toast.

Allegiance to the Sovereign was, and still is, shown by drinking a toast to His or Her health. An added mark of respect was that those who toasted the Sovereign would stand up. in certain quarters this raised problems. Aboard early British navy sailing ships, the ceiling and its supporting rafters or beams often prohibited standing erect. The best that could be managed was an undignified stoop - hardly acceptable when drinking the toast to a Sovereign. And so it came about that British matelots remained seated while drinking the Royal Toast.


Other reports have it that either Charles II or, William IV struck his head on the low ceiling of a Wardroom and thereby granted dispensation

for Naval Officers to drink the Royal Toast seated. Certain British Army Regiments which were Marines or which have performed a good deal of service at sea, usually honour the toast seated. Another reason given for the seated toast is that supporters of King James II sat on their pistols at Dinner to prevent them being taken.

Several regiments, including the Grenadier Guards, Coldstream Guards and the Royal Fusiliers, claim they have a dispensation from the toast on the grounds that their loyalty is above suspicion.

Which ever way you look at it, toast-making is here to stay.

Social trends in modern Australia have signalled the end of an era in Military Training with the demise of the Army Apprentice Scheme.


Apprentice targets have not been met in five years, with the 15-and-a-half to 18 years. recruiting limit making targets increasingly harder to achieve.


The policy makers are confident that the new strategy will solve the problem of maintaining the supply of quality tradespeople to the Army.


