

ARMY APPRENTICES - A Short History

On 31st August 1939 six young lads enlisted in the Australian Army Ordnance Corps at the depot in Coventry St South Melbourne and their numbers were given the prefix VP. They were Ken Blonton, Les Cashion, Geoff Thompson, Jim Wylie, Jack Hudson and Jack Wilson. The latter arrived two days later and soon, along with Jack Hudson, managed to join the AIF and served with 2/4 Workshops in the Middle East and neither completed their apprenticeship.

In March 1941 three more enlisted, namely Paul Musto, Jack Richardson and Phil Stamps. On 29th May 1941 Glen Bona, "George" Davidson, Ray Green, Tom Harbour, Les Hildebrandt, Ray Kitchen, Les O'Neil, Laurie Pelling and Neville Pitman enlisted as members of Australian Army Ordnance Corps (Apprentices) (AAOC(P)).

In 1945 the following enlisted as RAEME members; Ian Archer, John Pallister, Kevin Boase, Bill Caldeo, Maurie Dunstan, Keith Dyall, Sam Gibbs, Paul Steppings, Bob Sheddon, Athol Tomkin, Frank Towers and David Watson. They were later joined by Tasmanian apprentice Tim McPartlan.

Apart from a short period at Victoria Barracks and Royal Park (Instrument Section) the practical experience was gained at 3 Base Wksp Broadmeadows, whilst the theoretical studies were taken at various Technical Schools around Melbourne.

Until 1943 all apprentices lived at home, country members living out, travelling each day to the workshop. This caused some financial difficulties as the weekly wage at that time was 15 shillings (\$1.50) per week and as the price of train fare exceeded this, dodging ticket checkers was part of the learning experience.

In 1942 all moved into camp at Broadmeadows where we were part of the AMF, became AEME when it was formed and, later, RAEME. All joined the AIF at the first opportunity and were given VX numbers instead of VP. It was Army policy that apprentices were not allowed to join overseas units until their apprenticeship was completed. Some, however, much to the chagrin of the others managed to find a way around this ruling.

On the cessation of hostilities quite a few took their discharge and the 1945 group took their place. Those that re-enlisted now gained another regimental number (See my own three below).

In 1950 the Army Apprentices School was started at Balcombe and was virtually a Technical School with recruits coming from all over Australia.

Geoff Thompson, Athol Tonkin and myself, all ex apprentices, became instructors in the Metal Trades section. I taught intakes 1 to 9 and left in 1954 and joined the Victorian Education Department.

At Balcombe the apprentices were trained by a mixture of Military and Civilian instructors. The apprentices served in all areas of Australia, Middle East, England, Germany, PNG, Korea, Malaysia and Japan (BCOF).

The 1945 group had a 40th year get together at Broadmeadows in 1985 and it was great to renew those old aquaintances.

To our surprise we had more than forty marchers, the best turn out for a number of years. It was especially pleasing to see Tom Money at age 91 marching next to me in the front row from Collins St to the Shrine, a great effort and I was proud to be beside him.

Our banner parties, troops from 105 Wksp and Ordnance, did us

proud. The march was led by our President John Lee.

Since ANZAC day I recently arranged a special combined meeting of all Victorian RAEME Associations with a view to working closer together, especially during this our 50th year and, of course, into the future.

For those who have not heard, we have now obtained the RAEME Corps Banner for ANZAC day 1993. All those other units have been invited to march with us showing their own banners in support of the Corps Banner. These representatives plus, of course, troops from RAEME could see in excess of 1000 marchers (more on this later).

In closing; Did you know?

Following the grant of title "Royal" to our Corps His Majesty King George V1 was pleased to approve an alliance between RAEME and REME. Approval was promulgated in 1949. This formed a permanent tie between the two Corps and RAEME adopted much of the regalia of REME - its badge, its flag, tactical signs and its march. The march was modified later.

The next alliance was not sought until 1971 when Queen Elizabeth 2 was approached seeking her approval to an alliance between RAEME and RNZEME because of the close ties between both those Corps. Her Majesty was subsequently pleased to approve this alliance.

Two of our members, Don Mcleod and Frank Bell have been recognized for the outstanding work they do for the RSL. The following is an extract from the March 1992 issue of "Mufti";

RSL thanks three busy men

AT the Victorian State Council meeting on the 14 February this year. Australia Day Achievement Medallions were presented to Major F. J. Bell, RFD, (RL), Lt Col D. I. Macieod, ED, (RL) and Mr H. W. Farrell.

Frank Bell joined the CMF with the Corps of Electrical and Mechanical Engineers in the 1950s, was commissioned as Lieutenant in 1959 and served in a widerange of regimental and staff appointments until his retirement in 1988.

He joined the ANZAC Day March Staff in 1988, serving as assistant to the Assistant Chief Marshal. Assembly. (Lt. Col Macteod) for the 1988 and 1989 ANZAC Day Marches

His civilian career was with the Victorian Railways where he retired in July 1989 as Superintendent of the Railways Workshops

On his retirement from the Raiiway, he accepted the appointment of Chief Staff Officer to the Chief Marshal, ANZAC Day Ceremonies.

in addition to his ANZAC March function, he has under-

taken a wide range of RSL activities, such as dealing with enquiries about Unit histories, the war records of individuals, school projects and the identification of memorabilia.

Don Macleod enlisted in the AIF at the minimum age and served in the South West Pacific with the 2/7 Infantry Battalion and the Australian Electrical and Mechanical Engineers.

On discharge he pursued a career in the State Electricity Commission as a Mechanical Engineer and Supply Engineer. He was commissioned as Lieutenant in R.A.E.M.E. in 1950 and was recruited as an ANZAC Day March Marshal in 1951

As a March Marshal he progressed through senior positions to Assistant Chief Marshal, assembly in 1976. This is the key position, being responsible for control of the assembly and despatch from the start point of some 32° Associations and 60 Bands, employing a staff of about 50 marshals.

In addition he has attended at ANZAC House for many years to

assist in planning and organising the March.

He has been active in veterans affairs, for example, he has been on the Committee of the A.N.F.A. (Victoria) for a number of years and is currently the Honorary Treasurer.

For many years he has been on the Committees of both the R.A.E.M.E. Association and the 2/7 Infantry Battalion Association.

He was President of the 2.77 Infantry Battation Association for several years

On the formation of The Australian National Flag Association, Victorian Division, in 1983, Henry W. Farrell was elected Honorary Assistant Secretary

In August 1984, he was elected Honorary Secretary and has held this office to the present day

During this long period of voluntary work, he has displayed great diligence and dedication to the aims and objectives of the Association for the retention of the Australian National Flag in its present form.

PROFILE OF A MEMBER

Edward (Ed) Collins

Ed Collins enlisted in the 2nd AIF at the age of 16, at his second attempt, on 2 July 1940 at the Melbourne Town Hall and was drafted to the Infantry at a new camp at Epsom Racecourse (Bendigo). His first CO was an ex Tankie, Capt Murphy and the OC Lt Edmondson, also a WW1 veteran, and Ed was appointed as his batman.

After an interview he subsequently transferred to Signals and in March 41 transferred to Melbourne Technical College for technical training. These 2nd AIF Signallers learnt all aspects of signalling, power supply and rigging so that they could cover every facet of their Corps requirements. Training completed, they were transferred, first to Balcombe, then to Puckapunyal as the 8th Divisional Sigs Unit bound for Singapore.

Before embarkation the unit became 9th Div Sigs 6th Reinforcement, the colour patch was changed from an oval to round to which a "T" was added after El Alamain and they were bound for the

Middle East.

In July 1941 three liners, the Queen Mary, the Queen Elizabeth and the Aquitania left in convoy escorted by HMAS Australia and HMAS Canberra from Fremantle. Despite a submarine scare they arrived in Palestine. After stints in 105 LAD and 106 LAD Ed was transferred to 4th Australian Ordnance Workshops at Tel El Kirbir, Egypt.

In October 1942 Ed returned to Australia in an un-escorted Norwegian Motor Cargo Ship loaded with phosphorus which survived storms, a sub scare and steering gear failure. (The sub turned out to be one of our own).

Ed was temporarily promoted to Corporal but lost the stripes later (He never did tell me why but I will find out. Ed) before transferring to 1 Base Ordnance Depot at Bandiana as a bulldozer operator. At work he loaded gravel into trucks from an old gold mine at Chiltern while in his spare time he studied Diesel Engineering.

Ed was discharged on 7 May 1946 after six years service in a variety of areas and tasks.

Back in civvy street Ed joined William Adams as a service mechanic in the workshop and in the field, sometimes demonstrating their products to potential customers. In 1949 joined the SEC at Morwell where the open cut operation was just begining.

He spent many years in the diesel truck and engineering field with a variety of employers and during the time with the SEC Ed joined Engineers, 99 Construction Coy as a part time soldier. One of the most satisfying tasks during that period was the construction and installation of the water pumping station and piping for the Pan Pacific Scout Jamboree at Wonga Park.

Ed also served as a CFA volunteer fireman for 16 years.

Finally Ed retired from the workforce on 18 December 1980

(All information supplied by Ed Collins and I am sure there are many more interesting sides to his history than can be recorded in this newsletter. Ed)
